EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1. Survey Coverage: The Airborne Communications and Electronics Systems and Airborne Missions Systems career ladders were surveyed to obtain current task and equipment data for use in evaluating current training programs. The Career Field Manager, MAJCOM Functional Managers, and Technical Training personnel requested that both AFSCs be surveyed together to provide data for the potential merger of the two career ladders. The data will also be used to support Specialty Knowledge Test (SKT) development. Surveys were sent to 980 Active Duty (AD), 88 Air National Guard (ANG), and 75 Air Force Reserve Command (AFRC) personnel. (This includes 685 1A3X1 and 295 1A5X1 AD members, 76 1A3X1 and 12 1A5X1 ANG members, and 50 1A3X1 and 25 1A5X1 AFRC members.) Survey results were based on the following respondents: 600 AD members (425 1A3X1 and 175 1A5X1), 23 ANG members (23 1A3X1 and 0 1A5X1), and 33 AFRC members (19 1A3X1 and 14 1A5X1).

2. Specialty Jobs: Structure analysis identified one cluster and four independent jobs within the combined final survey sample. The career ladders contain a variety of jobs, primarily based on aircraft platform and/or primary mission, but the vast majority of the members in the combined sample are performing similar tasks within the airborne communications, electronics, and missions systems arenas.

3. Special Analyses – Aircraft Platform/Primary Mission/Level of Qualification/CONUS versus Overseas/MAJCOM: Commonalities and differences between members of both AFSCs are revealed based on aircraft platform to which assigned, primary mission supported, level of qualification held, CONUS versus overseas assignment, and MAJCOM to which assigned. The most significant overlap in time spent between members of the two AFSCs exists between members holding DAFSC 1A5X1 and members holding DAFSC 1A3X1 assigned to the EC-130 aircraft and the RC-135 aircraft.

4. Career Ladder Progression: The career ladder progression for the combined sample of Airborne Communications and Electronics Systems and Airborne Missions Systems members is typical of most career ladders despite the members in the final sample representing two AFSCs. There was a distinction between 5- and 7-skill levels, with the 7-skill levels spending twice as much time performing supervisory activities. The distinction between 7- and 9-skill-level members was more obvious, with the 9-skill-level members spending almost twice as much time performing supervisory/management activities.

5. Training Analysis: The 1A3X1 Specialty Training Standard (STS) and the 1A5X1 STS, both dated October 2000, were reviewed in light of the survey data. The 1A3X1 STS was better supported by the survey data compared to the 1A5X1 STS. A complete review of the STSs has been provided to the technical school for evaluation and CFETP development for the potentially merged AFSCs.

6. Job Satisfaction Analysis: In general, job satisfaction among most 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 personnel was good. Members of the Reconnaissance Airborne Maintenance Technician (AMT) Independent Job appear to be the most satisfied. Overall, job satisfaction has increased over the past 3 years for the DAFSC 1A3X1 members but decreased over that same period of time for DAFSC 1A5X1 members. The combined 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 sample has significantly higher job satisfaction than the comparative sample of similar AFSCs surveyed in the previous 12 months.

7. Retention Dimensions: Members in all three combined 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 TAFMS groups agreed on several factors potentially influencing their decision to reenlist or separate. Top factors for reenlistment include pay and allowances and job security. Interestingly, the three TAFMS groups also indicated that pay and allowances are a strong influence on their decision to separate. In addition, civilian job opportunities and military lifestyle are significant influences in the decision to separate from the Air Force for all three TAFMS groups.

INTRODUCTION

Air Force Occupational Measurement Squadron (AFOMS)

Occupational Analysis Program

Simply put, our mission is to provide occupational data for decisionmakers, allowing them to make informed personnel, training, and education decisions based not on opinion and conjecture, but on empirical, quantitative data.

Survey Development Process

An occupational survey begins with a job inventory (JI) -- a list of all the tasks performed by members of a given Air Force Specialty Code (AFSC) as part of their actual career field work (that is, additional duties and the like are not included). We strive to ensure that every function career field members perform is included by working very closely with technical training personnel, the Air Staff, and operational subject-matter experts (SMEs) to produce a task list that is complete and understandable to the typical job incumbent filling out the survey. The SMEs also ensure the task list is written to the same level of specificity across duty areas and that each task is mutually exclusive, that it is not covered in the task list more than once.

In addition to this comprehensive task list, job inventories include a number of background questions that deal with demographic information, job satisfaction, equipment usage, and any other area that our customers may desire to focus on.

Furthermore, the JI is only one of the surveys that AFOMS produces. The JI task list is used in creating several other surveys that are important for developing and refining career field training programs and for developing career field promotion tests; these surveys and how their results are used will be described shortly.

Survey Administration

The sample of members who receive the JI primarily depends on the size of the career ladder. We typically survey 100% of all eligible members in career ladders numbering 3,000 members or less. For career ladders larger than 3,000 assigned members, we select a random sample of half of the eligible members. Return rates (the percentage of surveys we receive back from the field) generally run 70% or greater. All this combines to produce very large and very representative samples in almost every study we conduct, compared to the samples obtained by private commercial surveying and marketing firms, and this in turn leads to highly accurate information about the work and demographics of the career field.

When the number of tasks is large, responding to the JI can be somewhat time-consuming for the Air Force member, but it is a simple process. Respondents are asked to examine each task and indicate whether they do or do not perform that task in their current job. They are then asked

to rate each task they marked on a scale of 1 to 9 based on how much relative time they spend performing that task in their present job.

