Comprehensive Oversight Plan for Southwest Asia

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Foreword

2013 was the year of “planning and decision” in Afghanistan. At all levels, plans were drafted and decisions were made that will determine Afghanistan’s future. Execution of the plans will occur in 2014 and 2015 as the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) combat mission transitions to a Train, Advise, and Assist (TAA) mission.



On June 18, 2013, President Hamid Karzai and NATO Secretary General Anders Fogh Rasmussen announced the formal transition of security responsibility for the fifth and final geographic area of Afghanistan to the Afghan National Security Forces (ANSF). This puts the ANSF in the lead throughout Afghanistan while NATO forces shift to a support role. To prepare the ANSF for the withdrawal of NATO combat forces by January 1, 2015, U.S., coalition, and Afghan leaders mapped out the types of “enablers” (for example, aircraft and mortar systems) needed to sustain the ANSF’s fight against the Taliban and its extremist allies. Fielding of these enablers will continue through 2014. Also, the United States established processes and systems for closing bases; transferring or demilitarizing equipment; and returning equipment, supplies, and rolling stock to the United States.

It has been a difficult year for oversight in an unforgiving environment. Yet, the Federal and Armed Services oversight professionals have been proud to serve. They have honed their professional skills while witnessing history in the making. 2014 will be even more demanding, as our oversight is conducted with increasing real-world restrictions of a reducing military footprint and more limited security and medevac coverage.

Despite these challenges, we will continue to follow the money, assess progress, and identify what is working, what is failing, and what can be improved. Our work, reflected in this Comprehensive Oversight Plan for Southwest Asia, will help identify and deter fraud, waste, and abuse, and promote integrity, accountability, efficiency, and excellence.

Introduction

The participating U.S. Department of Defense (DoD) and Federal oversight agencies, which comprise the Southwest Asia Joint Planning Group, are pleased to present the Fiscal Year 2014 Comprehensive Oversight Plan for Southwest Asia (FY 2014 COPSWA). This annual plan reflects essential interagency collaboration within the oversight community to provide comprehensive reviews of contingency expenditures, to identify whether critical oversight gaps exist, and to recommend actions to address those gaps.

The FY 2014 COPSWA incorporates the planned and ongoing oversight by the Inspectors General of the DoD (DoD OIG), U.S. Department of State (DOS OIG), and the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID OIG); the Special Inspector General for Afghanistan Reconstruction (SIGAR); the U.S. Army Audit Agency (AAA); the Naval Audit Service (NAVAUDSVC); and the U.S. Air Force Audit Agency (AFAA). The FY 2014 update also includes ongoing oversight efforts by the U.S. Government Accountability Office (GAO) related to Southwest Asia. This oversight plan is as of September 1, 2013.

In March 2013, the Special Inspector General for Iraq Reconstruction (SIGIR) culminated its nine-year mission in the issuance of its study, “Learning From Iraq: A Final Report From the Special Inspector General for Iraq Reconstruction.” As such, SIGIR did not submit carryover or new oversight projects for the FY 2014 COPSWA. For a listing of products that were completed during FY 2013 for each agency, see Section 4.2.

Although the COPSWA does not report law enforcement efforts and outcomes, it is important to note that when criminal activity is suspected during the course of an audit, evaluation, or inspection, the allegations are referred to the respective law enforcement component. Specifically, these components are the Defense Criminal Investigative Service, which is the law enforcement arm of the DoD OIG; the SIGAR and SIGIR Investigations Directorates; the Offices of Investigations for the DOS OIG and the USAID OIG; the U.S. Army Criminal Investigative Command, Major Procurement Fraud Unit; the Air Force Office of Special Investigations; and the Naval Criminal Investigative Service. Each of these agencies is a member of the International Contract Corruption Task Force, which combines agency resources to collectively and efficiently deconflict and investigate public corruption and contract fraud in Southwest Asia.

As emphasis continues on the U.S. military, diplomatic, and development missions in Afghanistan, the COPSWA includes an updated FY 2014 Joint Strategic Oversight Plan for Afghanistan, located at Section 1.0. This plan reflects the oversight of activities related to the transition from a military-led to a civilian-led U.S. mission in Afghanistan. The withdrawal of U.S. forces and base closures may impede the ability of the oversight agencies and contracting officer representatives to visit project field sites to conduct oversight of service and construction contracts and to monitor the progress of transition and sustainment activities. However, through the end of 2014, oversight efforts will continue, consistent with the security posture of U.S. forces and the Command’s ability to provide support.

Introduction

In the interest of logical clarity and to better fit with the concerns of the transfer of greater security and other responsibilities to the Government of the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan (GIRoA), the Joint Strategic Oversight Plan for Afghanistan was updated from 22 strategic issue areas in FY 2013 to 11 strategic issue areas for FY 2014. These issues are presented in two sections: Reconstruction (7 issues), and Other Than Reconstruction (4 issues). Specific oversight projects that address these issues are identified in Section 1.2 of the FY 2014 COPSWA. Each project identifies the strategic issue(s) that are being addressed. Referring to the strategic issue identified in the Joint Strategic Oversight Plan for Afghanistan will describe the strategic importance of why the individual oversight projects were selected for execution in FY 2014.

The COPSWA includes descriptions of oversight projects that directly affect efforts in Southwest Asia and surrounding areas. The projects may be conducted exclusively in theater, require travel into theater, or be conducted outside the theater, such as solely in the continental United States (CONUS). The FY 2014 COPSWA edition is organized in Sections (1.2) Afghanistan only—by oversight agency; (1.3) Afghanistan only—by strategic oversight issue; and (2) Other than Afghanistan. In Section 1, the strategic issue(s) is identified for each project. In Section 2, the impacted country(s) is identified for each project, including Iraq, Kuwait, Kyrgyzstan, Pakistan, and other Southwest Asia countries. The full list of strategic issues and countries can be found on page iv. Each COPSWA section groups projects by the executing oversight agency. The individual oversight projects are listed in the order of the COPSWA reference number, which is a unique identifier assigned for tracking purposes only.

Our agencies continue to work together through the Southwest Asia Joint Planning Group to coordinate and provide effective oversight of the U.S.-led efforts in Southwest Asia. We also continue to coordinate oversight plans through improved communications among the members on a regular basis and on individual projects as they are proposed throughout the year. We will update this plan in September 2014.

REQUIRED OVERSIGHT. The COPSWA was first issued in June 2008 (and each year since) in accordance with the requirements of Public Law 110-181, “The National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2008,” section 842, “Investigation of Waste, Fraud, and Abuse in Wartime Contracts and Contracting Processes in Iraq and Afghanistan,” January 28, 2008. In 2009, we began to include additional oversight requirements as directed by Public Law 110-417, “The National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2009,” section 852, “Comprehensive Audit of Spare Parts, Purchases, and Depot Overhaul and Maintenance of Equipment For Operations in Iraq and Afghanistan,” October 14, 2008 (for reporting purposes, see Section 3). Additional information on Sections 842 and 852, respectively, can be found in Appendix B.

