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

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#### AFTER ACTION REPORT - OPERATION BILLINGS

1. (U) NAME AND TYPE OF OPERATION: Operation BILLINGS was a search and destroy operation. Reference: Map, VIETNAM, 1:50:000, Series L7014: Sheets 6332 II and III; 6331 I and IV.

2. (U) DATES OF OPERATION: Initiated 121144 June 1967; Terminated 261838 June 1967.

Nat Long. 3. (C) GENERAL: Operation BILLINGS was a lst Infantry Division controlled operation. The operation was conducted against VC/NVA forces and installations in an area extending east from the SONG EE River to Route 1A and from PHUOC Meferse of the United States within the compute of VINH north to Highway 13 lateral. b. TASK ORGANIZATION: Control of the operation was exercised by the 271st VC Regiment were fought and defeated on two occasions. The general area of the operation is shown at Annex C.

5. (C) MISSION: 1st Infantry Division conducts airmobile assaults with 1st Brigade on 11 June 67 and 3d Brigade on 12 June 67 to kill or capture VC/NVA forces and capture or destroy militarily significant equipment, supplies, and installations in western War Zone D; continues to conduct operations in direct support of Revolutionary Development in AO LAM SON 67; continues overwatch of operations in AO STRIKE.

6. (C) CONCEPT OF OPERATION: 1st Infantry Division conducts airmobile assaults with 1st Brigade on 11 June 67, employing three battalions, to secure a forward FSB, "GUNNER I", vic XT995545 and search and destroy within AO REBEL; with 3d Brigade on 11 June 67, employing one battalion, to secure a forward FSB, "GUNVER II", at CHI LINH, and on 12 June 67, employing two battalions, to search and destroy within AO YANKEE; prepares to conduct subsequent airmobile assaults and, on order, artillery base displacements throughout the

#### 7. (C) EXECUTION:

a. 12 June - The 1st Brigade initiated Operation BILLINGS by conducting airmobile assaults into LZ GOLF (XT938576) with the 1-28 Inf at 1325H, closing at 1420H, and LZ FOXTROT (XT972623) with the 1-2 Inf at 1126H, closing at 1228H. The 1-26 Inf continued to secure PHUOC VINH and the SONG BE River bridge (XT9244). The 3d Brigade initiated the operation by moving the 2-28 Inf from LAI KHE to FSB GUNNER II by fixed wing aircraft at 0815H, closing at 1410H. The 2-18 Inf continued local security operations at FSB GUINER II. The 1-16 Inf and 1-18 Inf conducted sccurity operations at LAI KHE.

# b. 13 June - Changes in task organization - None

The 1-28 Inf and 1-2 Inf conducted search and destroy operations in Objective 2 (XT9357) and Objective 4 (XT9661), respectively. The 1-26 Inf continued security operations along Route 14 and conducted security patrolling around FSB GUNNER I. The 1-16 Inf conducted an airmobile assault into LZ RUFE (XT9566), at 1117H, closing at 1222H, secured the LZ for the insertion of the 2-28 Inf, and then conducted limited search and destroy operations without contact. The 2-28 Inf moved by UH-1D aircraft from GUNNER II to LZ RUFE at

# c. 14 June - Changes in task organization - None

The 1-2 Inf, 1-28 Inf, and 1-26 Inf continued operations. The 2-16 Inf continued its security mission and cleared the road between the SONG BE River bridge and the NUCC VANG Bridge (XT9951). The 2-28 Inf conducted patrolling in the vicinity of FSB GUNNER II. The 1-16 Inf conducted search and destroy operations west of LZ RUFE. At 1215H, at XT935658, Company C made contact with 5 VC who fled to the southeast. At 1430H, Company B received sporadic fire at XT937669. Artillery was directed into the area and contact was broken at 1416H. At 1430H, in the same general area, Company B made heavy contact with an estimated VC battalion, the company received heavy fire from the front and flanks. Artillery, air support, and gunships wore employed in support of the units in contact. Company C was sent to reinforce Company B, linking up at 1814H. Sporadic contact continued until 1900H. The two companies returned to the NDP at LZ RUFE, closing at 2330H. VC casualties were 62 KIA(EC).

# d. 15 June - Changes in task organization - None

The 1st Brigade units continued the previous day's operations. The 1-16 Inf conducted patrolling in the vicinity of LZ RUFE, and the 2-28 Inf conducted search and destroy operations west of that L2.



### e. 16 June - Changes in task organization - None

The 1-28 Inf displaced to a new NDP (XT924546), closing at 1540H. The 1-16 Inf conducted search and destroy operations and cleared a LZ at XT947649. All other battalions continued their missions.

### f. 17 June - Changes in task organisation

3D BDE

1-2 Inf moved to YT003610, continued search and destroy operations, and established a MDF. At 0730H, Companies A and B, together with the Reconnaissance Platoen, 1-16 Inf, and Companies A and B, 2-28 Inf, moved from LZ RUFE to LZ XRAY (XT9668), closing at 1125H. At 1245H, B/2-28 Inf received semi-automatic fire from the northwest; the tempo of fire increased with the addition of automatic weapons fire, morter fire, and hand and rifle grenades to the attack. At 1325H, a major assault was mounted against the Reconnaissance Platoon and A/1-16 Inf from the southeast and northeast, respectively, by elements of the 271st VC Regiment. The attack continued until 1459H. At 1430H, C/1-16, C and Ren/2-28 Inf at LZ RUFE received semi-automatic and mortar fire which lasted throughout the day. Between 1700H and 1710H, the elements at LZ XRAY received 50-60 rounds of mortar fire. Counter mortar fire, artillery, air support, and light fire teams supported the entire day's action. Contact was broken at 1710H. The command post, 1-16 Inf, closed on LZ XRAY from LZ RUFE at 1905H. VC casualties were 274 KIA (BC) and 1 PW. The 1-18 Inf moved by R/W from LAI KHE to LZ XRAY at 1600H, closing at 1905H. During the move into the LZ, the battalion received 14 rounds of mortar fire at 1655H and 40-45 rounds at 1710H. No casualties occurred. The 2-2 Inf (Mech) moved from PHU LOI to LAI KHE at 1630H, closing at 1930H.

g. 18 June - Changes in task organization

The 1-28 Inf moved from its field position to FSB GUNNER II and became OPCON 3d Brigade. At 1230H the battalion conducted an airmobile assault into LZ DEFIANT (XT953726) and established a NDP. The 1-2 Inf secured FSB GUNNER WHITE and conducted search and destroy operations to the west. The 1-16 Inf (-) secured LZ RUFE and was airlifted to FSB GUNNER II and then on to LAI KHE, closing at 1717H. The 1-18 Inf and 2-28 Inf conducted security patrols at LZ XRAY. The 2-18 Inf conducted local security patrols at FSB GUNNER II without incident.