Survey Analysis

Survey responses are processed using a set of computer programs called the Comprehensive Occupational Data Analysis Programs (CODAP). We are able to calculate some important basic information about each task from the information that respondents provide in the JI: the Percent Members Performing (PMP) and the Percent Time Spent (PTS). CODAP groups survey respondents according to their similarity of task performance, and our analysts study these groupings to identify distinct jobs. Further, we can provide PMP and PTS information for any subgroup. For example, we can easily determine the percent of E-5s or 3-skill-level or first-term airmen who perform each task, and estimate the average amount of job time they spend performing it. This is important because many of the applications of our data target particular subgroups within the career ladder.

Uses of Survey Data

Survey results are formally reported in an **Occupational Survey Report (OSR)** -- what you are currently reading -- but the OSR is by no means the only product of an occupational survey study. The OSR provides a high-level "snapshot" of an entire AFSC in a compact package, but it is not intended to provide the comprehensive information needed to support important decisions about a career field. That is the purpose of "data extracts," which are comprehensive, detailed sets of CODAP-generated reports designed for particular applications.

The Training Extract -- AFOMS survey data are essential to technical training professionals. The Training Extract provides information about what career ladder incumbents are actually doing in their jobs at each stage of their career, along with supporting information regarding when and how members should be trained to perform their jobs. The data found in the Training Extract regarding first-job, first-term, and 3-skill level members are the *primary source of empirical information* available to support such decisions.

In addition to the JI, AFOMS produces two other surveys that directly support the training community. Depending on the size of the career ladder, a sample of at least 50 (and frequently 100 or more) 7-skill-level craftsmen is selected to complete a Training Emphasis (TE) survey. A similar-sized sample of other 7-skill-level craftsmen is selected to complete a Task Difficulty (TD) survey.

The TE survey, like the JI, contains the complete career ladder task list, and, like the JI, respondents are asked to rate tasks on a 0 to 9 scale. Unlike the JI, however, respondents are asked to rate tasks based on how much emphasis they believe should be placed on that task for entry-level structured training. A "0" indicates the respondent's belief that no structured training is required for that task, while a "1" indicates the respondent's belief that very little emphasis be placed on providing structured training on that task. A rating of "9" indicates that it is essential to provide structured training on the task. Structured training is defined as resident technical schools, field training detachments, mobile training teams, formal on-the-job training (OJT), or

any other organized training method. The responses of the entire sample of raters are averaged for each task resulting in a TE rating for each task.

The TD survey also contains the full task list and requests that respondents rate each task on a scale of 1 to 9 (“1” is low, “9” is high), but this time respondents are asked to rate the amount of time needed to learn to perform that task satisfactorily. In other words, as the name implies, TD is an indicator of how difficult the task is to learn to do. The sample's *average* TD for each task in the inventory is standardized with a mean rating of 5.0 and a standard deviation of 1.0.

When used in conjunction with the PMP and PTS for first-enlistment members, average TE and TD ratings provide insight into the appropriate training requirements for new personnel in the career ladder. These four indices (PMP, PTS, TE, and TD) are used to compute a composite index, the Automated Training Indicator (ATI), for each task. The ATI expresses in a single number between 1 and 18 (“1” is low, “18” is high) the importance of including training for that task in the initial resident technical course. ATIs allow training developers to quickly focus attention on those tasks that are most likely to qualify for resident course consideration. Further information concerning TE and TD ratings and ATIs for the entire task list can be found in the Training Extract that accompanies this OSR.

The major users of Training Extract information are attendees at Utilization and Training Workshops (U&TWs). The U&TW is a summit of representative career ladder, training, and classification leaders whose purpose is to evaluate current training efficiency and effectiveness in order to propose and approve changes to the Specialty Training Standard (STS) or Course Training Standard (CTS), particularly with regard to 3-skill level training, and to address utilization issues. The AFSC’s job description in Attachment 6 of AFMAN 36-2108, *Enlisted Classification*, is reviewed in light of the survey data and appropriately revised to reflect the jobs being performed by the career ladder members.

Part of the process of compiling the Training Extract involves the *STS matching* process, during which technical school personnel match JI tasks to STS elements; that is, they tell us what particular task or tasks correspond to each STS element when it is covered in training. This is especially useful when STS performance codes are being reviewed for the 3-skill-level course. For example, the U&TW attendees might be asked to consider adding a task performance code to an STS element that has only been trained to a knowledge level previously. Occupational survey data are an important input in determining the appropriate proficiency code. Separate Training Extracts are produced for Active Duty (AD), Air National Guard (ANG), and Air Force Reserve Component (AFRC) members.

The Specialty Knowledge Test (SKT) Extract -- AFOMS survey data are key to ensuring that SKTs are valid. SKTs are an important part of the Weighted Airman Promotion System (WAPS). Because an airman's test score is frequently the deciding factor in determining who is promoted, SKTs must be valid, fair, and credible.

In terms of SKTs, *valid* means that every question on the test is tied to a task which has been shown to be important to successful performance in the specialty. This tie is crucial to documenting the validity of SKT content.

AFOMS surveys provide test writers with information on the percentage of airmen performing tasks (PMP), an estimate of how much job time they spend performing tasks (PTS), how difficult tasks are to master (TD), and the importance of formal training on tasks (TE). This information is combined to produce a composite index called the Predicted Testing Importance (PTI). Those tasks that are rated highest in PTI are ones that tend to be high in all four of our primary indices - PMP, PTS, TD, and TE -- exactly the kinds of tasks that one would consider job-essential and critical for incumbents to know and thus be tested on. PTI information is used for minor test revisions; how it is used will be explained shortly.