EXPANSION OF THE OVERSIGHT PLAN TO INCLUDE ADDITIONAL AREAS SUPPORTING THE U.S. MISSION IN SOUTHWEST ASIA. We expanded this oversight plan beyond the statutory mandate to show the audit, inspection, and evaluation work identified for Afghanistan and the rest of the U.S. Central Command’s area of responsibility, which is comprised of a total of 20 countries. For a listing of these countries, see page iv.

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Section 1.0. FY 2014 Joint Strategic Oversight Plan for Afghanistan

INTRODUCTION

On June 18, 2013, NATO Secretary General Anders Fogh Rasmussen welcomed the announcement by President Hamid Karzai of Afghanistan of the fifth and final group of Afghan provinces, cities and districts to undergo transition. This decision marked an important milestone, when the Afghan security forces--Afghan soldiers and police--would take the lead for the country's security. At the same time, International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) forces were shifting from a combat to a support role.

On June 14, 2013, the White House released the "Letter from the President--Regarding the War Powers Resolution." In the letter, President Barack Obama reports:

United States Armed Forces continue to pursue and engage remaining al-Qa'ida and Taliban fighters in Afghanistan while transitioning to an Afghan security lead. The Afghanistan Force Management Level is approximately 62,000 U.S. forces. Approximately 49,000 of these forces are assigned to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO)-led International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) in Afghanistan. Further Presidentially directed force reductions will continue to the 34,000 level by February 12, 2014. Fifty nations, including the United States and all 28 NATO members, contribute forces to ISAF. These forces broke Taliban momentum and trained additional Afghan National Security Forces (ANSF). The ANSF are now increasingly assuming responsibility for security on the timeline committed to at the 2010 NATO Summit in Lisbon, and renewed at the Summit in Chicago, by the United States, our NATO allies, ISAF partners, and the Government of Afghanistan. The nations contributing to ISAF will continue to support Afghanistan on its path towards self-reliance in security, improved governance, and economic and social development. This path will prevent Afghanistan from again becoming a safe haven for terrorists that threaten Afghanistan, the region, and the world.¹

The U.S. mission in Afghanistan includes military, diplomatic, and development programs, personnel, and assets. The President's FY 2013 budget provided \$96.7 billion in funding for Overseas Contingency Operations (OCO) to the Department of Defense (DoD), Department of State (DOS), and the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) to address U.S. national security goals in Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Iraq. Of that amount, \$85.6 billion was provided to DoD for Operation Enduring Freedom, and \$3.3 billion for DOS and USAID OCO activities for Afghanistan. Because a final decision about the pace of drawdown in Afghanistan has not yet been made, the President's FY 2014 budget includes a placeholder for DoD's 2014 OCO funding, equivalent to the amount provided in the 2013 Budget, or \$88.5 billion; and \$3.8 billion for DOS and USAID.

Section 1.0. FY 2014 Joint Strategic Oversight Plan for Afghanistan

Effective interagency collaboration within the oversight community is essential to providing comprehensive reviews of contingency expenditures, to identify whether critical oversight gaps exist, and to recommend actions to address those gaps. Oversight jurisdiction for Afghanistan is a partnership shared by the Inspectors General for the DoD (DoD IG), State (DOS OIG), and USAID (USAID OIG); the Special Inspector General for Afghanistan Reconstruction (SIGAR); the U.S. Army Audit Agency; Naval Audit Service; the U.S. Air Force Audit Agency; and the U.S. Government Accountability Office (GAO). This oversight community is committed to maintaining an effective working relationship to minimize duplication of efforts and to provide comprehensive oversight coverage.

To optimize this commitment, we have established mechanisms to plan, coordinate, report, and share information and results about U.S. activities in Southwest Asia. In this partnership, the two essential coordination and planning mechanisms for audits, evaluations, and inspections are the Southwest Asia Joint Planning Group (SWA JPG) and the Comprehensive Oversight Plan for Southwest Asia (COPSWA).

- The SWA JPG, established by DoD IG in April 2007, allows for coordination and cooperation among the oversight organizations toward the common objectives of providing comprehensive Southwest Asia oversight. The DoD IG chairs this interagency joint planning group, which meets quarterly or more frequently as needed.
- The COPSWA is an annual plan that incorporates the planned and ongoing work of several DoD and civilian oversight agencies. It includes descriptions of oversight projects that directly affect efforts in Afghanistan and other Southwest Asia countries within the U.S. Central Command’s (USCENTCOM) area of responsibility.

Because of the significance of ongoing U.S. missions in Afghanistan, during FY 2012, the SWA JPG established two subgroups to develop a Joint Strategic Oversight Plan for Afghanistan to include in the COPSWA. These subgroups agreed to meet each year to update the plan. The subgroup chaired by SIGAR, led an effort to update the plan for Afghanistan Reconstruction issues. The subgroup chaired by DoD IG, led an effort to update the plan for Other Than Reconstruction issues in Afghanistan. The joint plan was also coordinated with the remaining oversight stakeholder agencies.

Objectives of Oversight

- Promote accountability, integrity, economy, efficiency, and effectiveness.
- Identify, deter, and investigate fraud, waste, and abuse.
- Support the improvement of contingency business operations, including contracting, logistics, and financial management.
- Support the reform of acquisition and support processes.
- Ensure the safety and needs of civilians, Service members, and their families.
- Provide insight and recommendations to agency and military leadership and Congress, and keep the public informed.

Goals of Oversight

Be relevant, responsive, balanced, and enabling by responding to the needs of agency and military leadership through timely and value added oversight, and by providing assurance to Congress and American taxpayers that the funds provided to support contingency operations in Afghanistan are used correctly and efficiently.

Oversight is a Force-Multiplier

- Supporting military commanders by identifying challenges in critical operations and identifying funds commanders can put to better use to support the operations.
- Supporting the military, civilians, and contractors by identifying life and safety risks and identifying whether they have the necessary equipment, training, and resources to conduct missions within acceptable risks.
- Supporting senior leadership by providing independent, reliable, understandable, and usable reporting to internal and external organizations on the use of funds provided to achieve the national goals of the United States in Afghanistan.

Planning Tools of Oversight

- Strategic: Joint Strategic Oversight Plan for Afghanistan = “the Why” we do the work
(sometimes noted as the strategic questions to be answered or big picture focus)
- Operational: COPSWA = “the What”
(oversight project objectives and milestones)
- Tactical: Individual oversight project guides or plans = “the How”
(methodology)

Risk-Based Planning Process

The oversight community uses a risk-based planning process that includes conducting outreach with congressional representatives, department and agency leadership, USCENTCOM, and senior military and civilian leadership in Afghanistan. Agency leaders in each of the oversight components meet with various senior officials responsible for the significant operations and programs in their respective departments and agencies to include financial, acquisition/contracting, logistics, transportation, and military operations.

We regularly review department, agency, and commanders' strategic documents related to Afghanistan. We also review testimony presented by senior leadership, identify management and program challenges, and evaluate information gathered during our collective oversight work. This framework of information assists in targeting future oversight efforts by identifying existing and emerging systematic management challenges faced by the departments, agencies, commanders, and senior civilian leaders in Afghanistan. Individually and collectively, the members of the SWA JPG continuously assess risk areas to make decisions on relative oversight areas and projects.