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h. 19 June - Changes in task organization

<u>1ST BDB</u> 1-2 Inf 1-16 Inf (Eff 1340H)

2-16 Inf 1-26 Inf

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The 1-16 Inf moved by airlift from LAI KHE to DONG XOAI (YT0775) and estublished FSB GUNNER III, closing at 1340H. All other units continued operations without significant incident. B/1-18 Inf located a base camp at XT951693 consisting of 53 bunkers, 47 of which were subsequently destroyed; the dismembered bodies of 35 VC, killed by an airstrike during the battle of 17 June were discovered.

i. 20 June - Changes in task organization

1ST BDE

1-2 Inf 1-16 Inf 2-16 Inf 1-26 Inf 1st VNMC Bn (Eff 1046H) SF Det A-342 (MGF) (Eff 1700H)

The lst VNMC Bn moved from TAN UYEN to FSE GUNNER I at 0756H, closing at 1046H, by CH-47 and assumed responsibility for the FSB security at 1030H. SF Det A-342 (MGF) closed DONG XOAI at 1700H. All other units continued their activities.

j. 21 June - Changes in task organization - None

The 2-16 Inf continued to secure PHUOC VIPH and the SONG BE bridge. At 0703H,  $\frac{4}{2-16}$  Inf engaged a small VC force at XT927447; at C710H, contact was broken with unknown results. The 1-28 Inf continued to secure LZ DEFIANT and conducted search and destroy operations east of the NDP, locating and destroying a platoon size base camp at XT973728 at 1005H.

k. 23 June - Changes in task organization - None

The 1-28 Inf moved by helicopter from LZ DEFIANT to QUAN LOI, closing at 1140H without incident. The 2-28 Inf was helilifted from LZ XRAY to FSB GUNNER II and then cirlifted to LAI KHE, closing at 1520H. The 1-18 Inf was moved to FSB GUNNER II and then to DI AN, the battalion (-) becoming OPCON 2d Brigade upon closing at 1745H.

1. 24 June - Changes in organization - None

The 1-2 Inf moved by UH-1D from FSB GUNNER WHITE to PHUOC VINH at 11307, closing at 1210H. All other units continued their missions without significant incident.

m. 25 June - Changes in task organization

3D BDE

2-2 Inf (Mech) 1-16 Inf (Eff 1200H) 2-18 Inf 2-28 Inf

The 1-16 Inf continued security operations at FSB GUNNER III and conducted limited search and destroy operations to the north, west, and south of the NDP without incident. Company B, 2-16 Inf, made contact with 5 VC at XT952464 at 0709H; contact was broken at 0721H with unknown results.

n. 26 June - The 1st Infantry Division terminated Operation BILLINGS at 1838H without significant incident during the day.

(2) Element of the 3d Brigade became heavily ongaged with the energy on 14 and 17 June 1967. The response to immodiate tactical air requests on these two occessions was very satisfactory and the bombing on the part of the fighter pilots was excellent. However, the availability of CBU-2 and napelm on these immediate requests did not meet all of our requirements. CBU-2 and napelm are the major effective munitions which can be safely dropped in close proximity to friendly forces. On 14 June 67 seven immediate airstrikes were requested and flown. Four flights had CBU-2 and napalm and one flight had CBU-2 and 500 lb bombs. Ordnance on pre-planned strikes was a problem early in the operation; however, after a visit by CG, 7th Air Force little difficulty

(3) There was a total of nine B-52 strikes flown in support of Operation BILLINGS. These strikes were extremely effective in opening key jungle areas hebitually used by the VC and will greatly assist future ground



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operations in the same area. The importance of B-52 strikes in support of ground operations cannot be emphasized enough. Massed air power is an excellent seapon to assist in keeping the Viet Cong constantly off balance, on the move, completely disorganized, and to inflict casualties on personnel and equipment.

- 10. (C) ADMINISTRATION AND LOGISTICS: See Annex D
- 11. (C) COMMANDER'S EVALUATION:

a. The 1st Infantry Division accomplished its three fold purpose in conducting Operation BILLINGS.



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(1) The 271st VC Regiment was located in the primery objective area, as indicated by the Division's intelligence planners, and elements of that regiment were defeated in two separate battles on 14 June and 17 June 67.

(2) VC base camps and way stations in the northern area of intorest for the security of FHUOC VINH were located and destroyed. Particular emphasis was placed upon the destruction of such installations along the east-west line of communications from War Zone C to War Zone D. Landing sones and roads in the area were improved facilitating future operations.

(3) Valuable information was gained of the area of operations which will support future operations in War Zone D. Of particular signifiin War Zone D. The type jungle encountered was considerably denser than that previously operated in by the Division. Fewer open areas suitable for use as landing zones exist.

b. The Division opened two new fire support bases at GUNNER III and GUNNER WHITE during the operation, in addition to the opening and clearing of Route 1A from PHUCC VINH to FSB GUNNER I for the duration of the operations.

12. (C) CONCLUSIONS AND LESSONS LEARNED.

a. Conclusions: Operation BILLINGS was the most successful operation conducted by the 1st Infantry Division since Operation JUNCTION CITY. The division achieved all of its goals for the operation. The experience gained at all levels in conducting an operation in War Zone D will provide a basis for future plans and operations in that area.

b. Lessons learned:

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(1) When conducting operations in an area in which few landing zones exist, it is necessary to exercise particular care to insure adequate preparation of landing zones and to provide additional forces to secure those landing zones since the onemy can more easily predict the location of and plan counter measures against airmobile operations.

(2) Operations conducted in particularly thick jungle that greatly roduces the rate of movement of a ground force require that the force be of sufficient size and strength to enable it to successfully fight an enemy of greater size for the period of time needed to reinforce the elements in contact. During Operation BIL INGS, 1st Infantry Division units were instructed to conduct operation in no less than two company strength.

(3) Captured VC documents indicate future tactical innovations to be conducted by the VC;

(a) The use of a smell decoy force to lure US units into an ambush by VC major forces.

(b) Emphasis upon attacking US forces during airmobile

(c) An intensification in the conduct of raids and ambushes.

(d) Increased emphasis upon the destruction of the initial element of an airbobile assault. Such tactics require that increased emphasis on vigilance, control, and security be exercised by commanders of all levels.

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(4) Poor weather conditions, especially low coilings, that frequently occur during the monsoon secson may require airmobile operations to be delayed in order to insure continued and adequate air support.

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Annex B (Intelligence) to After Action Report for OP BILLINGS. (U)

- 1. (C) Intelligence prior to operation: Frior to OP HILLINGS intelligence reports indicated that since the 1st of April 1967, there had been numerous reported VC unit sightings in the area of interest. Significant sightings occurred east of the SONG BE and in an area approximately 5km NW of PHUOC VINH. Since the 1st of April, there have been reported a total of 7 battalion, 9 Regiment and 1 Div Ho unit sightings. In addition to these sightings, several actual contacts in the area of interest were made by friendly units during the month of April. These contacts were with four separate battalion size units and one regimental size unit. Current intelligence indicates that elements of the 9th VC Div will present the major threat to US operations. The 271st Regt was the most probable main force unit that US units would likely incounter. This unit could have been, as in the past, supported by the 84-A NVA Arty Regt. Numerous local guerrilla units were known to be in the operational area. Reinforcing VC elements could come from the 273d Regt and the PHU LOI En within 24-36 hours.
- 2. (C) Enemy situation during the Operation: Initially, during OF BILLINGS, enemy contact was sniper and small unit activity. On the morning of 17 June a small element of US troops made contact with a squed of VC, 4 were killed. A search of their packs revealed that they were members of the 271st Regt. In the afternoon of 17 June two US Infantry Bettalions were moving from south to north into a landing zone. As the two battalions premared to dig in for the evening, they began to receive sporadic enemy fire from the west. The enemy fire built up rapidly and soon a main VC attack was launched from the north. A secondary attack was launched from the south minutes later. Small unit probing by the VC was conducted all around the landing zone. Snipers from the trees began to fire into the landing zone. Sixty mm mortars positioned about 600 meters northeast of the landing zone began firing into the area. The contact lasted for about 30 minutes. A cuick search of the wood line around the landing zone yielded a wounded VC. Through interrogation and from documents in his possession it was determined that the 1st Bn of the 271 VC Regt launched the attack. The wounded PW stated that his unit was to assemble approximately 4km northwest of the landing zone. Documents taken from a dead VC contained a sketch map of a stream line with unit identification indicating their assembly position. From the information taken from the PW and the sketch maps, the VC assembly area was located and artillery and airstrikes were placed into the area. The rest of the operation did not result in any significant enemy contact.
- 3. (C) We ther and Terrain