Field-validated testing importance (FVTI) data are produced for major test revisions. Approximately 6 months before the start of test development, a sample of 100 senior career field NCOs are sent a survey containing a list of tasks rated highest in PTI. Respondents are asked to provide a 1-7 rating ("1" is low, "7" is high) of how important they believe it is to include a question concerning that task on the SKT. The responses are averaged for each task, yielding the FVTI index -- a direct measure of the opinions of career field experts as to what constitutes "job-essential" knowledge.

PTI and FVTI information is included in the SKT Extract, which is specifically tailored for use by the SKT teams who come to AFOMS to write the promotion examinations. Two sets of reports are prepared -- one set uses only data for E-5s and the other uses combined data for E-6s and E-7s. Each report gives the SKT team information on every task's PMP, PTS, and PTI, and, for major test revisions, FVTI data. Occupational survey data are thus the only objective source of information available to the team regarding how to make the test they write meet legal requirements for validity and fairness.

The Analysis Extract -- The Analysis Extract is an archive of all the data collected in the course of a study that are not incorporated in one of the other extracts. We typically produce separate Analysis Extracts for AD and ANG/AFRC members. The Analysis Extract is usually an enormous document, a compilation of the many reports that "slice and dice" the data in virtually every potentially useful way. Just about any question anyone has regarding career ladder work, personnel, or training and utilization issues can be answered by consulting one or another of the reports in the Analysis Extract.

The Occupational Survey Report (OSR) -- This document, the OSR, captures survey data and analysis both in breadth and depth. For ease of reading, the first half of the OSR concentrates on breadth with compelling factors and implications across the specialty. The ensuing appendices show depth with regard to these factors and implications, primarily in tabular format. Where appropriate, highlights of the tables are contained in the body. The reader will find tables in their entirety in the appendices.

AIRBORNE COMMUNICATIONS AND ELECTRONICS SYSTEMS (AFSC 1A3X1)

AND

AIRBORNE MISSIONS SYSTEMS (AFSC 1A5X1)

This is a report of an occupational survey of the Airborne Communications and Electronics Systems and Airborne Missions Systems career ladders, conducted by the Occupational Analysis Flight, AFOMS. The OSR reports the findings of current data that are available for use in guiding the development and evaluation of training and support planned changes within these career ladders. In addition, the data are used to support SKT development.

Separate OSRs, dated August 2002, were also completed for these career ladders based on the 2001 survey administration to provide data for training decisions and SKT development, as the potential merger will take time to evolve in the training and testing arenas. (Separate OSRs were completed for the career ladders in October 1999 (1A3X1) and November 1999 (1A5X1)).

Career Ladder Backgrounds

1A3X1

According to the Specialty Description in AFMAN 36-2108, *Enlisted Classification*, dated 30 April 2002, personnel in the 1A3X1 career ladder perform aircrew functions on various airborne platforms. They operate, inspect, troubleshoot, and perform maintenance on airborne communications and electronics systems. In addition, these members perform preflight and postflight inspections of communications and electronics systems and supervise and instruct communications and electronics systems personnel in operation, repair, and test procedures. They are responsible for initializing, operating, inspecting, monitoring, testing, troubleshooting, isolating malfunctions, and repairing radio, audio, distribution, data, cryptologic, satellite communications, multiplex, electronic warfare (EW), intercept, analysis, recording, broadcasting, imaging, and computer equipment.

The initial technical training school for this AFSC is located at Keesler AFB MS. The E3ABR1A331 004, Airborne Communications and Electronics Systems Apprentice, course is 11 weeks and 3 days long and provides graduates with the knowledge and skills for the following principles and activities:

- Tuning, performance testing, and adjustment of VHF, UHF, and HF systems, audio distribution system, baseband switching system, automatic direction finding, and the use of related test equipment;
- Introduction to flightline practices, use of maintenance and inspection forms, and safety and security directives;

- Principles of transmitters, receivers, antennas, tuners and electronic and electromechanical tuning systems;
- Operation of airborne voice systems for the transmission and reception of radio messages;
- Maintenance of records and radio logs;
- System and component troubleshooting procedures

Entry into AFSC 1A3X1 requires an Armed Forces Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) “Electrical” score of 67 and a Strength requirement of “G” (weight lift of 40 lb). For entry, award, and retention of these AFSCs, members must meet the following qualifications:

- Qualification for aviation service according to AFI 11-402, *Aviation And Parachutist Service, Aeronautical Ratings and Badges*;
- Physical qualification for aircrew duty according to AFI 48-123, *Medical Examination and Standards, Class III Medical Standard*, and voice communications operations

For award and retention of these AFSCs, members must be eligible for a Top Secret security clearance according to AFI 31-501, *Personnel Security Program Management*. **NOTE:** Award of the 3-skill level without a final Top Secret (TS) clearance is authorized provided an interim TS has been granted according to AFI 31-501.

1A5X1

According to the Specialty Description in AFMAN 36-2108, *Enlisted Classification*, dated 30 April 2002, personnel in the 1A5X1 career ladder operate, monitor, inspect, test, maintain, optimize, and evaluate surveillance radar, computer, display, identification friend or foe (IFF), and ancillary systems equipment. They also supervise and manage airborne missions systems operation.