Oversight Planning Considerations

In February 2013, GAO reported that since FY 2002, U.S. costs reported for U.S. military, U.S. diplomatic, and reconstruction and relief operations in Afghanistan exceeded \$500 billion, and that significant oversight will be needed to help ensure visibility over the cost and progress of these efforts.²

◆ Reconstruction Programs and Challenges

In its April 2013 Quarterly Report to Congress, SIGAR reported that since 2002, Congress has provided nearly \$93 billion to rebuild Afghanistan. As of March 31, 2013, more than \$54 billion has gone to build the Afghan National Army and the Afghan National Police. A stable security environment is vital for the survival and growth of a democratic, non-extremist Afghanistan. The NATO Training Mission-Afghanistan/Combined Security Transition Command-Afghanistan (NTM-A/CSTC-A) used the funds to provide training, purchase equipment, build army and police facilities, and pay salaries as well as operation and maintenance costs.

The United States also provided nearly \$23 billion to improve governance and foster economic development in Afghanistan. Most of the assistance for governance and rule of law programs comes through USAID's Economic Support Fund and the State Department's International Narcotics, Control and Law Enforcement account.

Since 2010, the United States and other donors agreed in principle to provide more government-to-government funding—or direct assistance—to help the Government of the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan (GIROA) institutions build the capacity to manage funds and deliver services. However, the international donor community made this aid conditional on the GIROA tackling endemic corruption, demonstrating that it has the capacity to manage these funds in a transparent manner, and providing detailed action plans showing how it intends to use development assistance.

GAO reviewed estimates developed by the Congressional Research Service and Special Inspector General for Afghanistan Reconstruction, as well as obligations data provided by DoD and allotment data provided by the Departments of Justice and State. While allotment data are available for U.S. reconstruction and relief efforts in Afghanistan, specific funding figures of U.S. military operations in Afghanistan do not exist because funding provided to DoD for military operations is generally appropriated by operation, not country. Specifically, DoD received funding for Operation Enduring Freedom, which includes Afghanistan.

◆ Other Than Reconstruction Programs and Challenges

DoD IG has identified health care as one of the critical management and performance challenges facing the Department.³ The military health care system provides services to approximately 9.5 million beneficiaries, including active duty personnel and their families. Of special concern is the proper care and support to the thousands of soldiers, sailors, airmen and Marines wounded in Operations Iraqi and Enduring Freedom combat actions. Medical care for military personnel is expected to increase in the next several years, especially in the areas of rehabilitation and transition care. It is critical for DoD IG to maintain vigorous oversight of the health and safety challenges facing the Department, to ensure that wounded warriors receive high-quality health care and that DoD health care dollars are spent wisely.

During an April 10, 2013, Congressional hearing,⁴ DoD IG testified that U.S. and Coalition forces were conducting a phased withdrawal from Afghanistan. Along with the withdrawal of military personnel is the complex withdrawal of DoD equipment. Approximately 35,000 vehicles, numerous helicopters and aircraft, and 95,000 shipping containers will have to be flown out by air or transported overland to seaports for return to the United States.

Oversight will continue during FY 2014 of activities related to the transition from a military-led to a civilian-led U.S. mission in Afghanistan. The withdrawal of U.S. forces and base closures may impede the ability of the oversight agencies and contracting officer representatives to visit project field sites to conduct oversight of service and construction contracts and to monitor the progress of transition and sustainment activities.

This plan describes 11 strategic oversight issues and associated focus areas, and is presented in two sections:

Section 1. Reconstruction

Since 2002, the United States has appropriated nearly \$93 billion⁵ to reconstruct and develop Afghanistan, which ranks among the world's poorest countries, with an annual per capita Gross Domestic Product of less than \$550. In addition to widespread illiteracy, poor health systems, weak institutions, and pervasive corruption, the country's social and economic prospects have suffered from decades of civil war, Soviet occupation, and ongoing insurgency and terrorism.

Uses of U.S. reconstruction funds have included the core task of building and sustaining the Afghan National Security Forces (ANSF), promoting governance and rule of law, supporting anticorruption and counternarcotics initiatives, and fostering economic development.

Execution of the reconstruction mission will change dramatically in the years ahead. The exit of U.S. combat forces and most of their support network will, as in Iraq, entail a shift of operational responsibility from DoD to DOS, which also coordinates with USAID. Meanwhile, the closing of U.S. bases and the steadily shrinking "bubbles" of U.S.-provided security and medical evacuation services will complicate and constrain management and oversight of U.S.-funded reconstruction projects.

In this setting, the effectiveness and sustainability of the ANSF and the Afghan Public Protection Force—the state-sanctioned successor to the banned private security companies—take on increased criticality. The reduced U.S. footprint and the promised increase in the portion of U.S. and other international assistance, some of which also involves U.S. funds, directly into the Afghan national budget heightens the importance of increased ministerial capacity, anticorruption initiatives, agreed-upon metrics of progress, and accountability within the GIRoA.

A comparison of this document with the FY 2013 plan will show that the 13 strategic issues previously identified for Reconstruction have been consolidated in FY 2014 to 7 in the interest of logical clarity and to better fit with the concerns of the transfer of greater security and other responsibilities to the GIRoA. These seven strategic issues for FY 2014 continue to fall under four main reconstruction issues:

- ❖ Security
- ❖ Governance and Development
- ❖ Counternarcotics and Law Enforcement/Rule of Law
- ❖ Cross-cutting

Increasing the capability of the ANSF and improving Afghan security is one of four main themes of the United States Government Integrated Civilian–Military Campaign Plan for Support to Afghanistan.⁶ The purpose of the strategy is to develop the capacity and capability of the ANSF so that coalition forces can fully transition security responsibilities to the GIRoA by the end of FY 2014.

1. Building the Capacity and Capabilities of the Afghan National Security Forces and Administering and Maintaining Accountability of the Afghanistan Security Forces Fund

Why is this issue important? The ANSF is comprised of the Afghan National Army and the Afghan National Police. The ANSF is a critical pillar for establishing security and stability in Afghanistan. Following the removal of the Taliban from power in 2001, U.S. and coalition partners have focused on establishing an effective, independent, and sustainable ANSF. The long-term goal is to build and develop an ANSF that is nationally respected; professional; ethnically balanced; democratically accountable; organized, trained and equipped to meet the security needs of the country; and increasingly funded from GIRoA revenue.

Risks associated with building the capacity and capabilities of the ANSF include defining requirements, acquisition planning, training, financial management and accountability, and corruption. Sustainment challenges include developing literacy and vocational skills and building institutional capabilities, controls, and processes for effective performance by the Afghan Ministries of Defense and Interior.

As of March 31, 2013, Congress had appropriated more than \$54 billion—more than half of all U.S. dollars appropriated for Afghanistan reconstruction since FY 2002—to develop the ANSF. The bulk of this funding, \$52.75 billion, has been directed to the Afghanistan Security Forces Fund (ASFF), which was established in 2005. The FY 2013 appropriation for the ASFF was \$5.12 billion. Accountability over this fund, which is tracked by DoD through pseudo-foreign military sales case accounts established for each appropriation,⁷ is paramount to ensure its proper use to train, equip, and sustain the ANSF.