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a. Weather: OP BILLINGS was delayed one day due to rain and low overcast. Once the operation began weather was generally good to fair. The mean temperatures during the beriod was 94 degrees high and 74 degrees low. The average relative humidity was 72 per cent. The number of days with visibility restricted to 5 miles or less due to ground fog wes 14 days. The number of days with a edling below 4000 ft. was 14 days. The total amount of rainfall during the operational period was 2.8 inches.

b. Terrain: The most prominent terrain feature in the area of operation is the SDNG BE River, which flows north to south through the western portion of the area. There are also numerous streams in the area that flow generally north and south. Generally, the area is covered by dense jungle east of the SDNG BE. The trees reach a height from 75 to 150 fect tall, well spaced, and have a dense canopy which inhibits the devilopment of undergrowth. Bamboo grows in low wet areas, and is usually very closely spaced with dense canopy. Abandoned rice yaddies are often covered with low, scattered scrub. Observation and fields of fire on the ground was generally poor except in the areas of the abandoned rice paddies. The mincipal cover for both units and CONFIDE/NTIAL

L. (C) CONCEPT OF SUPPORT OPERAIONS

#### A. (C) GENERAL:

The basic concept for logistical support of Operation "BILLINGS" featured supply point distribution of high tonnage items from established base camps at Lai Khe and Photor Vinh as well as unit distribution of class V from Bien Hos Airfield to Fire Support Patrol Base (FSPB) Gunner II at Chi Ling. The impetus of supply was from the rear and focused on maintenance of alequate stocks at forward supply locations to meet peak unit demands without any delay or adverse effect on tactical operations. Resupply of Lai Khe was predominately by land LOC, Phuce Vinh Air LOC exclusively. Through continuous liaison by Support Command Commanders and staff, the ACofS, G4, and the full use of the coordinating problems were identified early or anticipated before they reached a magnitude that hampered tactical disposition. Through the LOCC machinery, corrective action and anticipatory planning was initiated in a timely manner to insure logistical support of all operations.

#### B. (C) FORMARD COMMAND POST:

/ 1. The Support Command Forward Command Post was established and operational in the Logistical Operation Contaction Center (HOCC) 10 June 1967, located at Division Headquarters (forward), Lai Kne. The LOCC function was to coordinate all support rendered and to receive evaluate, consolidate and transmit to Division Logistical Base in Di An or Support elements at Lai Kne and Phuoc Vinh requests for Class I, II, IV, III and maintenance for appropriate action, and through aggresive follow-up action to insure that all valid demands were satisfied in the shortest possible time. The LOCC also served as the focal point for the consolidation of information pertaining to the status of supplies such as consumption receipts, and dues in. This information was translated into concrete planning data to insure the uninterrupted, adequate and timely flow of all classes of supplies to the ultimate consumer. Scheduling and controlling of fixed wing airlift for division support was performed in the LOCC.

#### 1. ' 1st Supply and Transport Battalion:

a. The activities of the lst Supply and Transport Battalion were controlled by the Battalion Commander through his staff and subordinate commanders. The Battalion CP was located at Di And Operation of the permanent Forward Supply Sections at LB: The end Endo Vin and the CBC aircraft refueling point at Chi Linh were controlled that notadi, routise member. Telephone communications were maintained with the Battalion Headquarters at Di An and frequent visits to the forward areas by the Battalion Commander and his representatives provided timely and decisive action which insured expeditious handling of supply actions. The office of the Division Supply Officer served as the focal point for the coordination of the logistical support rendered by the Supply and Transport Battalion and consolidation of information pertaining to the status of Class I, IL&IV,III and certain services in the forward areas. Here, date on econsumption, receipts and amounts on hand was gathered and considered with the tactical situation, locations of unit and planned movement of units, to insure the efficient uninterrupted flow of adequate supplies to the forward areas. In addition, an Assistant S-3 was located with the LOCC at the Division Forward Command Post for liaison with the Support Command Staff and the G-u.

b. The battalion concept of supply and service support for Operation "BILLINGS" involved utilization of established Forward Supply Sections at Fnuce Vinn and Lai Khe base camps. All units participating in the operation were supported with Class I, Class III and Class IIAIV from those two locations. In addition, a refueling point was established at Chi Linh to provide a convenient refueling location within the operational area for command and control aircraft. Adequate stocks were maintained at Lai Khe by Land LOC from 1st Log Command

CONFIDENTIAL activities located in the Satgon-Long Binh logistical complex and the battalion main supply facility at Di An. AF aircraft ware utilized on a non-scheduled basis 14 to supply both high tormage and fast moving Class IIAIV items to Phuoc Vinh. Class III and limited amounts of Class IIAIV howston retented III and limited amounts of Class II&IV barrier material were supplied by air to Chil Linh, Normal frag of AF sireraft provided Class III and A rations to Phuce Vinh, Normal frag of AF aircraft and LOC were utilized to provide A rations at Lai Khe.

c. The battalion maintained the capacity to provide emergency refueling in isolated field locations and to expand existing Class III facilities on short notice to support air-lift airmobile assault operations for the duration of the operation.

e. A combination of ares and unit support was used during this operation. Class I and II&IV supplies were normally provided on a unit basis. Class III and GR REG service were normally provided on an area basis. Salvage collection was accomplished on an area basis utilizing internal transporation assets.

#### 1. Lai Khe

a. Unit support was provided for Class I and Class IIAIV while Class III, GR REG and salwage collection were provided on an area basis.

b. Lana and air LOC were utilized for resupply.

#### 2. Phuoc Vinhs

a. Unit support was provided for Class I and Class II&IV while Class III, salvage collection and GR REG service were provided on an area basis.

#### 3. Chi Linh

a. Area Class III support was provided for command and control aircraft, Other Class III Products and Class II&IV barrier material were also provided on an area basis.

#### b. Air LOC was used exclusively for resupply.

#### 2. 701st Maintenance Battalion

a. Due to the small number of units involved in the operation and their proximity to division base camps and forward support companies, no permanent contact teams were established. Small, mission oriented assistance teams were sent out on specific missions when required, to fire support patrol bases and other locations.

#### b. Forward support companies rendered support to their normal customers. Ŧ"Ŧ

c. Airerals support was affected from CO Erst Phu Loi, and contact teams were sent on request to on-site locations. 20 such visits were made during the period.

#### 3. 1st Medical Battalion:

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The 1st Medical Battalion provided medical support to the division from the following locations: "B" Company from their base camp at Lai Ene. On 17 June 1967, "B" Company dispatched a "GO TEAN" to the vicinity of XT958676. This team returned to base camp at Lai Khe on 18 June 1967. "C" Company supported the operation with a forward medical team at Quan Loi. This team was moved to Quan Loi on 11 June 1967, and returned to their base amp at Di an on 26 June 1967. "D" Company supported the operation from their base camp at Phouc Vinh. All medical companies had "GO TEANS" ready to move "on order." Resupply to these medical companies was by air. The infantry units were resupplied the rectly from the medical companies at Lai Khe, Phoud Vinh, and the division medical supply located at Di An.

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#### 4. Division Trensportation Office

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a. The Division Transportation Office was organised into a forward and rear element. The forward element, located at the LOCC and consisting of the Division Transportation officer and the Assistant Division Transportation Officer, scheduled and controlled all fixed wing airlift for the division support. This included both tactical troop lift and logistical lift.

b. The rear element in Di An was responsible for setting up convoys for movement to the various forward locations. This included scheduling convoys, contacting all participating units, briefing convoy commanders, and assisting the military police in traffic control and in the establishment of convoy discipline for units departing Di An. The CTA aircraft traffic, under the direction of the DTO, was controlled by the Di An Airfield personnel.