The initial technical training school for this AFSC is also located at Keesler AFB MS. The E3ABR1A531 002, Airborne Missions Systems Apprentice, course is 9 weeks long and provides graduates with the knowledge and skills for the following principles and activities:

- Airborne maintenance procedures for airborne warning and control systems (AWACS), Joint Surveillance Target and Attack Radar System (JSTARS), Data Processing/Display Maintenance Systems (DP/DMS), radar systems, and aircrew procedures;

- Theory in basic networking, computer operation, radar fundamentals, and system fault isolation procedures

Entry into AFSC 1A5X1 requires an ASVAB “Electrical” score of 67 and a Strength requirement of “G” (weight lift of 40 lb). A member must also have normal color vision as defined in AFI 48-123, *Medical Examination and Standards*. For entry, award, and retention of these AFSCs, members must meet the following qualifications:

- Physical qualification for aircrew duty according to AFI 48-123 Class III medical standards;
- Qualification for aviation service according to AFI 11-402, *Aviation and Parachutist Service, Aeronautical Ratings and Badges*

For award and retention of these AFSCs, members must be eligible for a Secret security clearance according to AFI 31-501, *Personnel Security Program Management*.

SURVEY METHODOLOGY

Inventory Development

The data collection instruments for this occupational survey were USAF Job Inventory (JI) Occupational Survey Study Number (OSSN) 2481 (AFSC 1A3X1) and OSSN 2483 (AFSC 1A5X1), both dated October 2001. During the development of the comprehensive task list covering tasks performed by members in both 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 career ladders, 62 1A3X1 subject-matter experts (SMEs) and 29 1A5X1 SMEs were interviewed from 10 operational bases and one training unit. In addition to the standard background questions, the survey requested the following information: base of assignment; command of assignment; job satisfaction and reenlistment intentions; number of deployments and days TDY; job title; work or functional area; aircraft platform to which assigned; primary mission performed; emergency equipment contained on aircraft supported; and communications or electronics equipment or systems used, operated, or maintained. The inventory listed 530 tasks grouped under eight duty headings and a background section. (The complete task list is available on the CD-ROM containing the products from this study.) Although the 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 members were surveyed separately, the same survey was administered to all members, including the background questions, the tasks, and the order in which these items appeared in the survey.

1A3X1 and 1A5X1 Survey Administration

From October 2001 to February 2002, the survey control monitor at the technical training school and operational bases administered the inventory to all eligible DAFSC 1A331, 1A351, 1A371, 1A391, 1A300, 1A531, 1A551, 1A571, 1A591, and 1A500 AD, ANG, and AFRC personnel. Members ineligible to take the survey included the following: (1) hospitalized

members; (2) members in transition for a permanent change of station; (3) members retiring within the time the inventories were administered to the field; and (4) members who had been in their present jobs for less than 6 weeks. Participants were selected from a computer-generated mailing list obtained from data tapes maintained by the Air Force Personnel Center, Randolph AFB TX.

Survey Sample

The data on survey returns were examined to ensure that the final sample reflected an accurate representation across major commands (MAJCOMs), paygrades, and skill levels. [Table 1](#) shows the distribution of the survey sample by MAJCOM, while [Table 2](#) reflects the survey distribution by paygrade groups. [Table 3](#) reveals the final sample distribution by skill level. [Table 4](#) displays the component characteristics for the AD, ANG, and AFRC members in the final sample.

The Command, Paygrade, and Skill-Level distributions of the survey sample are close to the percent assigned, indicating that the sample is a true representation of the career ladder population assigned to the MAJCOMs.

1A3X1 AND 1A5X1 JOB STRUCTURE

The first step in the analysis process is to identify the career ladder structure in terms of the jobs performed by the respondents. CODAP creates an individual job description for each respondent based on the tasks performed and relative amount of time spent on these tasks. The CODAP automated job clustering program then compares all the individual job descriptions, locates the two descriptions with the most similar tasks and time spent ratings, and combines them to form a composite job description. In successive stages, CODAP either adds new members to this initial group or forms new groups based on the similarity of tasks and time spent ratings. Human analysis of the final output, aided by additional measures of similarities and differences between groups, determines the final job structure of the combined career fields as described here.

The basic group used in the hierarchical clustering process is the ***Job***. When two or more jobs have a substantial degree of similarity in tasks performed and time spent on tasks, they are grouped together and identified as a ***Cluster***. Jobs not falling within any cluster are identified as ***Independent Jobs***. The structure of the career ladder is then defined in terms of clusters, jobs, and independent jobs. The job structure resulting from this grouping process (the various jobs within the AFSC) can be used to evaluate the changes that have occurred in the AFSCs since the previous OSRs. It can also be used to guide future changes in the AFSCs. The above terminology will be used in the discussion of the 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 career ladders.

Specialty Jobs

Based on the analysis of tasks performed and the amount of time spent performing each task, one cluster and four independent jobs were identified within the Airborne Communications and Electronics Systems and Airborne Missions Systems career ladders. [Figure 1](#) shows this job structure. A written outline of the job structure follows. The stage (STG) number or group (GP) number shown beside each title refers to computer-generated tracking information of no importance to the reader. The letter “N” represents the number of members in each cluster or job. [Tables 5-9](#) provide detailed descriptions of the cluster and jobs listed below, including demographic information and representative tasks that members perform. In addition, some distinguishing tasks performed for jobs identified within the cluster are shown.

