SECTION II

COMMANDERS OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Part 1 - Observations (Lessons Learned)

Ammunition Packing

Item: Ammunition packing containers, materials, and pallets.

Discussion: Using units are not returning significant quantities of packing containers, materials, and projectile pallets generated by expenditures. Packing materials are required in the conduct of normal maintenance operation by ammunition units.

Observation: All ammunition packing material should be returned to ammunition supply points by the using units.

Ammunition Lot Number

Item: Amunition Lot Number Integrity.

<u>Discussion</u>: The manner in which lots of ammunition are loaded on ships, and consequently off-loaded at Qui Nhon Port, precludes maintaining lot integrity on beach clearance operations. As a result, the Qui Nhon Ammunition Base Depot receives mixed lots of ammunition on every beach clearance truck, eliminating effective pre-planning for storing of incoming stocks. These mixed lots of ammunition must be off-loaded in segregation areas, then rewarehoused into proper storage, requiring double handling. Men and equipment hours are the two most valuable, and presently limited, resources available to the Ammunition Base Depot.

Observation: Amounition ships must be loaded at embarkation ports in a manner that facilitates off-loading and . Intenance of lot integrity.

Personnel Replacements

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Item: Timely Personnel Replacements.

Discussion: During the period 1 Nov 66 - 31 Dec 66, the 184th Ordnance Battalion realized a loss of 57% of the 820th Ordnance Company and a 75% loss of the Headquarters Company. During this period it received approximately 33% of the ammunition companies losses in replacements which were either unqualified ammo handlers or in unrelated LOS's. The Headquarters Company was unable to receive any replacements to cover their losses. During the period 1-31 Jan 67 all three of the companies were losing men at a rapid rate and sufficient replacements there not

being received. This shortage of personnel greatly reduced the effectiven ss of the Battalion as a whole and an emergency requisition was submitted for approximately 50% of the authorized strength in grades E-1 through E-5.

Report has been reviewed and is considered adequate with following comments:

a. Ammunition Packing:

(1) 1st Logistical Command Regulation 700-3 requires that using units turn in packing material to the Direct Support Ammunition Supply Point. Using units have not been turning in significant quantities of wooden packing material despite reminders from this headquarters to ASP's and FASP's. In that this headquarters has no authority over combat units, it is recommended that the appropriate field headquarters require combat units to turn in boxes and projectile pallets to the supporting ASP's.

b. Personnel Replacements:

(1) Commanders are encouraged to transfer personnel within units to prevent excess personnel losses during any one period.

(2) Personnel losses are reported to Headquarters 1st Logistical Command 6 to 8 months prior to departure.

1. (U) The Operational Report - Lessons Learned submitted by the 184th Ordnance Battalion for the quarterly period ending 31 January 1967 is forwarded herewith.

2. (C) Reference paragraph 8, page 2: Nonconcur. Of the 12 items listed in the report, there are currently 6 which are less than 75% of the stockage objective, but none 25% or less than the stockage objective. The items which are 75% of the stockage objective or below are, with the exception of trip flares (1498), heavy tonnage items which have purposely been diverted from Qui Nhon due to the critical shortage of improved storage space. Sufficient back up support for those items is located at Cam Ranh Bay. Trip flares are in short supply throughout RVN. They are distributed among Support Commands in proportion to current and anticipated requirements.

3. (U) Reference ist item, page 4: Concur. The cooperation of tactical unit commanders has been solicited in the return of fired brass and steel cartridge cases and prop charge containers. Additionally, cooperation has been requested to return empty prop charge containers without disturbing the pallet. This will conserve manpower and packing materials at depots and ASP's. The commander of the direct support unit is in the best position to effect the necessary liaison with tactical units to assure the return of required packing containers. In addition, substantial quantities of packing materials are currently on requisition from CONUS.

4. (U) Reference 2d item, page 4: Concur.

a. For more efficient beach and warshouse operations, ammunition lot number integrity must be maintained. To maintain this integrity, ships will have to be loaded at CONUS ports in such a manner as to maintain lot number integrity once discharge operations begin.

b. This is a serious problem, and the Commanding Officer of the 4th Transportation Command forwarded a message UNCLAS AVCA-TC-CG O441, DTG 28 Feb 67, to EAMTMST, WAMIMIS and CIRCUSARPAC explaining the problem and requesting that the message be given the widest dissemination. In addition, the Director of Transportation, this headquarters, on 1 March 1967 wrote a letter to the Director of Transportation, Army Material Command, explaining the same problem.

1. This headquarters has reviewed the Operational Report-Lessons Learned for the period ending 31 January 1967 from Headquarters, 184th Ordnance Battalion (Ammunition)(Direct Support) as indorsed.

2. Pertinent comments follow:

a. Reference Item on ammunition lot number integrity, Page 4, and Paragraph 4, 2d Indorsement: Concur. As a result of a previous Operational Report-Lessons Learned submitted by the 184th Ordnance Battalion, USARV notified Ammunition Procurement and Supply Agency (APSA) of the acute lot integrity situation and the handling problems within RVN. APSA in turn notified all CONUS ports and shipping agencies and directed addressees to maintain lot integrity of ammunition shipments during loading and transportation operations. Because of the order and ship time frame involved it normally takes 90 days to realize any significant change in shipping procedures. Future incoming shipments of ammunition will be closely monitored and if lot integrity conditions have not significantly improved during April and May 1967 APSA will be notified without delay.

b. Reference Item on personnel replacements, Pages 4 and 5; Recommendation, Page 5; Paragraph b, 1st Indorsement; and Paragraph 5, 2d Indorsement: Concur. In December 1966, USARV received over seven thousand fewer replacements than had been requisitioned. The requirement to maintain combat elements at a high present-for-duty strength (PDY) made it impossible to replace all losses in combat service support units. By the end of January 1967, the PDY strength of the 1st Logistical Command began to improve, and increased by approximately two thousand men during February.