#### 5. Division Ammanition Office

a. Class V support was provided through forward distribution points (FDP) at Lai Khe and Phoue Vinh and through unit distribution by Air Force air to FSFB Gunner II at Chi Linh. The Lai Khe FDP was resupplied by periodic Log Command convoys from Long Binh. BOD service was provided by a team from the L2nd EOD Detainment positioned at Lai Khe.

b. Assumition supply service to the division was controlled by the DAO whose buse of operation was in the LOCC at Danger Forward in Lai Kne. The DAO was assisted in the LOCC by three enlisted men. Two enlisted men from the DAO section assisted in operating each of the forward distribution points, at

Lai the and Phoue Vinh. Stockage of the FDR's was coordinated by the DAO-LOCC and the ADAO at Long Binh.

Operation "BILLINGS" was by air LOC.

#### D. ACMORNERAL SUPPORT AND RESUPPLY SOURCESS

#### 1. 1st Supply and Transport Battalion:

The lst Supply and Transport Battalion used its normal resupply sources throughout the operation. Requirements of supported units were routed to - the Division Supply Office at Di An. For those items not available and for anticipated requirements, a request was placed on the 505th Field Depot in Saigon.

2. 701st Maintenanco Battalion

The majority of parts were obtained from the 506th Depot in Saigon, although some parts were obtained from the 185th, 725th and 610th Mainttenance Battalions,

Je lat Medical Battailon:

The advance platoon of the 32nd Medical Depot provided medical resupply to the division from its location in Saigon. Patient care was provided by the 24th Evacuation Hospital and the 93rd Evacuation Hospital located at Long Binh. Aeromedical evacuation was provided by the Air Ambulance Company (Prov) by locating two (2) standby "Dust offs" at Phone Vinh.

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#### 5. Division Ammunition Offices

The Long Binh Ammunition Depot, operated by the 3rd Ord En, provided ammunition by unit distribution to the Lai Khe FDP and to FSFB Gunner II. Ammunition for the Phoue Vinh FDP had been prestocked during the Phoue Vinh resupply convoys during the period 25 May through 1 June.

#### E. (C) UNIT RESUPPLY CONCEPTS

### 1. 1st Supply and Transport Battalion

Supply point distribution was provided throughout the operation. Init trains were located vicinity Lai Khe or Phuoc Vinh. Units received supplies at the lst Supply and Transport Battalion Forward Supply Sections at these two locations. An exception to thus method of resupply was the delivery of Class II& IV barrier material to Chi Linhe

2. 701st Maintenance Battalion

No significant tonnages were moved to the forward contact teams. The forward support companies continued to support their normal customers.

3. 1st Medical Battalion

Medical resupply to infantry units of the division was by supply point distribution. Units desiring supplies brought requests to the medical company providing support. The supplies are issued and the requestor would return to his unit with the m. tical supplies.

4. Division Amminition Office



Class I was available for issue at both Phuoc Vinh and Lai Khe and was based on ration requests from using units. No new trends were noted during Operation BILLINGS. Analysis of Class III Consumption trends for Operation BILLINGS, reveaued no particular variation from what had been anticipated. The nature of the operational area and its distance from established base camps precluded the general use of both tracked and wheeled vehicles. This was one variation from recent operations in which mechanised and armored calvary units were used extensively and was reflected by increased consumption of aviation fuels and a proportionate decrease in mogas and diesel consumption. Consumption of aviation fuels at the C&C aircrait refueling point at Chi Linh was higher than anticipated because refueling at that location was not limited to C&C aircraft as directed in the logistics annex to OPORU BILLINGS. This can be attributed to the general knowledge that the refueling point when and where meded rather than directing aircraft to other locations. Mogas und diesel consumption at Lai Khe remained about normal due to the displacement of Danger Forward to that location.

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## III LOGISTICAL PROBLEMS

## A. ITEM: Limitations of forward airstrips.

DISCUSSION: Both Chi Linh (Cao Song Be) and Dong Xoai (Tak Xa) airstrips were insufficient to handle the volume of air traffic programmed into those locations during the operation. The Chi Linh airstrip was able to handle two (2) aircraft on the ground at the same time, and the Dong Xoai airstrip was capable of handling only one (1) C-123 aircraft at a time. The volume of traffic flown into these two locations caused many lifts to extend into night-time operations. Flying conditions were marginal at both airstrips during those periods of time and operations were limited by bad weather.

RECOMMENDATION: Added engineer effort must be placed on improving the airfields for future operations involving a heavy volume of air traffic. Special emphasis on aprons and turn-arounds would increase the capabilities of the airstrips to handle more aircraft and in many cases, allow a lift to be completed during daylight hours.

B. ITEM: The lack of sufficient "Stockage in depth" at Chi Linh led to several emergency airlifts of ammunition.

DISCUSSION: There was no build-up of stocks at Chi Linh prior to the start of the operation, for reasons of security, in an attempt to enhance the element of suprise. 18 tubes of 105 Howitzers, 8 each 4.2" tubes and 2 each 155mm tubes were lifted into Chi Linh with a basic load of ammunition. The plan was to build-up the stocks to a comfortable level over a three day period, however, the battle of 14 June prevented this. An ER (Emergency requisition) was called to replenish 5000 rds of 105 ammunition which was expended over a 6 hour period. Three days later the battle of 17 July ensued. During this action over 10,000 rds of 105 HE was fired during a 12 hour period in support of the units in contact. This required another ER lift of ammunition from Bien Hoa.

RECOMMENDATION: Whenever possible, stocks of artillery ammunition must be built up to a comfortable level prior to the start of an operation. This is particularly essential when resupply is dependent on strict air IOC.

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# IV (C) LESSONS LEARNED NFIDENTIAL

A. Prior to the start of any operation involving the support of two or more Artillery batteries by Air LOC, contingency stocks of ammunition should be brought in during the build-up phase if the situation permits.

B. Reliable radio communications at both departure airfield (Bien Hoa) and the receiving airfield is imperative when supplying ammunition on an Air LOC. This was handled effectively during operation "BILLINGS" with a mobile AE/ GRC 106 radio set at Bien Hoa and a similar set at Chi Linh. The airfield radio should be netted with the LOCC and with the DAO Office at Long Binh.

C. When it is anticipated that large tonnages of ammunition will be moved by air, particulary on a CE or ER, always have the DTO alert the 48th TC group so that adequate surface transportation will be made available to move the ammunition from Long Binh to the Air Base.

2. (U) DATES OF OPERATION: 11 June - 26 June 1967.

3. (C) <u>GENERAL</u>: The 1st Infantry Division Artillery was the artillery command headquarter for the operation. The 1/5 Artillery was in Direct Support of the 1st Bde and was responsible for planning and control of fires. The 2/33 Artillery was in Direct Support of the 3d Ede (Forward) and was responsible for planning and control of fires. The 1/7 Artillery was in Direct Support of the 2d Ede and the 6/15 Artillery was in Direct Support of the 3d Ede (LAI KHE). Missions and Task organization were specified in Annex C (Fire Support Plan) to OPORD 15-67 (OP BILLINGS). In order to support the scheme of maneuver, 4 Fire Support Bases were established: GUNNER I vio 995546; GUNNER TI vic 925733; GUINER III vic 063754; and GUNNER WHITE vic 004609. Reinforcing fires were available from PHUOC VINH and QUAN LOI by 6/27 Arty.