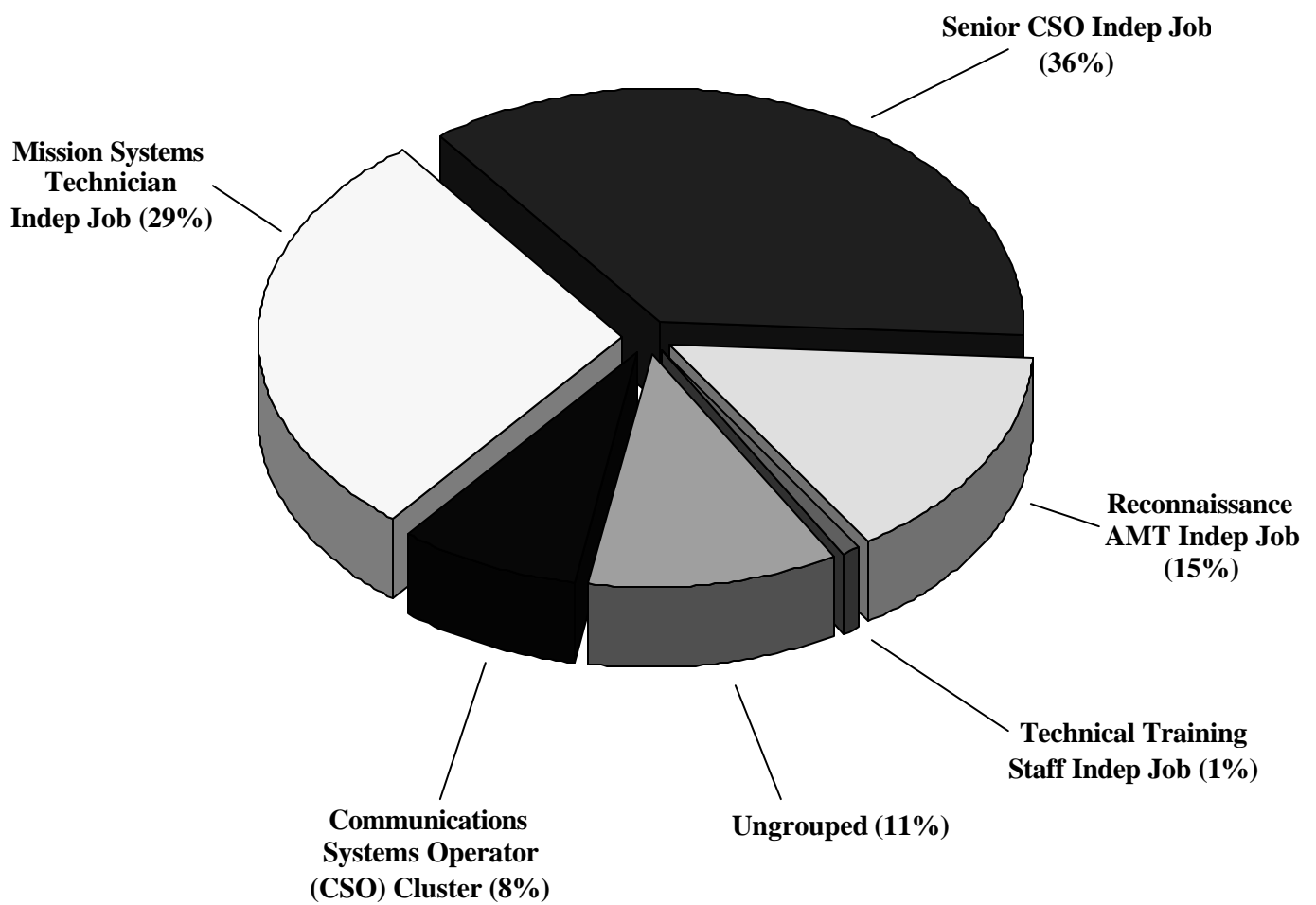

Analysis of 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 Cluster and Jobs

Senior Communications Systems Operator (CSO) Independent Job (IJ)

- 238 members only in AFSC 1A3X1
- Primarily assigned to E-3 aircraft but members also assigned to C-9, C-20, C-32, C-37, C-135, E-4, E-8, EC-130, EC-135, HC-130, MC-130, and VC-25
- 37% of members performing AWACS, other than NATO, mission but also performing variety of other missions, including Special Air Missions (SAM), JSTARS, Rescue, NAO, ABCCC, Combat Shadow, CINC Support, NATO AWACS, Operational Support Airlift (OSA), and Technical Training
- 37% of Senior CSO IJ members spend time working in Aircrew or Airborne Operations functional area; other functional areas covered include Standardization/Evaluation (Stan/Eval), In-Flight Training, Plans and Scheduling, Aircrew Management, Operations, Training Management, Administration, COMSEC/OPSEC Management, In-Flight Maintenance, Readiness, Requirements, Resource Management, and Tactics
- Although members assigned to different aircraft platforms performing different missions were distinguished from each other and separated by CODAP, there was a significant amount of overlap in the tasks being performed and the amount of time being spent on those tasks which resulted in them being grouped together into the Senior CSO IJ versus being grouped into numerous IJs by aircraft and/or mission
- Smaller pockets of members were grouped within the Senior CSO IJ based on the tasks selected and the time spent on those tasks for the following aircraft/missions/locations:
 - E-3/AWACS mission performed at Tinker AFB OK, Kadena AB JA, Geilenkirchen AB GE, and Elmendorf AFB AK

- E-8/JSTARS mission performed at Robins AFB GA and at Detachment 2, 605th Test Squadron, Melbourne FL
- E-4/National Airborne Operations Center (NAOC) mission at Offutt AFB NE
- HC-130 and MC-130/Rescue and Combat Shadow missions performed at F.S. Gabreski Airport NY, Moody AFB GA, Patrick AFB FL, Tinker AFB OK, Hurlburt Fld FL, Eglin AFB FL, RAF Mildenhall UK, and Kadena AB JA
- EC-130/ABCCC mission performed at Davis-Monthan AFB AZ
- C-9, C-20, C-32, C-135, E-4, EC-130, and VC-25/SAM and CINC Support missions performed at Andrews AFB MD, Hickam AFB HI, Offutt AFB NE, MacDill AFB FL, Ramstein AB GE, and Melbourne FL

