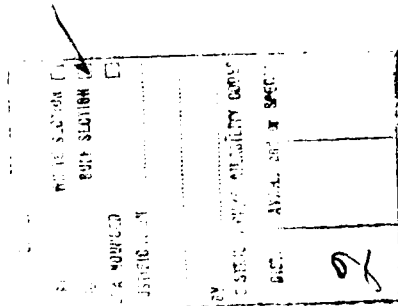

**SUBJECT: Predischarge Education Program**

Transition Program personnel to provide maximum opportunity for eligible servicemen to participate in education or vocational training programs while on active duty. VA Form 21E-1990a, Serviceman's Application for Program of Education or Training, should be stocked in Education Centers and assistance provided personnel in making their initial contact with VA.

6. Utilization of allowances authorized under PREP is not charged against any period of entitlement earned pursuant to Section 1661(a) of 38 U. S. C., cited above.
7. The VA may authorize an educational assistance allowance under PREP to an eligible serviceman pursuing a course at the secondary level in an approved U. S. institution offering an educational program in a foreign country. Educational assistance is not authorized for PREP high school courses conducted by foreign schools.
8. Enrollment in any course or program of education or training for which the VA will be requested to authorize an educational assistance allowance under PREP must be approved by the serviceman's commanding officer or duty supervisor.
9. Directors of Education (GED) are authorized to make necessary arrangements with educational and training institutions to institute and operate courses in support of PREP.
10. Directors of Education (GED) should include PREP courses as one of the education and training options available to individuals who are eligible for the Transition Program.
11. Eligible servicemen should be authorized to attend PREP courses during duty hours on a released-time basis consistent with local command policy on attendance at GED on-duty programs.
12. GED Directors should assure that participation in this program does not impair the validity or acceptability of the High School GED Test battery as a means of achieving a high school equivalency certificate or preclude the granting of high school credit for military educational experiences.
13. When necessary, Directors of Education (GED) should contact VA Regional Offices to request that professional counselors be authorized on a referral basis to provide education and vocational guidance to eligible personnel in accordance with the provisions of 38 U. S. C. 1697, cited above.

1. Operations: Significant Activities

During the first two months of the reporting period the battalion directed its printing efforts to production of election material. The material produced was restricted to impartial publicity of election dates, offices to be filled, procedures for voting, and sites of polling places. Printed media was produced both upon requests and in anticipation of future needs.

Throughout April the battalion produced propaganda directed at the North Vietnamese Forces engaged in Kontum Province. Four separate leaflets were developed at the request of the G-5 Advisor to the 24th Special Tactical Zone. Coordination was made with the Vietnamese Air Force to drop these leaflets. All the leaflets **appealed** to the NVA soldiers to rally or surrender. The first leaflets were designed to make the enemy feel the war was hopeless, while the last leaflet was targeted at the emotional let-down expected among the surviving soldiers after the battle.

2. Lessons Learned: Commander's Observations, Evaluations, and Recommendations.

a. Personnel: None.

b. Intelligence: None.

c. Operations:

(1) Improvement of PSYOPS at District Level.

(a) Observation: There is a lack of understanding at district level among the Vietnamese, as how to carry through on the ideas they have and make them result in a productive PSYOP effort. Usually the district functionaries are not fully trained and therefore not adequately prepared for their jobs.

(b) Evaluation: This leads to PSYOP at the district level as being extremely low-priority or non-existent.

(c) Recommendation: A handbook should be prepared and seminars conducted explaining to the district agencies (ID, APT, VIS, NI) the basic GVN policies and how to utilize their PSYOP capability and resources to support these policies.

(2) Utilization of Village Officials to increase the effectiveness of tape broadcasts.

(a) Observation: Allowing village officials to introduce taped broadcasts by speaking to their people over the team loudspeaker will increase the rapport between the officials, the people of the hamlet, and the PSYOP team.

(b) Evaluation: When the villagers hear their leaders speak over the speaker system, they pay closer attention to the broadcasts and the taped messages that follow.

(c) Recommendation: That Liaison and Assistance Teams augment their PSYOP efforts by permitting local officials to address the villagers by means of the public address system.

(3) 250 Watt Loudspeaker mounted on Light Observation Helicopter (LOH).

(a) Observation: To augment the aerial loudspeaker capability of tactical units the 4th Infantry Division has been experimenting with a 250 Watt Loudspeaker mounted on a Light Observation Helicopter.

(b) Evaluation: It has been found that this system is effective up to altitudes of 1600 feet, but that the optimum altitude is from 1000 to 1200 feet.

(c) Recommendation: That all IB teams consider using LOH's for aerial loudspeaker broadcasts in quick reaction situations or where other speaker systems are not available.

(4) Shadow Boxes used to show movies during daylight.

(a) Observation: Shadow Boxes should be used to show movies during daylight hours in areas where night security is limited.

(b) Evaluation: A shadow box was constructed following specifications provided by the 4th PSYOP Group. By using this item, the versatility of daylight PSYOP missions can be increased, also movies can be shown in areas where security restrictions do not permit night showings. The ideal viewing audience is sixty to seventy people.

(c) Recommendation: All field teams construct or procure a shadow box

for use in extending their audio-visual capability.

d. Organization: None.

e. Training: None.

f. Logistics:

(1) Repair of Sony TC-800, Tape Recorders.

(a) Observation: The Direct Support Unit (DSU) was unable to repair Sony TC-800, Tape Recorders, however a Post Exchange concessionaire was able to repair the tape recorder with little difficulty.

(b) Evaluation: When unsatisfactory results were obtained in the repair of Sony TC-800, Tape Recorders by the DSU, the 8th PSYOP Battalion coordinated with the Director of Maintenance, U.S. Army Support Command, Cam Ranh Bay, to establish a procedure for repairing the tape recorders. This was accomplished by having the tape recorders repaired by a Post Exchange Concessionaire and obtaining money from a Special Services Impress Fund to cover the costs of repair.

(c) Recommendation: Units investigate the possibility of obtaining repair of non-standard commercial type equipment from Post Exchange Concessionaires through coordination with the Director of Maintenance of the area support command.

(2) Controlling Property for Repair.

(a) Observation: It was noted that equipment turned into unit supply rooms or the Battalion S-4 for repair was being lost or difficult to locate. There were insufficient control measures for the property. To rectify the problem DA Form 2402, Exchange Tag (Shoc Tag) was incorporated with DA Form 2405, Maintenance Request Register.

(b) Evaluation: The DA Form 2402 is normally used for turning in equipment to the DSU for direct exchange. It provides a series of receipts as the equipment is passed from one function to another. Due to the multiple receipts system, control is provided as the equipment passes through the repair process. The 2405 also provides a readily available reference for equipment which has been repaired or is still in the process of repair.

(c) Recommendation: That this procedure be adopted as a means of controlling equipment turned in for repair.

(3) Storage of 3M and Geavert Offset Plates.

(a) Observation: 3M and Geavert offset plates have been found to be exposed in spots due to condensation.


(b) Evaluation: To reduce plate spoilage it has been necessary to take caution in storing them. High humidity and temperature are detrimental to the sensitive chemicals contained in the plates.

(c) Recommendation: Offset press plates should be stored in a humidity and temperature controlled atmosphere. If this is not possible the plates should be stacked in an area of good ventilation and dunnage placed between each package.