4. (C) <u>INTEDDIGENCE</u>: See Annex 1, OPERD 15-67 (OP BILLINGS). Intelligence gained from VR by Division \_rtillery air observers was negligible. Heavy jungle canopy restricted effective observation. Difficulty of locating base camps until they were opened by irtillery or air was a major difficulty met in this operation. The enemy situation, terrain and weather, and fortifications encountered did not materially effect the artillery support plan.

5. (C) MISSION: 1st Infantry Division artillery provides artillery support for maneuver elements. 1/5 Artillery and 2/33 Artillery plans and coordinates fires for their brigade operational areas.

6. (C) <u>CONCEPT OF OPERATION</u>: All artillery units moved to field positions to occupy Fire Support Bases GUINER I and GUNNER II on 11 and 12 June 1967. Units were prepared to ostablish additional Fire Support Bases to support the plan of maneuver.

7. (c) EXECUTION:

a. 11 June: B/1/5 irty occupied FSB GUNNER I. 12B/2/33 irty occupied FSB GUNNER II.

8. (U) DNIF STRATIVE MATTERS:

a. Class I supplies were drawn from each unit base camp and flown to the field positions by CH-47.  $\frac{1}{2}$  ations were prepared in PHUOC VINH and meals flown to field location by resupply UHID.

b. Class II and IV items were obtained from the forward support companies which were airlifted to the field locations.

c. Class III supplies were provided in field location by the S and T Battalion.

d. Class V was air lifted into all Fire Support Bases. Prestocking of ammunition at the Special Forces Camp at CHI LINH was not completed prior to the start of the execrise. Resupply of ammunition was primarily by fixed wing aircraft directly from LONG BINH. During the battle of 17 June a combat emergency was declared to replenish the Class V supplies at FSB GUNNER II.

e. Maintenance contact teams were made available to repair deadlined **items** in the field locations.

9. (C) <u>CONMANDERS AN LYSIS</u>: This operation was easily supported and once the operation began a minimum displacement of artillery was required. All displacements with the exception of GUNNER I ware accomplished by air. Weather and the shortage of sircraft caused some moves to be slower than desired. The availability of artillery enabled establishing priorities of fire on a basis of a minimum of one battery per maneuver battalion. This greatly expedited the rapid delivery of fires. Aerial observation was maintained at all times the maneuver battalions were outside their NDP. This also expedited rapid delivery of observed fire. The DS Battalions headquarters was located so as to effectively control all artillery fires.

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## 10. (C) CONCLUSIONS AND LESSONS LEARNED:

a. At remote FSBs the level of ammunition stockage must be maintained at a high-enough level to allow for contact missions. Even through the use of a Combat Emergency considerable time is envolved in un-programed ammunition resupply.

b. Height of Jungle Canopy must be considered by all observer and Fire Direction personnel when firing close support fires. The combination of very tall trees and nor al moresion errors may cause rounds to burst far short of the interded point of impact.

c. Forward observers, Liaison officers, and FDC personnel must keep themselves cantinually abreast of friendly troop disposition at all times.

d. The ground commander securing FSB, the S3 of the artillery and the Battery Commanders of Batteries that will occupy th, base must discuss the organization of the base prior to occupation. The artillery commander must be allowed to position his battery, commensurate with his mission and capabilities, within the FSB. Once this has been accomplished coordination for the remaining forces occupying the FSB may be accomplished.

#### 4. INTELLIGENCE:

a. Intelligence prior to operation.

(1) The area of interest is divided by Route 13, which runs from the Cambodian border in the North to the lower limits of the operational area in the South. On the Eastern sector the Song Be dominates the terrain, whereas the Song Saigon occupies the Western area of interest. Foth rivers are navigable year around, and together with Route 13, provide the VC with excellent transportation routes for movement of troops and supplies. The area is predominantly covered with broadleaf, evergreen secondary forests with large rubber plantations located at Michelin, Minh Thanh, An Loc, Quan Loi, and Loc Ninh.

The main force units likely to be encountered in the operational area are the 271st, 272nd, 273rd, and 101st NVA Regts, supported by the elements of the 69th Arty Group. The 52nd, 141st, and Phu Loi Bns could possibly be encountered in a reinforcing role.

b. These units can be considered capable of launching a multi-regimental attack against US elements in the Bin Long Province area. In addition they pose a continual threat with their capability of conducting attacks against convoys or against MDP positions and Fire Support Patrol Pases throughout the area of operation.

(g) Numerous other mines reported through infantry channels.

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(2) Company C received small arms and mortar fire on several occasions.

(3) There were 10 aerial reconnaissance flights in addition to daily command and control flights in the operational area.

(4) The 1st Engineer Battalion lost the following equipment due to hostile mortar fire: 1 chain saw, 1 M16 rifle, 1 .45 cal pistol, 6 protective masks, 2 M79's, 10 ponchos, 7 bayonets and scabbards.

5. MISSION: 1st Engineer Battalion supports 1st Infantry Division operation by opening and maintaining MSRs, clearing Fire Support Patrol Pases, clearing jungle, providing LZ cutting teams, and other combat support.

6. CONCEPT OF OPERATION:

a. 1st Engineer Battalion supported 1st Infantry Division units engaged in Operation Billings with two companies.

b. Company A was charged with opening and maintaining Rte LTL-1A from Phuoe Vinh to FSPB Gunner I (XT 995545), clearing that base for artillery, clearing fields of fire, clearing jungle along Rte LTL-1A north of FSPB Gunner I, and maintaining two LZ teams on standby.

c. Company C provided engineer teams to cut fields of fire and to clear artillery positions, and maintained two LZ teams on standby.

d. Company B continued its support of the 2nd Brigsdes Operation Lam Son with Revolutionary Development engineer work and jurgle clearing.

e. Companies D, E, and Hqs, continued general support of the division.

7. EXECUTION:

11 June 67:

C Company - Two squads from the 3rd platoon departed Lai the via IV-1D helicopters at 09004 9 June 67 for FSPB Gunner II vic XT 915735, closing at 1000 hours. These two squads immediately started to improve the L7 by removing large trees. The trees cut were used for overhead cover. At 1700 hours all positions had some overhead cover. On 10 June these same units continued to improve their positions, placed overhead cover, and cut fields of fire. On 11 June Operation Billings officially started. The two souads completed cutting fields of fire and improved positions by placing sandbags and camouflaging the positions.

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#### <u>12 June 67:</u>

A Company - 1st platoon constructed resupply L7 for 1st Rn, 2nd Inf at XT 975625. 2nd platoon constructed resupply LZ for 1st Rn, 28th Inf at XT 935570. 3rd platoon opened the road from XT 972493 to XT 995543. No mines were encountered. Cleared 100,000 square meters of jungle for fields of fire at FSFB Gunner I, XT 995545. Commenced construction of vehicle turnaround for resupply vehicles at FSFB Gunner I.

C Company - 1st platoon departed Lai Khe at0800 hours via UP-1D helicopters closing LZ Rufe (XT 952664) at 0830 hours. The platoon cut fields of fire and constructed mortar positions for 1st Bn, 16th Inf. 2nd platoon departed Lai Khe at 0830 hours, closing LZ Rufe at 0900 hours. This platoon cut fields of fire and constructed mortar positions for 2nd Bn, 28th Inf. Both platoons were extracted and flown to Lai Khe at 1200 hours; the 1st platoon by UH-1D helicopters and the 2nd platoon by CH-47 helicopter.

#### <u>13 June 67:</u>

A Company - 1st platoon cut a 400'x450' resupply L? vic YT 973628 for 1st Bn, 2nd Inf and cut a 50'x50' L2 vic XT 973628 to be used by VIP's. The 2nd platoon was on L2 standby during the morning. At 1300 hours, 2nd platoon was moved by UH-1D helicopters to vic YT 952664 to cut an L7 for 1st Bn, 16th Inf. The 3rd platoon maintained 1700 meters of road from "T 995543 to XT 992523; also cleared jungle 50 meters on each side of this road.