CSO Cluster

- 49 members only in AFSC 1A3X1
- Three jobs within cluster distinguished by aircraft platform and primary mission
 - Air Battle Management (ABM) CSO Job – 13 members assigned to E-3 (62%), EC-130 (23%), E-4 (8%), and E-8 (8%)
 - Distinguished Visitor (DV) CSO Job – 12 members assigned to C-32 (42%), C-37 (33%), and C-20 (25%)
 - NAOC CSO Job – 17 members assigned to E-4

Mission Systems Technician IJ

- 191 members holding variety of DAFSCs, including 1A331 (1%), 1A351 (10%), 1A371 (9%), 1A531 (12%), 1A551 (39%), 1A571 (28%), 1A591 (1%), and 1A500 (2%)
- Members primarily supporting AWACS, other than NATO, mission but also supporting following missions: JSTARS (10%), NATO AWACS (9%), Cobra Ball (5%), Compass Call (4%), Rivet Joint (4%), Combat Sent (3%), Open Skies (3%), NAOC (1%), Senior Scout (1%), and Staff (1%)
- As with Senior CSO IJ, members in Mission Systems Technician IJ were found in smaller pockets based on aircraft platform and mission supported although tasks selected and amount of time spent on these tasks resulted in the 191 members being grouped together into one IJ

- Smaller groups found included E-3/AWACS mission, OC-135/Open Skies mission, EC-130/Compass Call mission, RC-135/Cobra Ball/Rivet Joint/Combat Sent missions, and E-8/JSTARS mission

Reconnaissance Airborne Maintenance Technician (AMT) IJ

- 100 members holding variety of DAFSCs, including 1A331 (6%), 1A351 (47%), 1A371 (40%), 1A391 (4%), 1A551 (1%), and 1A571 (2%)
- Members primarily assigned to RC-135 (58%) but also assigned to E-4 (16%), EC-130 (16%), E-3 (3%), EC-135 (1%), and HC-130 (1%)
- It is important to remember that members were grouped based on tasks selected and amount of time spent on those tasks rather than aircraft platform, mission supported, or any other factor outside of selected tasks and time spent on tasks performed

Technical Training Staff IJ

- Eight members grouped together based on significant number of training-related tasks performed
- Assigned to Keesler AFB MS (80%), Tinker AFB OK (10%), and Sheppard AFB TX (10%)

Members Not Grouped

- Remaining 11% of survey sample did not group with any cluster or independent job
- Survey respondents sometimes do not fall into an identified job because they perform fewer tasks or mark the same tasks but give considerably different time spent ratings for those tasks
 - In addition, there may not have been enough individuals performing the same combination of tasks to warrant identification of a job
 - Members not grouped into any cluster or job were holding a variety of jobs, such as RC-135 Project Engineer, Training Superintendent, Chief, Aircrew Assignments, A6 Range Superintendent, and Alert Facility NCOIC
 - Important point to note is that all major AFSC functions are covered in identified clusters and independent jobs

Comparison of Current Specialty Jobs to Previous Survey

Because the previous studies included individual surveys for AFSCs 1A3X1 and 1A5X1, a comparison of current specialty jobs to the jobs identified in the previous surveys cannot be accomplished.

SPECIAL ANALYSES:

AIRCRAFT PLATFORM/PRIMARY MISSION/ LEVEL OF QUALIFICATION/CONUS VERSUS OVERSEAS/MAJCOM

Because of the potential merger of AFSC 1A3X1 and AFSC 1A5X1, special analyses of specific groups were requested by the Air Force Career Field Manager, the MAJCOM Functional Managers, and technical training personnel to provide data based on aircraft platform to which assigned, primary mission supported, level of qualification held, CONUS versus overseas location of assignment, and MAJCOM to which assigned. This data may assist in personnel utilization, classification, and curriculum development decisions. The tables for the special analyses provide a summary of the requested data and are not intended to represent the entire picture for each comparison. Much more detailed reports are provided in the Analysis Extract and the Training Extract available on the CD-ROM.

Aircraft Platform

SKILL AND EXPERIENCE ANALYSIS

An analysis of DAFSC groups in conjunction with the analysis of the career ladder structure is an important part of each OSR. This information may be used to evaluate how well career ladder documents, such as AFMAN 36-2108, *Enlisted Classification*, reflect what career ladder personnel are actually doing in the field.

Because this survey was administered to two career ladders and because of the potential merger of the two career ladders, the SKILL AND EXPERIENCE ANALYSIS includes a variety of comparisons:

- 1A3X1 members versus 1A5X1 members for each skill level by Air Force component
- Combined 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 members in one skill level versus combined 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 members in the next higher skill level by Air Force component

Providing comparative data in a variety of ways allows decisionmakers to consider the differences and similarities of the members within each career ladder as well as between the skill levels for the potentially combined members of both AFSCs.

TRAINING ANALYSIS

Occupational survey data are a source of information that can assist in the development or evaluation of training programs for both entry-level and advanced members. In particular, the factors used to evaluate entry-level member training include the jobs that are being performed by first-job personnel (1-24 months' TAFMS) and first-enlistment personnel (1-48 months' TAFMS), the overall distribution of first-enlistment personnel across career ladder jobs, the percent of first-job and first-enlistment members who perform specific tasks, and ratings of relative training emphasis (TE) and task difficulty (TD). (TE and TD ratings are discussed in the Task Factor Administration section of this OSR.)

