


The TF tasked with a responding to such an incident must be an organization with diverse capabilities. It must deal with a multitude of Agencies, civilian contractors, international governmental organizations (IGO), private voluntary organizations Non-governmental humanitarian organizations (NGO), Other governmental organizations (OGO) Coalition or Allied Military Host nation organizations. Maximum units, participation of the agencies will be required to ensure understanding of requirements capabilities available.

Required Information

- The situation at the operation site, including the state of existing infrastructure;
- The identification of leaders;
- The immediate needs (such as water, food and medicine);
- The risks of contamination and necessary preventive measures: and
- The necessity and the existence of specific equipment for various jobs, like engineering, decontamination, etc..

- Maintaining a secure and stable environment while working to strengthened the rule of law, human rights and protection of the population.
- Supporting the electoral process.
- Supporting and enabling relief and disaster risk reduction.
- Creating an integrated framework in order to develop a well coordinated crisis response among all actors.



Tasks



Protect

- Relief distribution activities and convoys
- Humanitarian / Government / critical facility and infrastructure
- Mobile humanitarian assistance providers

Prevent / respond

- Public disorder including looting and attacks
- Prevent inter-gang violence or gang violence against communities
- Security threats to the electoral process



Tasks



Assist / Support

- Security of Internally Displaced Persons (IDP) settlements
- Intensify MC QIP efforts throughout Haiti (not just PaP) – "Heart and Minds" i.e., creation of drinking water wells
- Disaster risk reduction or mitigation activities ("rainy season")
- Logistical requirements to support national elections