C Company - The 1st and 2nd platoons were airlifted via UP-1D to L7 Rufe and continued work for 1st En, 16th Inf, and 2nd En, 28th Inf.

#### 14 June 67:

A Company - The 1st platoon cleared jungle near L7 Foxtrot, YT 973-628. The 2nd platoon cut L2 Rufe, YT 952664, in support of C Co, 1st Engr Bn. They cut fields of fire 800 meters by 20 meters and blew 20 trees to clear mortar positions. The 3rd platoon cleared 2,000 square meters of virgin jungle at Fire Support Patrol Base Gunner I, maintained road from Phuoc Vinh to Gunner I, and cleared jungle along the same length of road.

C Company - The 1st platoon departed Lai Yhe at 0700 hours via UH-1D to improve LZ Yankee (XT 946650) for 1st Bn, 16th Inf. The 2nd platoon departed Lai Khe via UH-1D at 1000 hours for LZ Rufe and continued to clear fields of fire for 2nd Bn, 28th Inf. The 2nd platoon was extracted at 1730 hours and 1st platoon was extracted at 1830 hours via UH-1D.

#### 15 June 67:

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A Company - The 1st platoon improved L7 Foxtrot and improved fields of fire at the NDP for 1st Bn, 2nd Inf. The 2nd platoon worked on base camp development, operated the laterite pit at Fhuoc Vinh, repacked the platoon LZ kit, and performed normal maintenance on platoon equipment. The 3rd platoon performed road maintenance from XT 992512 to XT 997550 (600 meters), cleared 175,000 square meters of jungle and improved Gunner I FSFB.

C Company - The 1st platoon was on immediate L7 standby and the 2nd platoon was 21 one hour LZ standby.

#### 16 June 67:

A Company - The 1st platoon continued to improve L7 Foxtrot for the 1st Bn, 2nd Inf. In addition they discovered and destroyed a VC base camp containing three buildings, 50 bushels of rice (booby trapped), VC shoes, and uniforms at XT 924547. The 2nd platoon worked on base camp construction. The 3rd platoon performed road maintenance from XT 992512 to YT 998550, hauled 16 loads of laterite, cleared 136,000 square meters of jungle and continued to improve Gunner I FSFB.

C Company - The 1st platoon departed Lai Khe at 1000 hours for L7 vray (XT 959680). Upon arrival at L2 X-ray they enlarged and improved it by cutting isolated trees. 't 1230 hours a fire fight broke out at the northeast corner of the LZ. By 1500 hours, contact with the enemy was broken and the LZ mission continued. /t 4730 hours the platoon was returned to Lai Khe by UH-1D.

#### 17 June 67:

A Company - The 1st platoon was on LZ standby. They repacked the platoon LZ kit, checked the chain saws, and moved to YT 003615. The 2nd platoon was on LZ standby. They repacked the platoon LZ kit and prepared to move to LZ X-ray. The 3rd platoon performed maintenance on the road from XT 092512 to YT 000555 (6,400 meters), hauled 30 loads of laterite, and cleared 60,000 square meters of jungle.

C Company - The 2nd platoon departed Lai Yhe for L7 Y-ray and improved the L2 for 1st Bn, 18th Inf. At 1000 hours the 1st platoon was moved by UH-1D into LZ X-ray to clear fields of fire for the 1st Pn, 18th Inf. At 1530 hours the 2nd platoon moved from L7 X-ray to support 1st Pn, 28th Inf at LZ Yankee (XT 952664) where they cleared fields of fire. Poth platoons were returned to Lai Khe at 1800 hours.

#### 18 June 67:

A Company - The 1st platoon cut overhead cover for 1st Pn, 2nd Inf, (YT 003675), returning to Phuoc Vinh at approximately 1505 hours. The 2nd platoon was on immediate LZ standby, worked on construction projects in the base camp areas, and furnished truck drivers to 3rd platoon. The 3rd platoon improved artillary positions at FSPB Gunner I, cleared 660 square meters of jungle, and performed road maintenance from XT 992512 to YT 000555 (6,400 meters).

C Coupany - LZ standby teams were provided to support the remainder of the operation.

#### 19 June 67:

A Company - The 1st platoon worked on construction projects in the base camp, performed maintenance on the platoon's equipment, and furnished vehicles with drivers to 3rd platoon. The 2nd platoon was on L7 standby. At 1500 hours it moved to Gunner III (YT 062754) to cut overhead cover for 1st Bn, 16th Inf. The 3rd platoon cleared 90,000 square meters of jungle vic YT 002596, hauled 33 loads of laterite for access roads at Gunner J. Two mines were located; one a 105 mm round with pressure detonator at VT 003561; the second was a butterfly bomb at XT 994596. Foth mines were detonated in place.

#### 20 June 67:

A Company - The 1st platoon was on L2 standby, performed maintenance on platoon equipment, checked chain saws, and repacked the L7 kit. The 2nd platoon remained at Gunner III cutting overhead cover for 1st En, 16th Inf. The 3rd platoon performed maintenance on the road from XT 992512 to YT 000-555, hauled 33 loads of laterite, cleared 60,000 square meters of jungle, and cleared fields of fire for the artillery.

#### 21 June 67:

A Company - The 1st platoon was on LZ standby, checked out the chain saws, and worked on construction projects in Fhuoe Vinh. The 2nd platoon romained at Gunner III clearing fields of fire for 1st Bn, 16th Inf. #### 11. COMMANDER'S ANALYSIS:

a. The operation was successful from an engineer standpoint. There were no new problem areas or new enemy techniques encountered. An excess of equipment was taken onone of the initial L7 missions. This can be avoided by making advance aerial reconnaissance of the mission area. Such reconnaissance should be and is made when aircraft availability and time allow.

b. The importance of the two man cross cut saw in the L7 kit was made evident early in this operation. Chain saws are almost totall ineffective in cutting trees 35" or greater in diameter. Escause of the proximity of friendly troops and the quantity of explosives needed to fell a tree of this size, use of demolitions was restricted.


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
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

2. (U) DATES OF OPERATION: 110550 June 1967 to 261838 June 1967.

(C) GENERAL: The control and command headquarters for this operation was 1st Brigade Headquarters with task organization as stated in OPORD 14-67 (Operation BILLINGS). The operation w.s. conducted in the area north and north-west of rHOUC VINH. 10 Bde secured FDE to FSB Gunner 1 (XT995545) while continuing the security of MUOC HOA bridge, MOUC VINH and maintaining tactical overwatch of the 1st Brigade TAOI. The plan envisioned by the commander, divided the operation into three phases. During Phase I, units were positioned in the area of operations with the 2/16 Inf securing Pheue VINH and securing Phulos Holder bridge with 1 company. 1/26 Inf moved securing THOUG VINH and BBCUring THOUG HOA Bridge with 1 company. 1/26 Inf moved securing the route to FSB Gunner 1 (XT9954) with B 1/4 Calvery attached and secured F3D1 itself. B 1/5 Arty and B 8/6 Arty moved to F3B Gunner 1; repared to fire LZ prep and support the sirmobile assaults of 1/2 and 1/28 Inf. Alter a 24 hour weather delay, the 1/2 and 1/28 Infantry conducted airmobile assaults in to LZ FOXTROT and GOLF respectively conducting SED consistions much to establishing NDDIE. During share II write conducted S&D operations prior to establishing NDP's. 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4. (C) INTELLIGENCE.