(N=106)**

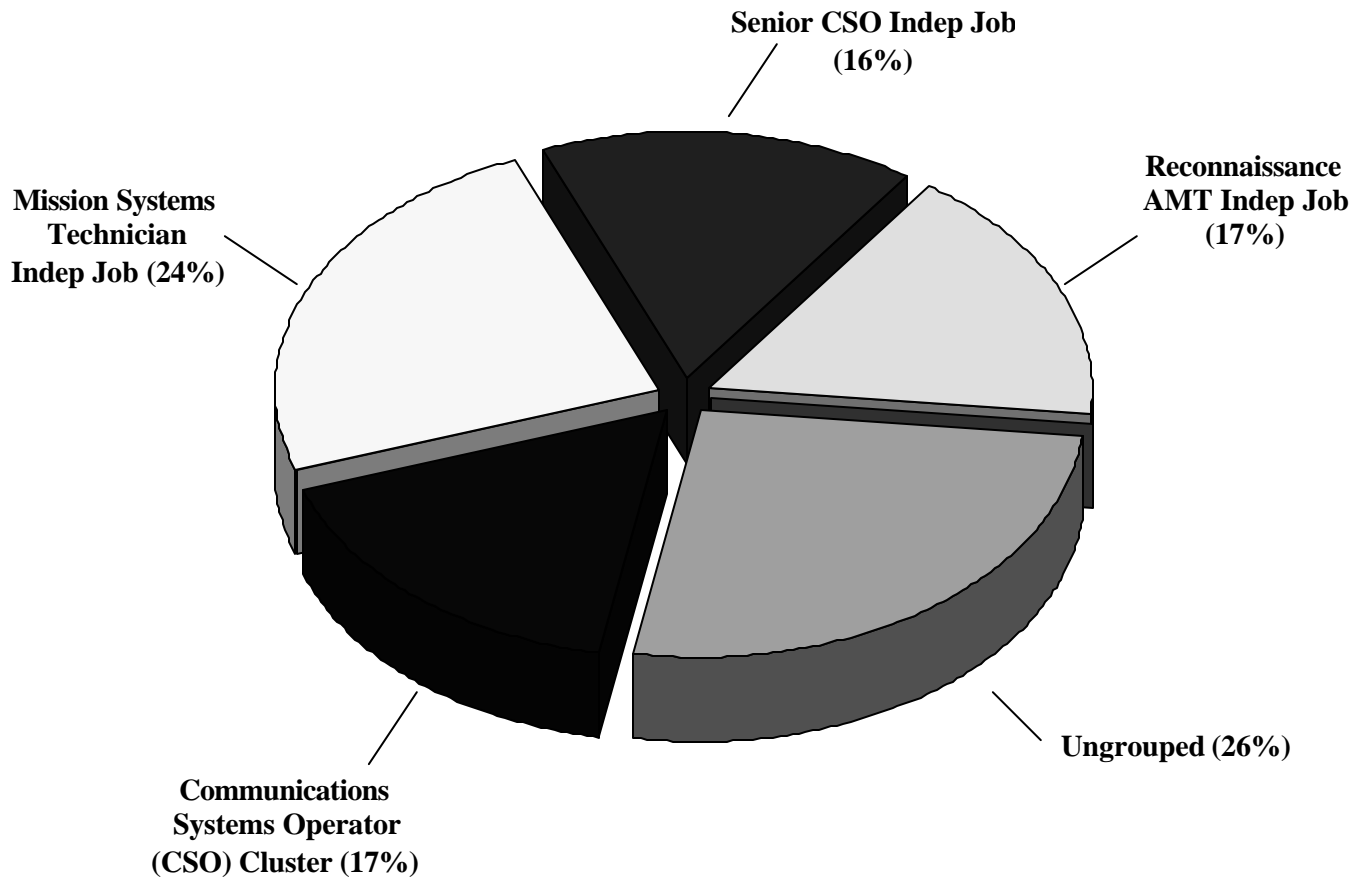

TASK FACTOR SURVEYS

Job descriptions alone do not provide sufficient data for making decisions about career ladder documents or training programs. Task factor information, along with data from the Specialty Training Standard (STS), is needed for a complete analysis of the career ladder. To obtain the needed task factor data, selected DAFSC 1A3X1 and DAFSC 1A5X1 members (generally E-6 or E-7 craftsmen) completed either a training emphasis (TE) or task difficulty (TD) survey. To obtain the needed STS data, STS 1A3X1 and STS 1A5X1 were reviewed by comparing survey data to STS elements.

Task Factor Administration

TE and TD data can help training development personnel decide which tasks to emphasize for entry-level, structured training (resident technical schools, field training detachments, mobile training teams, formal OJT, or any other organized training method). For example, tasks receiving high TE and TD ratings generally warrant resident training if they are also performed by a moderate-to-high percentage of first-job or first-enlistment members. Tasks receiving high TE and/or TD ratings but being performed by relatively low percentages of first-job or first-enlistment members may be more appropriately planned for structured OJT programs within the career ladder. Low TE and/or TD ratings may highlight tasks best omitted from training for new personnel. These task factors are, of course, not the only ones to weigh in making training decisions; the percentages of personnel performing the tasks, command concerns, the criticality of the tasks, and other important factors must also be carefully considered.

