ANNEX H

REFERENCE SOURCES

- (U) The annex was prepared to assist personnel doing research on activities in Southeast Asia (SEA). It is a pioneer attempt at listing "caches" of reference sources which are considered to be of significance to serious researchers and historians. It is hoped that this listing will lead to finding other "caches." If so, this annex will be updated and redistributed during the year. Contributions and suggestions are encouraged.
- (U) Most of the printed documents are widely circulated and it is considered unnecessary to reproduce the voluminous distribution lists. Figure H-1 provides a listing of the documents and shows key reference centers which are on the distribution lists.

Air Operations

(U) Air operations in SEA are well documented in written reports and in data from automated sources.

CHECO Reports

- (U) The largest contributor of written reports is Contemporary Historical Examination of Current Operations (CHECO), a division of the Directorate of Tactical Analysis of the 7th Air Force (7AF). The CHECO reports are written in the field, staffed by 7AF Headquarters, and published by the Pacific Air Forces (PACAF).
- (U) CHECO is the oldest continuing USAF function in SEA and dates back to 1962. The basic approach to most studies is to document how an operation was conceived, how it is executed, and whether or not it succeeds. After the draft report is written, all supporting documents are microfilmed and kept as a package. By the end of 1970, CHECO had over 11/2 million pages of documents concerning operations in SEA.
- (U) Although the reports focus on close air support and interdiction, there are reports on numerous subjects. Reports are distributed to every wing and air division in the USAF, all service headquarters, service schools, all unified commands, and to the Secretary of Defense. (1)

(II) All information in SEADAB is retrievable; however, most information is extracted through about 70 programs which retrieve the most frequently requested data. Requests for data not retrieved by existing programs must allow for the necessary computer program development time. The time required is dependent upon the availability of programmer resources and the complexity of the requirement. Variations in the information retrieved by the computer programs can be selectively controlled by using separate parameters in the following areas: (3)





Navy Operations

Navy Research and Development Unit, Vietnam Reports

- (U) Abstracts of reports on naval research, development, test, and evaluation activities are published semiannually by the US Navy Research and Development Unit, Vietnam (NRDU-V).
- (U) The NRDU-V was established in August 1905 as the naval component of the Joint Research and Test Activity (JRATA). With the establishment of component commands in RVN it was deemed more appropriate for test units to be managed and controlled by their respective services. On 15 Nov on the Secretary of Defense, on recommendations of COMUSMACV and CINCPAC, abolished JRATA and NRDU-V became a unit of COMNAV FORV.



The YO-3A "Quiet Airplane" resembles a World War II P-51 Mustang. Tested in RVN as a night visual reconnaissance aircraft, it has thin wings from a popular civilian glider, a sophisticated muffler system, a six-bladed wooden propellor, and "...no extra frills on the...exterior which might make noise in the...wind."



- (U) The NRDU-V research, development, test, and evaluation program is based on requirements generated by US Navy and US Marine Corps forces operating in RVN. NRDU-V projects can generally be classified as follows:
- 1. Projects initiated under the Vietnam Laboratory Assistance Program and for which assistance from the various Navy laboratories is required.
- 2. Evaluation of Navy-developed equipment other than the Vietnam Laboratory Assistance Program generated equipment.
- 3. Evaluation of equipment which has been developed by other services and has Navy applications.
 - 4. Evaluation of equipment designed and constructed using in-country resources.
- (U) NRDU-V reports are not widely distributed and only a small number of addressees receive all reports. The White Oak Naval Ordnance Laboratory, Silver Springs, Md. 20916, probably has the most complete set of reports in CONUS.
- (C) NRDU-V groups their projects into ll categories and lists each as successful or unsuccessful. (5) A listing of projects by number, title, with a brief description and remarks on each project follows:

Pacification and Development

- (U) The pacification and development area is well documented in written reports and in data from automated sources. The CORDS Information Center in MACV Headquarters contains a wealth of material. Much of the data is automated (see Figure H-5).
- (U) The Office of the Chief of Military History, Department of the Army, is currently at work on a multi-volume history of the Army in Vietnam. The volume on pacification is now in the research stage. The author is assembling a comprehensive collection of research documents on all aspects of the subject as reported from Washington to MACV to the district level. The project began in 1969 and is expected to be complete in 5 or 6 years.

Historical Information Management System (HIMS)

- (U) In 1970 MACV Data Management Agency developed a program to provide an automated listing of all documents stored in the MACV historical document repository. Called Historical Information Management System (HIMS), it allows quick reference or inquiries into all documents, studies, and correspondence maintained in the files as well as documents which are on microfilm. (8)
- (U) The program is still in progress, but the final objective is to automate the catalog of MACV historical documents, allow retrieval of documents by identifiers selected from the catalog, and produce an automated listing of all documents stored in the MACV historical document repository.

- -- Members of the 5th ARVN Regt find eight bodies, apparently civilians who had been killed approximately one week earlier. All victims had hands tied behind their backs and most had fractured skulls.
- -- Two hours after the New Year truce ends an element of the 1st Bde, 25th Inf Div engages 50 enemy 10 km northwest of Go Dau Ha, Tay Ninh Province (En: 16 KIA; Frd: None).
- 2 -- Civilian woodcutters accidentally trip enemy claymore mine 3 km southwest of Hoi An, Quang Nam Province. Seven civilians are killed and 21 injured.

- 3 -- Two km northeast of Tieu Can, Vinh Binh Province elements of the 4th Bn, 16th ARVN Regt engage unknown size enemy force in six-hour battle (En: 29 KIA, 4 IW, 3 CSW; Frd: 1 KIA, 19 WIA).
 - -- An element of the 23d (Americal) Div, while in night defensive positions, receives mixed mortar and small arms fire. Fire is returned with organic weapons supported by artillery and helicopter gunships (En: 29 KIA, 9 IW, 1 CSW; Frd: 7 KIA, 12 WIA).
 - -- AFVN newscaster charges command consorship on evening news telecast. The matter is taken under investigation by the MACIG.
 - -- General Creighton W. Abrams is released from 3d Field Hospital.



- 5 -- Radio broadcast by the NFLSVN announces that Communist forces will observe a four-day cease-fire during the <u>TET</u> Lunar New Year holiday.

- 11 -- Elements of the 9th ROK Division operating 14 km northwest of Tuy Hoa, Phu Yen Province, ambush with organic weapons and artillery an unknown size enemy force (En: 42 KIA, 11 IW; Frd: 4 ROK WIA).
- 12 -- A Seal Team accompanied by Kit Carson Scouts operating 9 km southeast of Thanh Phu in Kien Hoa Province uncovers a 6.8 ton cache containing mixed types of ammunition (En: 2 KIA; Frd: 3 KIA, 4 WIA).

 - -- Offshore of Kien Hoa Province a NVN trawler inside the 12 mile limit is challenged by MARKET TIME units. When the trawler disregards the challenge it is taken under fire. It returns fire and attempts to ram the USS Endurance. The trawler then attempts to evade toward the beach and apparently self destructs an sinks in shallow water 40 km southwest of Vung Tau. Two crew members are captured when they swim to shore.



 - -- Coastal Squadron 1 and its only remaining subordinate command, Coastal Div 13, are disestablished in a ceremony at Cat Lo, thus ending USN fast patrol boat operations in RVN.