Key Questions:

- To what extent has DoD established requirements for Afghan security assistance and planned acquisitions that align with Afghan security force structure, unit activations and deployments, and Afghan sustainment capabilities?

- Is the ANSF making sufficient progress in building capacity and capabilities needed to fully assume security responsibilities, and to maintain accountability for the equipment and supplies they receive?
- To what extent has DoD determined the capabilities that the ANSF will require from the U.S. and coalition post-2014 to enable them to successfully carry out the lead security operations role?
- Has DoD properly administered and maintained accountability over the use of funds in the ASFF?
- Has DoD developed the capability of the Ministry of Defense and Ministry of Interior to effectively manage and account for direct funding received from the ASFF?

FOCUS AREAS

- Extent of DoD planning for and execution of equipping and logistics support of ANSF
- Progress in developing ANSF into an operationally independent and sustainable security force
- Vetting of construction requirements for base transfers, force-structure changes, and sustainability of facilities transferring to GIRoA
- Verifying instructors, curriculum, and outcomes of literacy, vocational, and leadership training
- Progress of training ANSF to assume security responsibilities
- Progress of ANSF to perform and sustain capabilities for command and control, financial management, logistics, and medical support
- Whether ANSF is maintaining accountable control over equipment and supplies
- Verifying sufficiency of controls over ASFF transactions
- Evaluation of controls over ASFF pseudo-foreign military sales cases

❖ *Governance and Development*

The U.S. reconstruction strategy emphasizes strengthening Afghan governance and supporting sustainable, inclusive growth. Since FY 2002, Congress has provided nearly \$23 billion to build Afghanistan's governing institutions and foster economic and social development. This money has gone into a number of funds and supported a myriad of programs managed by USAID, DOS, and DoD, including programs related to building governance capacity, promoting democracy and civil society, growing the economy, building or rehabilitating infrastructure, expanding access to education and health care, and boosting agricultural production. FY 2013 appropriations total \$644 million.

The three largest funds and programs during FY 2002 to FY 2013 are the Economic Support Fund, Commander's Emergency Response Program, and Afghanistan Infrastructure Fund.

They have accounted for \$19.7 billion, or about 86 percent, of all funds appropriated for governance and development.

2. Building Afghan Governance Capacity

Why is this issue important? A key focus of U.S. capacity building efforts is developing the budgeting capability within Afghan national and sub-national governmental institutions. This capability is reflected in developing governmental budgets and having government ministries follow through with execution of their respective budgets within the proper budget cycle. Strengthening this capacity will help the GIRoA make responsible decisions about the use of its finite resources, one of the fundamental requirements of self-governance.

Under Afghanistan's Fiscal Year 1392⁸ National Budget (December 2012 - December 2013)⁹, about 72 percent of the government's operating budget was for salaries of government employees. A large portion of the GIRoA's wages and salaries were paid through the Afghanistan Reconstruction Trust Fund, Law and Order Trust Fund for Afghanistan, and ASFF. The United States was the largest donor to the Afghanistan Reconstruction Trust Fund and Law and Order Trust Fund. Challenges faced by the GIRoA include Afghan pay and grade reform, merit based hiring, and improvements in financial management.

In addition, a key priority of the U.S. reconstruction strategy is to support inclusive and constitutional Afghan presidential elections in 2014 and parliamentary elections in 2015. The United States and the international community see free and fair presidential and parliamentary elections as fundamental to establishing a government that is legitimate in the eyes of the majority of the Afghan people, thereby contributing to political stability. U.S. funding and assistance has provided support to programs at the provincial, district, and local levels to strengthen the Afghan electoral system; to train political parties, coalitions and entities; and to provide voter and civic education.

Key Questions:

- To what extent has the GIRoA developed financial management capacity at both the national and sub-national levels?
- What steps have been taken to ensure that lessons learned from prior capacity-building programs at the sub-national levels have been incorporated into the design and implementation of follow-on capacity-building programs?

- To what extent has the GIRoA succeeded in implementing civil-service and pay reforms, and what actions are planned or under way to address remaining implementation challenges and impediments?
- Has U.S. assistance achieved intended outcomes and sustainable electoral reforms, and to what extent have preparations been made for administering the Afghan 2014 elections?

FOCUS AREAS

- Capacity of GIRoA to prepare a comprehensive budget
- Capacity of the ministries to spend funds and operate in accordance with approved budgets
- Whether U.S.-funded programs include provisions for transitioning responsibilities from external technical experts to Afghan civil servants
- Whether USAID incorporated lessons learned into capacity-building programs for sub-national levels of government
- GIRoA's progress and challenges in implementing land-reform initiatives, and whether USAID assistance is focused on these challenges
- Whether USAID's Afghan Civil Service Support Program has achieved expected outcomes regarding merit-based hiring and promotion, and pay-and-grade reform
- Challenges for implementing merit-based hiring and promotion, and pay-and-grade reform; and whether USAID's assistance is focused on these challenges
- Extent of the GIRoA's implementation of the Verified Payroll Program for making salary payments
- Whether USAID's electoral programs are achieving intended outcomes and will be completed in time for the 2014 elections
- Challenges in preparation for the 2014 elections, and whether U.S. assistance is focused on the most critical areas to prepare the GIRoA for them
- Sustainability of capacity-building efforts within the Afghan Independent Election Commission and electoral reforms
- Extent that stabilization, development, and rule-of-law programs are achieving goals and objectives, and what reevaluation actions were taken in response to program metrics and outcomes achieved

3. Sustaining U.S. Investment in Afghan Institutions and Infrastructure

Why is this issue important? Failure by the U.S. Government to adequately address the capacity of the GIRoA to sustain U.S. reconstruction programs and investments will not only waste U.S. taxpayers' funds, but undermine local government credibility and impede progress in reconstruction and stabilization.

Key Questions:

- To what extent have U.S. reconstruction programs and investments taken into account the capacity of the GIRoA to sustain these programs and investments?
- To what extent has the GIRoA made progress in generating revenues to fund governmental operations?
- Has U.S. assistance been used effectively to implement Afghan customs and tax reform initiatives?

FOCUS AREAS

- Whether sustainability was integrated into development programs consistent with the USAID Administrator's Sustainability Guidance for USAID to Afghanistan
- Actions taken by the U.S. Government to identify gaps and address sustainment issues with development programs
- Extent that the U.S. Government developed requirements and programmed funds to support sustainment of Afghan programs and infrastructure investments
- Afghan Ministry of Finance's progress and challenges in implementing customs and tax reforms, and whether USAID's assistance is focused on these challenges
- Extent that Afghanistan and Pakistan earned revenue by improperly charging import duties and taxes on exempt U.S. Government shipments, and actions the U.S. Government has taken to seek refunds
- GIRoA's progress in commercializing the public-utility sector and generating revenues to fund continuing operations

❖ ***Counternarcotics and Law Enforcement/Rule of Law***

Congress appropriated \$6.39 billion for counternarcotics and law-enforcement/rule-of-law initiatives in Afghanistan from FY 2002 through March 30, 2013. FY 2013 appropriations were \$378 million. The bulk of appropriated funds were for the State Department's International Narcotics Control and Law Enforcement Fund (INCLE) and DoD's Drug Interdiction and Counter-Drug Activities. INCLE appropriations have also included funds for the Administration of Justice, Justice Sector Support, and Corrections System Support Programs carried out in Afghanistan.

