

# GOLDWATER-NICHOLS REORGANIZATION ACT OF 1986

## Definition

*CINC* - The acronym "CINC" refers to the commander of a unified or specified command.

*Joint* - A term that connotes activities, operations, organizations, etc., in which elements of more than one military department of the same nation participate. (When not all military departments are involved, the participating Services are identified, e.g., Joint Army-Navy).

*Unified Command* - A command with a broad continuing mission under a single commander and composed of significant assigned components of two or more military departments, and which is established and so designated by the President, through the Secretary of Defense with the advice and assistance of the Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff.

*Specified Command* - A command with a broad continuing mission and that is established and so designated by the President, through the Secretary of Defense with the advice and assistance of the Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff. It is normally composed of forces from one service.

## Synopsis

The purpose of the Goldwater-Nichols Reorganization Act of 1986 was to enhance the legal authority of the Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff and the unified commanders. Its practical purpose was to improve U.S. warfighting capability, particularly in terms of organizational relationships and responsibilities. Implementation has been, at times, controversial in terms of the shifting of power from the Services to the Joint Staff and the CINCs, particularly as interpreted by the Joint Staff.

### The Act:

- ◆ designated the Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff (CJCS) as the principal military adviser to the President;
- ◆ transfers the functions and responsibilities previously assigned to the Joint Chiefs of Staff to the CJCS;
- ◆ created the position of Vice Chairman;
- ◆ specified operational chain of command to run from President to Secretary of Defense to unified and specified commanders.
- ◆ increased focus on the authority of the CINCs, highlighting their responsibilities to organize and command assets in their area of operations; and
- ◆ increased the role of the CINCs in resource allocation.