a. Intelligence prior to the operation: Intelligence reports, capturel documents, agent and local intelligence indicated that within the A0 the arimary threat was the 271 VC Regt, which had been located (XT8867) for over a month. Its heavy losses during operations against 1/26 (Operation JUNCTION CITY - 2) a peared to have been offsot by subsequent, replacements of personnel and equipment. Contact with Special Forces SIGM units in May revealed units in the area, very probably of the 271 Regt, were aggressive, well trained, and well equipped. Inditations were that the 271 Regt could be roinforced by the 272 as well as the 273 Regt. In addition, a two battalion VC force reported by SIGMA elements 16 May (YT1457) could reinforce the 271 Regt. Other indications were that Local force units up to plateon size and possibly Company size could be expected to be operating in the A:0. There were 21 Blood hound reports from within the A.O. during the period 24 May to 6 June 1967.

b. Enemy Situation During Operation: The VC evaded major contact, and minor contacts experienced during the operation failed to indicate any particular unit. The VC employed limited sniping, hit and run tactics by squad or smaller size units. Numerous trails prevailed in the area with a variety of booby traps and mines. Most of the trails in the area appeared to have been recently used and ran north to south.

c. Weather and Terrain: Rainfall was heavy during the first two days of oper-tions, then slackened to occasional showers throughout the day. Fog was provalent during early morning hours but dissipted early, usually before 0900 H. Terrain consisted of heavy jungle in most ereas with scattered areas of secondary growth. However, in the 1/28 Inf zone, the terrain was generally dominated by scattered abandoned rice paddies which were covered with secondary growth and bamboo in the low wet areas. Trees thoughout the area were estimated to be 75 to 100 feet tall. With the exception of the initial 24 hour delay, neither the weather nor the terrain had any significant effect on the operation.

d. Fortifications: The fortifications encountered varied from 2 man fighting positions to 10 man fighting positions some with overhead cover others without. The larger overhead positions generally had firing ports for 10 personnel and were covered with up to six (6) layers of logs and up to twelve (12) inches of dirt.

Arty remained in DS of 1st Bde. 1-A1 Engr cleared resuply L2 for 1/2 Inf 400' x 450' (XT973628). 3-A1 Engr cleared 1700,000 square meters virgin jungle for fields of fire at Gunner 1 and maintained 1700 meters at road from (XT995543) to (XT992523) while clearing 50 meters each side of same length of road.

c. 14 June 1967: 1st Brigade continued Operation BILLINGS conducting search and destroy operations in zone while securing PHNCC VINH base camp, PHOUC HOA bridge, FSB Gunner 1 and overwatching Brigade TACI. At 1055H, aerial observers from 1/28 Inf located base camp at (XT952567). From 1100 H to 1238 H 1/26 Inf conducted a MEDCAP in village of THUCC VANG treating 15 persons. At 1107H, A 1/28 (XT9350580) found 15 fuze wells from 82mm mortor and nine cans used for carrying small arms ammo. At 1306H, A 1/28 (XT925582) found three Z shaped trenches approximately 30 feet in length. At 1311 H A 1/28 (XT925581) located eight bunkers w/overhead cover. At 1331H, Recon 1/2 Inf while departing the NDP for a patrol received automatic weapons fire and sighted 3 VC dressed in black pajamas (XT969621). Fire was returned with unknown results. A 1/2 Inf was moved in as RRF while Arty and 2 airstrikes were placed in area with unknown results. At 1352H, A 1/28 located (XT925581)-one entrenching tool, one (1) cigarette lighter and one (1) one man fighting position. 1/28 placed out 3 AP's with no enemy contact. 1-A1 Engr cleared jungle near LZ FOXTROT (XT973628), 3-A1 Engr cleared 2000 meters of virgin jungle at FSB Gunner 1, maintained road from PHUCC VINH to Gunner 1 and eleared jungle along same length of road. Arty remained in DS of 1st Brigade operations.

d. 15 June 1967: 1st Brigade continued operation BILLINGS conducting search and destroy operations in zone, local patrols, security of PHUCC VINH and PHOUC HOA bridge while maintaining overwatch of Brigade TAOI, with no enemy contact. At 0955H, an air strike was placed in (XT965584) resulting in two (2) bunkers destroyed and an additional 6 bunkers and two (2) huts uncovered. At 1105H, an outpost of 1/26 Inf (XT994525) heard what appeared to be an individual moving through the undergrowth. Individual was taken under fire and fled to the east. His trail was found but nothing further. At 1105H, C 1/26 Inf located a well used trail (YTO07556) large enough for carts, but snowing no signs of use. At 0037 H an ambush patrol from A 1/26 Inf reported movement closing in on them from two sides. Mortors wore fired with unknown results. The movement ceased. At 0842 H, B 1/26 Inf found and destroyed a 15 pound homemade anti-tank mine with pressure fuze. At 0957H, an airstrike (XT994584) resulted in the destruction of 12 foxholes and 4 bunkers. At 1130H 1/28 (-) commenced movement to new NDP closing at 1605 H with no contact. At 1152H, A 1/26 located a well used footpath on a 330 degree azimuth (XT93556) and at 1418H, located a second trail (XT994560). At 1418H, a patrol from A 1/2 saw two (2) VC and took them under fire (XT965628) with unknown results. C 1/2 located a tunnel and two (2) tons of rice (XT965627). Rice was destroyed. 1-A1 Engr continued improving IZ FOXTROT and discovered VC base camp consisting of 3 hutches, 50 bushels of rice (booby traped), VC shoes and uniforms. location (XT992512) All were destroyed. 2-A1 Engr (XT992512) - (XT998550). Hauled 16 loads of laterite, cleared 136,000 square meters of virgin jungle and cleared fields of fire at FSE Gumer 1. 2/16 Mortors were fired with unknown results. The movement ceased. At approximately 1430 H friendly arty (XT998617) resulted in 8 wounded, 7 were evacuated. At 1512H, (XT943548) A 1/28 located two (2) cooking areas. At 1550H, 1/28 received warning order to be prepared to deploy to 3rd Brigade operational area under the control of the 3rd Brigade. 3 AP's were established with no contact. At 1920H, (XT994521) an LOH crashed. The LOH was secured for the night by elements of A 1/26 Inf with 2 APC's and 2 gun jeeps. 1-A1 Engr was on LZ standby, and hed packed LZ rad and checked chain saws prior to moving to (YTCO3615). 2-A1 Engr IZ standby, repacked IZ pad and prepared to move to IZ X-Ray (XT967682). 3-A1 Engr maintained 6,400 meters of road from (XT992512) to (YT000555), hauled 30 loads of laterite, cleared 60,000 square meters of virgin jungle. 2/16 Inf continued RRF and security mission. 6th Bn, 27th Arty displaced the 8" platoon from C 6/27 Arty to FSB Gunner 1 (XT9954) to provide additional coverage for Infantry bettalions working in the 3d Brigade AO. Closing at 1855 H.

