You can see that when you say "strength" you have to be careful to say what you mean.

There are now about 12 million civilians counted in the DOD "strength".

OPERATING FORCES

By "Operating Forces" is meant the combat forces and the closely allied combat supporting elements.

You can see on the right how the Department of Defense has improved its percentage of operating forces.

Newsmen call this increase, correctly, "more bang for the buck".

Of the reduction of 700,000 since 30 June 1952, 400,000 has been in those in training and in transient status. This reduction in "pipeline" is a reflection of increased efficiency. Men are processed, trained, and moved faster today than ever before.

REENLISTMENT RATES

A reenlistment rate is the percent of those who reenlist within three months of separation over the number separated who are eligible to reenlist.

The rates on the opposite page reflect the effect of the recent favorable legislation passed by Congress: better pay, housing, bonuses, etc.

The over-all reenlistment rate for regulars has moved from the 20% level to over 40%. But this can not inspire complacency. We still are not retaining a proper blend of skills.