4. Executing and Sustaining Counternarcotics Programs

Why is this issue important? Afghanistan produces 90 percent of the world's opium.¹⁰ The illegal drug trade provides income for Afghan farmers, bribes for government officials, profits to dealers, and revenues for insurgents. By undermining the rule of law and funding insurgents, the opium trade constitutes a major challenge to Afghanistan's reconstruction. The DoD counternarcotics appropriation primarily funds intelligence

operations to detect and monitor drug trafficking, air mobility and training for the Afghanistan counternarcotics police, and facilities, training, and equipment for the Afghanistan counternarcotics border police.

Key Questions:

- Has U.S. assistance for Afghanistan succeeded in achieving the goals and objectives of the counternarcotics strategy?
- How capable is the GIRoA of assuming a lead role and sustaining progress in counternarcotics operations?

FOCUS AREAS

- Whether counternarcotics programs are achieving intended outcomes, and identifying challenges and impediments to sustained progress
- U.S. agencies' monitoring and evaluation of counternarcotics programs, and of reevaluation actions taken in response to program metrics and outcomes achieved
- Extent of GIRoA preparations to sustain counternarcotics program

5. Implementing Anti-Corruption Initiatives

Why is this issue important? A major part of the U.S. reconstruction strategy is focused on expanding Afghans' access to justice and promoting the rule of law. U.S. support for the rule of law in Afghanistan focuses on efforts to provide Afghans with meaningful access to fair, efficient, and transparent justice. The U.S. Government is also funding programs to develop Afghan capacity to effectively investigate and prosecute national security and major counternarcotics cases.

Key Questions:

- To what extent has the GIRoA implemented anticorruption programs within its ministries and made progress in deterring corruption by investigating, prosecuting, sanctioning, or removing corrupt officials from office, and by implementing financial-transparency and accountability measures for government institutions and officials?
- To what extent have rule-of-law programs improved Afghanistan's justice and corrections systems and increased public access to justice?

FOCUS AREAS

- Extent to which GIRoA's implementation of anticorruption programs within its ministries is consistent with guidance from the Afghan High Office of Oversight for Anti-Corruption
- Criteria and reliability of information that DOS and USAID used to certify that the GIRoA is reducing corruption in order to meet defined aid restrictions

- Whether U.S. assistance to the GIRoA for anticorruption programs is achieving intended outcomes and is focused in areas of greatest impact for achieving strategic objectives
- DOS monitoring and evaluation of training under rule-of-law programs
- Number of trained Afghan legal professionals and number still employed by the GIRoA in the justice sector
- Progress and outcomes of rule-of-law programs to develop capacity within Afghan justice institutions at the national and provincial levels
- Whether the DOS Bureau of International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs has effectively administered funds for prison construction and operations of the Afghan correctional system

❖ ***Cross-Cutting***

Crosscutting issues arise from supporting activities that span multiple sectors and subsectors of Afghan reconstruction. They are typically not linked to a particular reconstruction appropriation. Examples include financial management, contracting, staffing, and security of reconstruction-mission activities.

6. Planning, Coordinating, and Providing Stewardship of Direct and Indirect Assistance Funds and Programs

Why are these issues important? The upfront planning and coordination of U.S. assistance programs is an area prone to weaknesses. Previous audits and inspections identified the need for more informed tradeoffs between risk and rewards in determining which programs to execute; better defined program objectives and metrics; increased coordination of programs; and integration of Afghan sustainability into program design and implementation. Furthermore, some programs are not showing progress in delivering intended outcomes and may be at risk of failing.

Key Questions:

- To what extent has the U.S. Government vetted and designed direct- and indirect-assistance programs to ensure they are necessary, achievable, and sustainable?
- Has the U.S. coordinated programs to achieve unity of effort with the GIRoA and the international donor community?
- To what extent are GIRoA ministries providing stewardship of direct assistance funds and achieving favorable outcomes from programs funded through direct assistance?

FOCUS AREAS

- Whether DoD, USAID, and DOS have established processes to vet and design assistance programs to ensure that they are necessary, achievable, and sustainable

- Where U.S. Government economic-development programs rank on a high/low continuum of risk-to-reward, and what results they achieved at what cost
- Whether DoD, USAID, and DOS are fully coordinating projects to prevent duplication and to achieve mutually supporting outcomes to deliver optimum benefits
- Extent of U.S. Government coordination of assistance projects with the GIRoA and the international community to prevent duplication and achieve unity of effort
- Whether DoD, DOS and USAID are maintaining sufficient oversight of the use of direct assistance funds to ensure the GIRoA is exercising proper stewardship
- Whether the GIRoA is exercising financial management of direct-assistance funds and achieving expected outcomes for programs funded through direct assistance

7. Awarding and Administering Reconstruction Contracts

Why are these issues important? The risks associated with contingency contracting remain high. We plan to continue our oversight to make sure the government is paying fair and reasonable prices and not getting overbilled by contractors for items and services procured. The drawdown of military forces will make it more difficult to provide the forces needed for contracting officer representatives to monitor contracts. Also, the constant rotation of contracting personnel makes it a challenge to maintain a sufficient number of personnel with the right qualifications to provide adequate oversight. These inherent risks are likely to continue despite the improvements that DOS, DoD, and USAID have made. Additionally, USAID has a large backlog of contracts requiring a financial audit of contractor's incurred costs before the contracts can be closed.

Key Question:

- To what extent did DoD, DOS, and USAID award contracts competitively and administer contracts for Afghanistan's reconstruction in a manner to ensure costs are controlled and contractors remain on schedule and perform as required?

FOCUS AREAS

- Whether DoD, USAID, and DOS are using acquisition strategies that best promote competition, minimize risk, control cost, and achieve favorable performance outcomes
- Whether GIRoA contracts financed by the U.S. Government are awarded and administered in accordance with agreed-upon standards and procedures
- Whether the U.S. Government obtained fair and reasonable prices on goods and services purchased, and whether they were properly delivered and accounted for throughout the acquisition process
- Whether amounts billed to the U.S. Government for contracts and grants in support of Afghanistan reconstruction were allowable, allocable, and reasonable
- Whether DoD, USAID, and DOS are fully accounting for and managing the disposition of contractor-managed, government-owned equipment from awarded contracts

Section 2. Other Than Reconstruction

Presidentially directed force reductions in Afghanistan will continue to the 34,000 level by February 12, 2014. The withdrawal of U.S. forces and resulting base closures may impede the ability of U.S. oversight agencies and contracting officer representatives to visit project field sites to conduct oversight of service and construction contracts and to monitor the progress of transition and sustainment activities. However, through the end of 2014, oversight efforts will continue, consistent with the security posture of U.S. forces and the Command's ability to provide support.

As of March 31, 2013, cumulative appropriations for the Afghanistan Security Force Fund (ASFF) were approximately \$52.75 billion for DoD to train and equip an Afghan National Security Force (ANSF) of 352,000 personnel. The FY 2013 funding level for the ASFF of more than \$5.12 billion is a decrease of more than \$6 billion from the \$11.2 billion initially appropriated in FY 2012. Reprogramming activity and rescissions reduced the FY 2012 appropriation amount from \$11.2 billion to \$9.2 billion. This reduced funding may reflect the shift in emphasis from building the Afghan security forces, largely accomplished, towards professionalizing and sustaining them.

