SUBJECT: Operational Report - Lessons Learned for Quarterly Period Ending 31 October 1966 (RCS CSFOR-65)

SECTION I

SIGNIFICANT ORGANIZATIONAL ACTIVITIES

The hospital bed capacity at the start of the reporting period was 680. This was reduced by 120 when the 67th Evacuation Hospital (SMBL) opened on 7 October 1966. As of the end of the reporting period the bed authorization has been reduced to 400.

The professional, nursing and registrar staff continued to be augmented by personnel from the 67th Evacuation Hospital (SMBL) until approximately three weeks before it's opening on 7 October 1966. This rather abrupt withdrawing of personnel caused a greatly increased workload on the staff of this hospital as there was no immediate decrease in our workload,

The hospital operated at approximately 80% of it's authorized bed capacity throughout the period.

The following statistics indicated the heavy workload throughout the period:

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Operational Report - Lessons Learned for Quarterly Period Ending 31 October 1966 (RCS GEFOR 65)

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A self-help painting program has been started on most of the wards and clinics. The Dental Clinic, Registrar Branch and four wards have completed the interior painting of their buildings.

An additional 100 kilowatt generator, has been aquired but is not yet in operation. It is located in the great of the mess hall and will be used primarily for it. This should enable the mess to use its steam tables, electric ovens, etc. which could not be operated previously because of the power drop from the existing generators. The hospital now has five 100 kilowatt generators.

An additional two-story wooden billets housing 70 enlisted personnel was constructed during the period and another is approximately 50% complete. When this third barracks is complete there will be no requirement to tillet any enlisted personnel in tents.

The Hospital Headquarters, Personnel Branch and the Chief Nurses Office made an administrative move into a former ward building. The building also has room for offices for the Chief Professional Services, and the Chiefs of Surgery and Medicine! This has saved much time and effort in coordinating administrative actions and provides for better communications among the hospital staff:

A new well was drilled and by using it in conjunction with an Erdlator, potable water is provided for the entire hospital compound.

A second operating suite was opened. This provides an additional three operating rooms bringing the total available to ended. The floors in both operating suites have been tiled and this helps reduce the dust problem created by the bare concrete floors.

Approval has been received to build an additional supply warehouse and a subsistence supply storage building under the self-help program.

Television sets were purchased for all the words with the use of Sundry Fund profits.

The unit was operational during the entire period,

There were no tactical moves during the period.

SECTION II - COMMANDER'S OBSERVATIONS AND RECOLDENDATIONS

Part 1. Observations (Lessons Learned)

PATIENT PERSONNEL RECORDS

Itcm: The hospital receives numerous requests for personnel records of patient personnel.

Discussion: Letters and electrically transmitted messages are received daily from hospitals in Japan and the United States for personnel records and financial data records of personnel evacuated through this hospital. Operational Report - Lessons Learned for Quarterly Period Ending 31 October 1966 (RCS CSFOR 65)

As these patients are not assigned to this hospital the above mentioned records are not transmitted here but remain with their parent unit. Querying this hospital instead of the patients former unit delays the transmission of the records and places an additional administrative burden on the hospital.

Observation: Gaining hospitals in Japan and the United States should be directed to send requests for personnel and financial data records direct to the patients former unit.

PERSONNEL TURNOVER

Item: Mass turnover of personnel reduces hospital efficiency.

Discussion: During the month of August 1966, the hospital lost nearly two-thirds of its staff through rotation of personnel to the United States. This included many key personnel such as the Hospital Communder, Chief Nurse, Executive Officer and the heads of most of the major hospital activities. While patient care did not suffer, the administrative burden was greatly increased. Although replacements were furnished there was generally no overlap period for the orientation of new personnel.

Observation: Notion must be taken to stop the rotation of large groups at any one time to avoid reducing hospital efficiency. This could be done by extension, curtailments, and transfer of personnel within various units.

STRYKER FRAMES

Item: Stryker frames are lost to the hospital when used in patient evacuation.

Discussion: When patients are evacuated on a Stryker frame the item is not replaced by property exchange by the Air Force. They willgive a receipt for the frame which serves as the basis for requisitioning another frame. There has been a problem keeping sufficient Stryker frames in the medical depot and at the hospital.

Observation: It should be recognized that Stryker frames are not an item for property exchange and stockage levels established so that sufficient frames will be available for patient care in the hospital.

2. Reference Section II, Part 1, item concerning Patient Personnel Records, basic report. When a U.S. military patient is admitted to a hospital in RVN, he is inmediately carried on the morning report of his unit as being in a hospitalized status, and his personnel records remain with his unit. Upon the patient's evacuation out-of-country, all responsibility for the patient, which the in-country hospital had, comes to an end. The patient's unit is notified by USARV that he was evacuated cutof-country and directed to forward his personnel records to the USARV Casualty Branch, in Saigon. The in-country hospital at no time receives personnel records of patients, nor handles these. This headquarters has requested the USARV Casualty Branch to notify all PACOM and COMUS hospitals of the procedures by which patient personnel records are handled, and to request that in-country hospitals not be sent correspondence pertaining to these records.