Training Emphasis (TE) — degree of emphasis that should be placed on each task for structured training of entry-level members

- Thirty-six DAFSC 1A3X1 senior noncommissioned officers (NCOs) and nine DAFSC 1A5X1 senior NCOs rated tasks in inventory on a scale from 0 (no training required) to 9 (extremely high training emphasis)
- Average TE rating was 1.66 with a standard deviation of 1.22
 - If a task has a TE rating at least one standard deviation above the mean, that is, of at least 2.88, it is probably important to provide new personnel with formal training on that task

Task Difficulty (TD) — amount of time needed to learn to perform that task satisfactorily

- Thirty-five DAFSC 1A3X1 senior NCOs and 10 DAFSC 1A5X1 senior NCOs rated difficulty of tasks in inventory using a scale from 1 (extremely low difficulty) to 9 (extremely high difficulty)
- TD ratings are normally adjusted so that tasks of average difficulty have a value of 5.00 and a standard deviation of 1.00
 - Any task with a difficulty of 6.00 or greater is therefore, considered difficult to learn

WHAT DO 1A3X1 AND 1A5X1 TRAINING DOCUMENTS REFLECT?

Specialty Training Standard (STS) Analysis

Technical school personnel from the 332nd Training Squadron (332 TRS), Keesler AFB MS, matched JI tasks to STS 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 items. Per AETCI 36-2601, dated 14 July 1999, STS elements that are performed by at least 20% of members in appropriate skill-level groups [particularly first-job (1-24 months' TAFMS) members and first-enlistment (1-48 months' TAFMS) members] should be included in the STS. Of course, these are not the only criteria for inclusion in the STS, and other rational considerations may argue against inclusion. Likewise, proficiency-coded elements matched to tasks with less than 20% performing in first-job and first-enlistment groups should be closely reviewed by subject-matter experts, unless other considerations (such as mission criticality or criticality to a particular MAJCOM) argue for inclusion of these "unsupported items."

Both STSs were analyzed to determine whether the survey data supported the existing STS elements and/or proficiency codes. Although the STSs were developed independently for each AFSC's training purposes, the survey data for both AFSCs were combined in order to analyze the STS contents for development of a new STS to support training for a potential merger.

AFSC 1A5X1 STS

- Listing includes specific HF, UHF, VHF, and cryptographic systems with relatively high percent members (combined 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 members) performing and ATI; ATIs indicate that these tasks should possibly be included in formal training and in a new STS to support both AFSCs should the merger occur

- Complete listing of tasks not referenced to 1A3X1 STS located at end of 1A3X1 STS report in Training Extract; tasks should be reviewed for possible inclusion in STS to support training for the merged AFSCs

Overall, the 1A3X1 STS is very well supported by the survey data. The 1A5X1 STS is not supported as well, but this is not surprising considering the systems and equipment contained on 1A3X1 aircraft platforms that are not listed in the 1A5X1 STS as the aircraft platforms are limited to the E-3 and E-8 for AFSC 1A5X1.

JOB SATISFACTION ANALYSIS

An examination of job satisfaction indicators can give career ladder managers a better understanding of factors that may affect the job performance of career ladder airmen. The survey included attitude questions covering job interest, perceived utilization of talents and training, sense of accomplishment from work, and reenlistment intentions.

Job Satisfaction

Overall = Good

- Consistent job satisfaction ratings across the cluster and jobs
- Members of Reconnaissance Airborne Maintenance Technician (AMT) Independent Job – higher ratings overall compared to remaining jobs and cluster but lower reenlistment intentions versus Senior CSO IJ, CSO Cluster, and Mission Systems Technician IJ
- Reenlistment intentions lowest for CSO Cluster members despite relatively high job interest

- Overall, job satisfaction ratings have increased for all three TAFMS groups over past 3 years; job interest and sense of accomplishment increased most significantly for first-enlistment members
- Reenlistment intentions have increased across the board

[Table 132](#) – Job satisfaction ratings for current 1A5X1 members and previous 1A5X1 study

- Overall, job satisfaction ratings have decreased for first- and second-enlistment members but increased slightly for career airmen
- Reenlistment intentions have decreased for first-enlistment members but increased for second-enlistment members and career airmen; interesting to note that job interest, perceived use of training, and sense of accomplishment decreased for second-term airmen, while their intentions to reenlist increased dramatically

- Overall, job satisfaction ratings for all three TAFMS groups comprised of the 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 members are higher versus the comparative sample, particularly for job interest and sense of accomplishment among first-term 1A3X1 and 1A5X1 airmen
- However, reenlistment intentions for first-enlistment and second-enlistment members are lower versus their 1C3X1 and 1C4X1 peers

- Job interest - highest among members assigned to C-37, EC-135, and VC-25; lowest among members assigned to E-3, EC-130, and HC-130

- Perceived use of training - highest among members assigned to C-20, E-8, RC-135, and VC-25; lowest among members assigned to C-135 and EC-135

- Reenlistment intentions - highest among members performing OSA, NATO AWACS, or CINC Support missions; lowest among members performing AWACS (not NATO), NAOC, or Rescue missions

RETENTION DIMENSIONS

JIs also routinely collect information about factors that affect reenlistment and separation decisions. That is, respondents who say that they are likely to reenlist at the end of their present term (and those not eligible for retirement) are asked to indicate whether each of 31 different factors will have any effect on their intended decision and, if so, the degree to which each factor may influence their decision to reenlist. Respondents who indicate that they are likely to separate at the end of their present term (and those not eligible for retirement) are asked to indicate whether each of 31 different factors will have any effect on their intended decision and, if so, the degree to which each factor may influence their decision to separate. The degree is indicated on a 3-point scale ranging from “slight influence” to “strong influence.”

Reenlistment

 - Pay and allowances and job security appeared for each of the three TAFMS groups as top reasons for reenlisting
 - Retirement benefits, bonus or special pay, and military lifestyle were also major influences on reenlistment for second-enlistment members and career airmen

Separation

 - Number or duration of TDYs or deployments may also be significant factor in decision to separate for first- and second-enlistment members