The FY 2014 foreign assistance budget justification¹¹ includes a request for about \$2.2 billion to support programs for Afghanistan; specifically, approximately \$1.5 billion for Overseas Contingency Operations (OCO) and about \$749 million base funding for enduring/core programs. This represents a strategic approach that is crucial to achieving U.S. Government goals in Afghanistan. Core resources will focus on enduring needs and aspects of programs whose scope and nature are focused on long-term, sustainable development. OCO resources will be used for immediate and extraordinary needs that are critical to successful security and political transitions, as well as to ensuring that Afghanistan has the necessary economic foundations to shift to a market driven economy.

External impacts to the Afghanistan theater of operations include:

- U.S. national fiscal challenges,
- Reduced Defense budget,
- Overdependence on outsourced capability,
- Rapidly changing environment and missions, and
- Need for more precise requirements generation process and improved execution management.

Concept of Operations

There are multiple complex and challenging operations ongoing in an environment of competing and, sometimes, conflicting goals that require DoD leadership attention:

- ✓ Maintain the national security goals;
- ✓ Safety of the force;
- ✓ Force drawdown;
- ✓ Base realignment, closure, and transfer to the GIRoA;
- ✓ Redeployment, Retrograde, Redistribution, Return, and Disposal (R4D) of equipment and supplies - removing excess rolling stock (vehicles and associated enablers) and supplies (both standard and non-standard stock supplies);
- ✓ Reduction of contracts and contractors; and
- ✓ Transition from DoD to DOS.

A comparison of this document with the FY 2013 plan will observe that the nine strategic issues identified last year for Other Than Reconstruction have been consolidated in FY 2014 to four issues to better fit with drawdown concerns relating to U.S. personnel, property, fiduciary responsibility, and transition activities.

8. Health and Safety

Why is this issue important? The health, safety and security of U.S. personnel supporting overseas military contingency operations and diplomatic missions are among the highest priorities for oversight. As of April 2013, the U.S. had about 67,000 military personnel in Afghanistan supported by about 110,000 civilians and contractors.¹² In addition, U.S. Embassy – Kabul, accounted for approximately 1,200 civilian personnel in Kabul and in the field.¹³

In the areas of health, personnel safety and physical security, oversight organizations will review whether: 1) personnel are provided the highest quality and safest equipment, safe basic life support, and the proper security protection within the criteria of regulation, policy, and reasonable affordability; 2) unauthorized, illegal, or potentially life-threatening activities are effectively detected and deterred; and 3) the level of health, safety and quality have been achieved by risk assessment, identified requirements, and proper oversight.

From 2011 to 2012, there were 12 electrical and fire-related deaths of U.S. personnel in Operation Enduring Freedom.¹⁴ Previous DoD IG assessments uncovered multiple and recurring serious electrical and fire protection violations in DoD-controlled facilities in Afghanistan. In April and May 2012, DoD IG conducted assessments at Kandahar Air

Field¹⁵ that identified more than 400 deficiencies related to life, health, and safety. Assessments at the Bagram Air Field¹⁶ in July and August 2012 identified more than 600 life, health, and safety deficiencies. Several of the findings required immediate corrective action due to their severity. Assessments such as those conducted by the DoD IG to determine if U.S.-occupied facilities are in compliance with applicable standards are essential for the protection and safety of the warfighter.

Another critical area of safety is the health care and welfare support provided to personnel returning from Afghanistan. This support includes proper medical support for wounded warriors; families of personnel killed in action and of wounded warriors; post deployment assessments; and assistance with transition to the next life cycle for those who have served.

Key Questions:

- To what extent has the construction of U.S.-funded and occupied facilities complied with electrical and fire protection standards specified by DoD and DOS?
- To what extent has DOS implemented effective security and safety support for embassy personnel?
- To what extent are the military redeploying personnel properly?
- Have the military services set up adequate processes to properly support wounded warriors and their families, to include assistance with transition to civilian status or reintegration into military service?

FOCUS AREAS

- Physical Security
- Personnel Security and Safety
- Health Care and Welfare

9. Retrograde and Property Management

Why is this issue important? In his February 13, 2013, State of the Union Address, President Obama announced that, “over the next year, another 34,000 American troops will come home from Afghanistan. This drawdown will continue and by the end of next year, our war in Afghanistan will be over.”¹⁷ The U.S. drawdown from Afghanistan

continues. As of April 2013, there were roughly 67,000 troops and millions of pieces of equipment in Afghanistan.

This rapid redeployment of forces results in an immense amount of deployed equipment and property requiring intensive management. Critical processes are needed to identify, account for, safeguard, and determine the optimum disposition of materiel—considering both cost effectiveness and the required reset of CONUS-based DoD units; opportunities to transfer equipment to DOS embassy operations; and practicality of appropriate transfers to the GIRoA or other nations. In addition, maintaining adequate visibility and accountability during intra- and inter-theater transportation contributes to keeping sensitive items out of the hands of insurgents while continuing to fill critical needs of U.S. forces and personnel.

USCENTCOM subordinate commands have developed policies, processes, and programs to manage the retrograde effort, including but not limited to clean sweep operations, USCENTCOM Materiel Recovery Element personnel who assist commands prepare for base closure, and Found-on-Installation initiatives. As of April 2013, USCENTCOM has retrograded equipment for many redeploying military units. However, in conjunction with the drawdown of personnel through the end of 2014, a massive amount of materiel remains to be retrograded.

According to U.S. Forces-Afghanistan (USFOR-A), as of April 30, 2013, the cost for retrograde operations was about \$1.2 billion. USFOR-A estimates additional retrograde costs through December 2014 will be \$6.9 billion.

Key Questions:

- Has DoD sufficiently planned and developed robust management controls to execute the redeployment, retrograde, redistribution, return, and disposal of materiel (R4D)?
- Are disposition decisions supported by adequate cost/benefit analyses and/or critical CONUS requirements?
- Has DoD accurately identified and quantified the amount of materiel for retrograde processing?
- Do management control processes governing R4D adequately mitigate the risk of loss during transportation to the final destination—Intra-theater, inter-theater, ground and air lines of communication (GLOC and ALOC)?
- To what extent is the military shipping controlled materials and munitions properly?
- Are DoD and DOS coordinating efforts to identify and properly account for equipment that will be transferred from DoD to DOS?
- Does DOS have adequate policies and procedures to ensure that equipment transferred from DoD is properly accounted for?

FOCUS AREAS

10. Contract Management and Oversight

Why is this issue important? DoD and DOS continue to face significant challenges in the area of contract award, oversight, documentation, and administration. Spending on security, transportation, and equipment, among other areas, must continue even as the U.S. draws down in Afghanistan. Weaknesses in financial management of funds earmarked for U.S. operations in Afghanistan have been identified that impact financial reporting, but also the efficiency and effectiveness of business operations. Oversight assists in identifying improvements and efficiencies in the management of contracts and processes by reducing non-productive processes and bureaucracy, targeting affordability and controlling growth, promoting real competition, and improving services' acquisitions.

