1. Section 1, Significant Organization or Unit Activities

a. CONUS Training and Embarkation: Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 97th Military Police Battalion is organized under TOE 19-5000, Team AD, and was activated at Fort Lewis, Mashington on 1 June 1966. At the same time, three separate military police companies and one military police detachment were activated and temporarily assigned to this headquarters for command and administrative control while undergoing POM at that installation. Concurrently, seven infantry companies, minus their weapons platoons, were activated and a provisional battalion headquarters was established to exercise command and administrative control over these units while they underwent their POM at Fort Lewis. This commander was aware that three of these infantry companies would be a portion of the subordinate units assigned to this battalion for the performance of its mission in RV.L. Every effort to identify those companies and gain their immediate assignment to this headquarters in order that the greater part of this battalion could train and ship together, was to no avail. By 30 July 1966, the headquarters and headquarters detachment concluded its training cycle with the successful completion of its ATT. For the next twentyseven days, beginning 1 August 1966, this headquarters continued to draw its authorized equipment, prepare it for shipment, deliver it to the port, rotate its personnel on fourteen days leave, and maintain command and administrative control of the heretofore mentioned military police units.

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On the night of 27 August 1966, the headquarters and headquarters detachment departed Fort Lewis, flew chartered commercial air to San Francisco, and embarked from Oakland Army Terminal aboard the USNS Patrick on 29 August 1966. After a smooth voyage of eighteen days, this headquarters disembarked at Cam Ranh Bay, RVN on 16 September 1966.

b. Current Operations: On 19 September 1966, this headquarters assumed command and administrative control of its only subordinate unit in country, the 630th Military Police Company, which supports the provost marshal operations at Cam Ranh Bay. This headquarters is currently requesting additional equipment, preparing company areas for the arrival of . its remaining subordinate units, and planning for the construction of security fences around piers and critical areas. This headquarter's immediate concern is to establish an RTT communications system with its higher headquarters.

2. Section 2, Commanders Observations and Recommendations.

a. Section 2, Part I, Observations (Lessons Learned):

(1) Training and organization.

Subordinate Units

Tom: This headquarters lost the opportunity to train its subordinate infantry units for their overseas security rission, and prepare them for concurrent deployment as a battalion.

Discussion: Initially, this headquarters was scheduled for activation at Fort Benning, Georgia. This was changed to Fort Lewis because the subordinate infantry units were activated there concurrently. However, these units were not assigned to this headquarters, and this headquarters trained units that were not assigned to it overseas. This resulted in a two months colay in the deployment of the assigned infantry units.

Observation: Subordinate units should be assigned to their parent. unit, trained, and deployed together.

(2) Logistics.

Red TAT Equipment

Item: Loading, unloading, and marking of red tat equipment.

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Discussion: This headquarters arrived at Can Ranh Bay with nineteen red tau convainers aboard ship. Only five containers could be located and unloaded at this port. The remaining containers were unloaded at the next port. Vung Tau, and had to be transshipped back to Cam Ranh Bay.

Observation: All of one unit's red tat equipment should be stowed together in the same hold of the ship. For easier identification, the tops of each container as well as all four sides should be stenciled with the UIC.

Water Tank Truck

Item: This headquarters has no capability of supplying its subordinate units with non potable water for showers and laundry.

Discussion: While unit water trailers are sufficient for supplying potable drinking water, there are no provisions made to authorize units an additional water transport capability for their non potable water requiremonto. Further there are no units organized with the mission of supplying this requirement.

compation: Eattalion size units stationed in Vict Nam should be authoriginal the equipment to transport water and supply its subordinate units. Preferably a water tank truck with pump should be considered.

MABTOC Package

Thems The issuing of MABTOC packages.

Miscussion: Present procedure is to issue the MABTOC packages to the depasying unit in CONUS to accompany or follow the deploying unit. The in country sponsoring unit could be of greater assistance if these packages arrived prior to that of the deploying unit.

Observation: Issue WABTOC packages in country to the sponsoring unit or the coploying unit's advance party.

(3) Operations and Logistics.

Communications

Turne Improvement of internal and external communications.

Discussion: Inadequate and indirect radio communications presently exist oetween the military police security sentries aboard ships in the harbor

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and the PHO. Further a reliable and secure means of communicating with higher headquarters is dependent on inadequate, overloaded communications support. Noither are responsive to the timely requirements of the military police.

Observation: Additional radios have been requested to increase the security capability of the sentries aboard ships in the harbor. An MTOE was submitted to add a RTT capability to this headquarters to communicate with its higher headquarters.

1. The Operational Report for Quarterly Period Ending 31 October 1966 of the 97th Military Police Batialion is attached as Inclosure 1.

2. I feel that this report is generally adequate and the recommendations valid. A summarization and specific contents regarding areas of nunconcurrence are contained in the following paragraphs. All comments are keyed to specific sections, paragraphs and items of the basic report.

a. (Section 1, para 1a) The 97th Military Police Battalion Was assigned to the 16th Military Police Group on 26 September 1966. No official relationship existed between these units prior to that date.

b. (Section 1, para 1b) The concern expressed over the present lack of ATT communications is shared by me and my staff. TOE 19-500D, under which the battalion bradquarters is organized, does not authorize interpreter and prover, every effort is being made to reorganize that not business under TOE 19-500E, which would authorize the necessary AN/GRC-16 equiverations and partially alleviate this problem. An FM communications and is erroughly being established between the battalion and group needquarters.

c. (Section 2, Part 1, para 2a (2), Mater Tank Truck) I do not concurning the observation that a water tank truck be authorized for issue to each bascalion-size unit for the purpose of supplying non-potable water for showers and laundry. This problem is peculiar to the unit's a water for phowers and laundry. This problem is peculiar to the unit's a water for providence of constants. Local improvisations have provided a temporary solution to the problem; nevere, the continuing requirement should be resolved through the headquarters charged with the responsibility for providing this support.

d. (Section 2, Part 1, para 2a (3), Communications) It is recognized that currently authorized communications equipment is neither and place to meet the internal needs of the unit, nor is it sufficient to struct mission requirements. This head quarters has concurred in all readents for authorization to obtain the additional communications equipment and corporate essential to mission accomplishment. An ITOE has been subalter and approved for the company charged with the mission of harbor usefully, thereby increasing its communications capability.

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c. (Section 2, Part II, part 2b, (1)) Concur. Early notification on the probable assignment of units would provide organizational headquarters lead time during which they could realistically plan future operational requirements.

f. (Section 2, Part II, para 2b (2), Led TAT Equipment) Concur. Marking red TAT containers on all four sides and the top should be accomplished for ease in identification of containers while still stowed in the ship's hold.

g. (Section 2, Part II, para 2b (2), MADTOC Packages) Honconcur. Since whit to packages are identified with the unit, the present system of shipping the packages with the deploying unit helps to insure that they are delivered to the unit for which they are issued. However, it is recommended that these packages be red disk TAT.

3. The Commanding Officer, 97th Military Police Battalian, has been provided with a copy of this indorsement for his planning and guidance. A thorough explanation of all nonconcurrences has also been provided.

2. Pertinent corments are as follows:

a. b. In this specific instance it does not appear feasible to have the infantry companies assigned to the Military Police Battalion headquarters in CONUS because of the timing and uncertain status of the rife companies at that time.