DoD and DOS have numerous active contracts in Afghanistan, including contracts for information operations, security services, military and embassy/consulate construction, and vehicle maintenance. The Commission on Wartime Contracting in Iraq and Afghanistan¹⁸ released a final report in August 2011,¹⁹ which found as much as \$60 billion of waste and fraud in wartime contracts for the two wars. Oversight components have determined that contract requirements were frequently not well-defined and that the contracting arrangements were often not the most appropriate for ensuring the efficient and effective use of resources.

Further, oversight efforts found that contract oversight responsibility was given to a contracting workforce, including the contracting officers' representatives, that was not properly sized, sufficiently trained, nor possessing the experience necessary to manage the complexities of these acquisitions. For these reasons, contract management and oversight remains a high risk area and continues to be vulnerable to increased fraud, waste, and mismanagement of taxpayer funds.

Although there has been increased awareness of the need for trained contracting officer representatives in theater, adequate surveillance of contractor performance in a contingency environment remains a major challenge. With ongoing obligations of significant amounts of funding to contracts in Afghanistan, there is a continued need to assess the use of contractors in support of U.S. military and civilian organizations in Afghanistan, the adequacy of oversight of those contracts, and the controls over funds.

Key Questions:

- To what extent are U.S. government officials properly soliciting, awarding, managing, and administering contracts in accordance with Federal Acquisition Regulations and other applicable guidance?

11. Transition Planning and Execution

Why is this issue important? By the end of 2014, U.S. policy and related military and diplomatic strategy in Afghanistan will be implemented by complex operations that emphasize:

- providing continued training, equipping, advising and assisting to enable the ANSF to continue leading security operations;
- conducting a phased drawdown of U.S. combat forces in 2013 and 2014;
- transitioning reconstruction and development programs consistent with the size and shape of the post-2014 U.S. security footprint; and
- laying the ground work for an enduring, post-2014 NATO and U.S. support presence in Afghanistan

Section 1.0. FY 2014 Joint Strategic Oversight Plan for Afghanistan

The U.S. and coalition mission to train and equip the ANSF has changed from force generation to force sustainment. This includes providing materiel support to the ANSF through NTM-A/CSTC-A and, post-2014, through the Office of Security Cooperation-Afghanistan, as well as U.S.-provided enabler capability to ensure the ANSF can operate independently after the withdrawal of U.S. and Coalition combat forces.

The drawdown of U.S. combat forces involves the orderly closing of bases throughout Afghanistan and the selective transfer of land and facilities to GIRoA by December 31, 2014. Closing a base presents significant challenges for DoD, and requires extensive planning to determine DoD transportation capacity and whether appropriate steps are being taken to ensure efficient movement, storage and disposition of assets during the drawdown.

DoD is currently engaged in a large number of construction projects that include buildings, roads, air strips and other infrastructure, to increase Afghanistan's stability, security, and strengthen its economy. Because of the U.S. military drawdown and the transfer of DoD operations to the DOS, it is important to verify the requirements for any new construction, as well as the capability of GIRoA to finish any incomplete construction projects transferred to it at the end of 2014. Further, the ability of GIRoA to maintain completed facilities already transferred is critical.

Finally, the transition from DoD to DOS in Iraq provides many lessons learned that need to be considered as the DoD and DOS prepare for a comparable transition in Afghanistan. Effective transition planning and execution is critical to supporting U.S. and NATO security objectives to build and sustain a unified and sovereign Afghanistan.

- To what extent will DoD have a post-2014 role in Afghanistan?
- To what extent have DoD and DOS developed and implemented a plan for transitioning to a reduced DoD presence in Afghanistan, including establishing an Office of Security Cooperation – Afghanistan, and have key transition and operational challenges been identified?
- To what extent have base closure processes been identified and managed for real property, equipment, and environmental requirements?
- What progress has been made in building the capacity of GIRoA to maintain transferred infrastructure?

- Establishment of and support to the Office of Security Cooperation – Afghanistan

Appendix A. Scope and Methodology

The Department of Defense Office of Inspector General, Office of the Deputy Inspector General for Southwest Asia (DIG-SWA) prepared this FY 2014 Comprehensive Oversight Plan for Southwest Asia (COPSWA). The COPSWA includes descriptions of oversight projects—audits, inspections, and evaluations—of activities that directly affect efforts in Southwest Asia and surrounding areas. This FY 2014 COPSWA identifies a total of 315 Southwest Asia related oversight projects: 185 ongoing and 130 planned for FY 2014, as of September 1, 2013.

Project information on the ongoing and planned oversight efforts contained in this plan was submitted by the following Southwest Asia Joint Planning Group (SWA JPG) contributing organizations:

- Department of Defense Office of Inspector General
- U.S. Army Audit Agency
- Naval Audit Service
- U.S. Air Force Audit Agency
- Special Inspector General for Afghanistan Reconstruction
- Department of State Office of Inspector General
- U.S. Agency for International Development Office of Inspector General, and
- U.S. Government Accountability Office.

The information for the plan was obtained directly from the contributing organizations, which also validated the content submitted for accuracy and completeness. All decisions regarding the selection, location, and dates of projects were made by the respective contributing organization. DIG-SWA staff compiled the report and reviewed the content for potential duplicative planned projects, errors, omissions, and timing updates. Where unclear input was identified, the DIG-SWA staff asked the respective organization to review and clarify the highlighted attributes of each questioned project. As a result of these discussions, an agency may have decided to withdraw, cancel, or terminate a project, or provide additional information that clarified the objectives, focus, or dates of a project.

After the consolidated draft COPSWA was prepared, it was distributed to each contributing organization for an opportunity to validate the content of the plan and to make final adjustments or updates to the plan, as necessary. During this phase, each organization also reviewed the consolidated draft COPSWA to identify, coordinate, and resolve any further potential duplication issues directly with other contributing organization(s).

At the end of this review and validation process, all final changes were submitted and made, and the final COPSWA was prepared and issued.

For FY 2014, the COPSWA includes an updated Joint Strategic Oversight Plan for Afghanistan. This FY 2014 joint plan was developed by SWA JPG contributing organizations with emphasis on Afghanistan because most of the ongoing and planned oversight work in Southwest Asia is occurring in Afghanistan or is related to Afghanistan. See Section 1.0 of the FY 2014 COPSWA

for the complete FY 2014 Joint Strategic Oversight Plan for Afghanistan, which is presented in two sections: 1. Reconstruction and 2. Other Than Reconstruction.

Because of the significance of ongoing U.S. missions in Afghanistan, during FY 2012, the SWA JPG established two subgroups to develop a Joint Strategic Oversight Plan for Afghanistan to include in the COPSWA. These subgroups agreed to meet each year to update the plan. The subgroup chaired by the Special Inspector General for Afghanistan Reconstruction, led an effort to update the plan for Afghanistan Reconstruction issues. The subgroup chaired by the Department of Defense Office of Inspector General, led an effort to update the plan for Other Than Reconstruction issues in Afghanistan. The joint plan was also coordinated with the remaining SWA JPG contributing organizations.

A comparison of the FY 2013 joint plan with the FY 2014 joint plan shows that the 13 strategic oversight issues previously identified for Reconstruction and the 9 issues for Other Than Reconstruction (22 total) in FY 2013 were consolidated to 7 Reconstruction and 4 Other Than Reconstruction strategic oversight issues (11 total) in FY 2014, as converted below:

Specific oversight projects that address the 11 Afghanistan strategic oversight issues and associated focus areas are identified in Section 1 of the FY 2014 COPSWA. The FY 2014 Afghanistan project summary matrix in Section 1.1 is based on the individual projects listed in Sections 1.2 and 1.3. Each strategic oversight issue is numbered as a code, as identified in Table 1. Projects with more than one strategic oversight issue code are counted on a prorated basis for the summary.

Projects previously included in the FY 2013 COPSWA that were either ongoing or planned as of September 1, 2013, were carried over in the FY 2014 COPSWA, and are included in Sections 1 and 2, respectively, along with new projects proposed for FY 2014. For Sections 1 and 2 of the COPSWA, projects are listed by the executing SWA JPG organization; and in the order of the unique COPSWA reference number. A reference number is assigned by the DIG-SWA staff for each project submitted by a SWA JPG contributing organization, and is a unique identifier for tracking purposes only. Section 2 of the FY 2014 COPSWA identifies oversight projects for Southwest Asia countries other than Afghanistan. See Table 2 for country codes.

Section 3 is included in the COPSWA for reporting purposes and is in response to the reporting requirements contained in Public Law 110-417, “The National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2009,” section 852, “Comprehensive Audit of Spare Parts, Purchases, and Depot Overhaul and Maintenance of Equipment For Operations in Iraq and Afghanistan,” October 14, 2008. See Appendix B for legislative mandates that relate to the COPSWA.

Section 4 of the FY 2014 COPSWA provides information on oversight project activity during FY 2013, as of September 1, 2013. Section 4.0 summaries completed projects by agency and country. The FY 2013 Afghanistan project summary matrix at Section 4.1 provides the total number of projects and those closed (completed, terminated, or cancelled) during FY 2013, based on the FY 2013 Afghanistan strategic codes. Section 4.2 lists final and special-purpose reports issued during FY 2013, grouped by the respective SWA JPG agency.

Some products are listed in Section 4.2 that do not contain a COPSWA reference number because the oversight work was not submitted in advance for inclusion in the COPSWA tracking, such as for quick response memorandum, and special alert reports and letters. When

these products are also released to the public, they are included in the COPSWA product listing as the result of additional oversight conducted in Southwest Asia.

In March 2013, the Special Inspector General for Iraq Reconstruction (SIGIR) culminated its nine-year mission in the issuance of its study, “Learning From Iraq: A Final Report From the Special Inspector General for Iraq Reconstruction.” As such, SIGIR did not submit carryover or new oversight projects for the FY 2014 COPSWA. Final reports that SIGIR issued during FY 2013 are listed in Section 4.2.

The Southwest Asia countries identified in Sections 2, 3, and 4 of the FY 2014 COPSWA are within the U.S. Central Command’s area of responsibility, and are alphabetically coded as follows:

Appendix B. Legislative Mandates

Section 842

Public Law 110-181, “The National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2008,” section 842, “Investigation of Waste, Fraud, and Abuse in Wartime Contracts and Contracting Processes in Iraq and Afghanistan,” January 28, 2008, requires the Inspector General of the Department of Defense to develop a comprehensive plan for a series of audits of Department of Defense contracts, subcontracts, and task and delivery orders for the logistical support of coalition forces in Iraq and Afghanistan. The Act also requires that the Special Inspectors General for Iraq Reconstruction and Afghanistan Reconstruction develop a comprehensive plan for a series of audits of Federal agency contracts, subcontracts, and task and delivery orders for the performance of security and reconstruction functions in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Section 852

This FY 2012 COPSWA update also includes the Department of Defense Office of Inspector General, Army Audit Agency, Naval Audit Service, and Air Force Audit Agency planned and ongoing oversight efforts related to Public Law 110-417, “The National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2009,” section 852, “Comprehensive Audit of Spare Parts, Purchases, and Depot Overhaul and Maintenance of Equipment For Operations in Iraq and Afghanistan,” October 14, 2008, which states:

COMPREHENSIVE AUDIT OF SPARE PARTS PURCHASES AND DEPOT OVERHAUL AND MAINTENANCE OF EQUIPMENT FOR OPERATIONS IN IRAQ AND AFGHANISTAN.

(a) AUDITS REQUIRED.-The Army Audit Agency, the Navy Audit Service, and the Air Force Audit Agency shall each conduct thorough audits to identify potential waste, fraud, and abuse in the performance of the following:

(1) Department of Defense contracts, subcontracts, and task and delivery orders for-

(A) depot overhaul and maintenance of equipment for the military in Iraq and Afghanistan; and

(B) spare parts for military equipment used in Iraq and Afghanistan;
and

(2) Department of Defense in-house overhaul and maintenance of military equipment used in Iraq and Afghanistan.

(b) COMPREHENSIVE AUDIT PLAN.-

(1) PLANS.-The Army Audit Agency, the Navy Audit Service, and the Air Force Audit Agency shall, in coordination with the Inspector General of the Department of Defense, develop a comprehensive plan for a series of audits to discharge the requirements of subsection (a).

(2) INCORPORATION INTO REQUIRED AUDIT PLAN.- The plan developed under paragraph (1) shall be submitted to the Inspector General of the Department of Defense for incorporation into the audit plan required by section 842(b)(1) of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2008 (Public Law 110-181; 122 Stat. 234; 10 U.S.C. 2302 note).

(c) INDEPENDENT CONDUCT OF AUDIT FUNCTIONS.-All audit functions performed under this section, including audit planning and coordination, shall be performed in an independent manner.

(d) AVAILABILITY OF RESULTS.-All audit reports resulting from audits under this section shall be made available to the Commission on Wartime Contracting in Iraq and Afghanistan established pursuant to section 841 of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2008 (122 Stat.230).

(e) CONSTRUCTION.-Nothing in this section shall be construed to require any agency of the Federal Government to duplicate audit work that an agency of the Federal Government has already performed.

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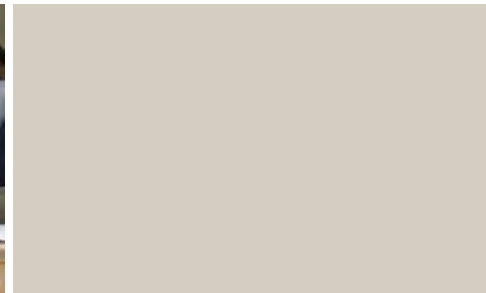
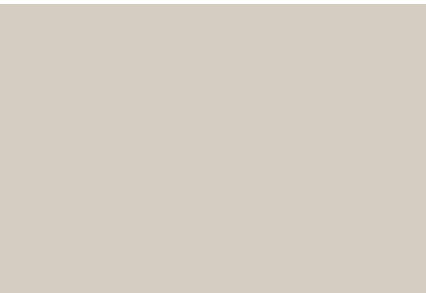
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