18 June 1967: 1st Brigade continued operation BILLINGS. At 0705H; 1/28 Inf commenced airlift from its NDP to CAU SUNG BE (XT931724) closing at 0900 H. 1/2 Inf conducted local patrols with no enemy contact. At 1210H, C 1/26 located an oxcart trail (XT993557). At 1227H, 1/28 Inf commenced airlift from CAU SUNG BE to (XT955725) closing at 1220H, and establishing an NDP. At 1440H, a strong point from B 1/28 (XT945728) made contact with four (4) VC engaging VC with M-79 and small arms fire. Light fire employed with unknown results. At 1506 H elements of B 1/4 Cavalry a sisted in rescue from a mine field vicinity JUNGLE DEVIL RANGE, four (4) personnel of 1/16 Inf results 1 killed and 2 wounded from 1/16 Inf. Vehicles detonated 33 mines during the operation with negative damage to vehicles. 2/16 Inf continued security mission of PHUOC VINH base camp, iHOUC HOA bridge and remained RRF for 1st Brigade. 1-A1 Engr cut overhead cover for 1/2 Inf (ITO03675) returning to base camp approximately 1505 H. 2-A1 Engr was on LZ standby. 3-A1 Engr improved gun positions at FSB Gunner 1; cleared 666 square meters of virgin jungle, and maintained road from (XT992:12) to (YT000555). At 0642 H, B 1/26 Inf lotated butterfly bomb (not booby trapped) (XT996546) destroying it in place, At 0726 H, B 1/26 Inf (XT999556) located and destroyed an old (05mm round rigged for pressure detonation; At 0829 H, airstrikes were placed in (XT974537)] Again at 0841 H, airstrikes were placed is same area with unknown results. At 0830 H, C 1/28 Inf (XT954719) located and destroyed a VC bibydle and poncho. At 1110 H, and 1330 H, airstrikes were placed in (XT959707) with unknown results. Results (2 VC probable body count) At 1348 H,an airstrike was expended (XT974716) uncovering several tunnels, bunkers, and fighting positions. 1/28 Inf established 3 AP's with no enemy contact. 1/26 Inf remained at PHUOC VINH as DRRF. 1-A1 Engr worked on base camp development, LZ standby and checked out chain saws. 2-A1 Engr cleared fields of fire at (YT062754). 3-A1 Engr cleared 11,250 square meters of virgin jungle, worked on gun pads and hauled 26 loads of laterite for road maintenance. APC hit mine (XT995537) no casualties or damage. Located dud on booby trap (YTO04570), blown in place. (1 VN WHA) 1-A1 Engr LZ standby, 2-A1 Engr located at Gunner III (YTO62754) continued to cut overhead cover and clear jungle around air strip. 3-A1 Engr opened 740, meters of road (XT991511) to (XT999521), cleared 500 square meters of virgin jungle, 100 meters north of Gunner 1 and hauled 100 loads of laterite for 1/26 Inf, 1/28 Inf and OwL CONTROL at 1HUOC VINH base camp.

Operation BILLINGS terminated 261838 June 1967; while the 1st Brigade continued its overwatch of the Brigade TAOI and began preparations for future road clearing operations.

131 (d) Conclusions and Lessons Learned:

a. The mission of destroying VC/NVA forces and installations was accomplished by the destruction of numerous base camps throughout the AO. Although only minor contacts were made, an extensive area was searched and VC/NVA activities within the AO were seriously disrupted.

b. Lessons Learned:

(1) Due to an influx of replacements immediately prior to and during the operation, the need for refinement of the technicues involved in the airmobile assault was apparent.

(2) As evidenced by the operations in the 3rd Bde AO, the VC appear to be using a tactic whereby a considerable force is positioned approximately 500 meters away from the LZ to escape the preparatory fires and then engages the assaulforce after these fires have dissipated.

(3) Command emphasis must continue to be placed upon sterilization of night defensive positions prior to extraction to preclude leaving anything of usable value to VC/NVA forces.

(4) Close coordination must be made by supporting artillery units to insure proper organization of Fire Support Bases so that immediate supporting fires are available as soon after occupation as possible.

1. NAME AND TYPE OF OFERATION: Operation BILLINGS; Search and Destroy.

2. DATES OF OPERATION: 110700 June 1967 to 261838 June 1967.

CENSHAL: Command Headquarters 3d Brigade, 1st Infantry Division. 3. 1st Infantry Division CPORD 15-67 (Operation EILL, NGS) (U); 3d Brigade, 1st Infantry Division OPORD 13-67 (Operation BILLINGS). Operation BILLINGS was conducted in the area of Mostern War Zone D. The 3d B igade plan was to secure FS/PB at GUNNER 2 (IT917734) with one infantry battalion on 11 June; and conduct a multi-battalion combat assault on 13 June 1967; conducting combat reconnaissance in assigned  $\Lambda 0$ ; and to destroy VC/NV/. forces and installations within the operational area.

4. INTELLIGENCE :

a. Intelligence Prior to the Operation: The area of operation was bounded by the following coordinates: XT8245, XT8278, YT1178, and YT1145. Prominent artories of transportation were the Song Be River, which flows N to S along the Western edge of the area, Route LTL 1A, extending diagonally NE to SW across the center and Rte LTL 13 which runs NE to SW along the Northern edge. The area is dominated by secondary forest with considerable wet land rice areas along the numerous streams scattered throughout the area. There are several areas of moderately dense population along the waterways and major roads, with PHUCC VIPH in the South and DON? XOAI in the Northeast being the most prominent. Operation BLUIFFILD was the most recent penetration of a small portion of this area by US Forces. The area was reported to have large and numerous VC base camps, tunnels, food storage areas, fortified positions and other allied installations, with heavy concentrations of installations in the SW and SE quarter of the area. In addition to the 271st VC Regt, reportedly would be MRI Hgs, THU DAU MOT and BINH LONG Province Committees and TAN UTIN, BEN 26T and CHON TUANH District Committees and their

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b. The area of operation was discovered to be a confirmed VC operational area as evidenced by the numerous large base camps found. Additional intelligence information gathered from the USSF Det at CHI LINH confirmed large energy unit sightings and discovories of many base comps. At the onset of the operation, friendly troops did not engage any units, but received small arms sniper fire from

harassing elements and coretaker units in base comps. It was apparent the 271st Regt would defend their positions throughout the general area. An exceptionally large number of trails, both large and small were found throughout the entire operational area, well used and indicating recent use by large and small elements. On 14 June 67, Company B 1-16 Infantry, vicinity XT937669 engaged an estimated V; company believed to be a unit of the 1st E ttali n, 271st VC Regt. The VC were dressed in Khaki uniforms and employed mortars, AW/SA, N-79's, MG and hand grenades. the attack was repulsed with light casualties to friendly troops and 60 VG KHA (B3). During the hours of dorkness, in spite of heavy artillery concentrations in the area, During the nours of darkness, in spice of heavy artillery concentrations in the area, the VC evacuted many of their dead and wounded along with their weapons. On 17 June 67, 1-16 and 2-28 Infantry Battalions vicinity XT958675 were attacked by elements of the 1st & 2d Battalion, 271st VC Regt. The VC were dressed in Khaki uniforms, employed mortars, light and heavy machine gums, AK assault rifle, RPG-2, R.R.'s M-79's, SA and hand grenades. The attack was launched with two assaults from the front and one attack from the West flank, again the VC were repulsed with heavy lesses, 196 VC KHA (BC) and heavy friendly casualties. In both attacks the VG initiated the attacks with SA and M-79 fire, then followed with a withering barrage of mortar fire. During an attempt to remove the dead and wounded from the battlefield, the VC again initiated a mortar barr ge and heavy AW and SA fire, forcing the helicopters to abort their mission. Later during the day, a successful evacuation of the casualties was conducted. Again during the night of 17-18 June 1967, and in spite of heavy friendly artillery fire into the battle area, the VC extracted their dead and wounded along with their weapons. One FW captured confirmed the attacking VC unit as the 2d Battalion, 271st VC Regt comprised of Hqs Company, Cl, C2, C3 and C4. One document taken from the body of a VC, indicated he was the IO of the 2d Company, 1st Battalion, 271st Rogt and gave locations of the units shortly prior to the attack and the meeting places where they would assemble after the engagement. Heavy air and artillery support was rendered in both battles, with heavy AW fire directed at the aircraft. During the ensuing days, many dead VC were found (minus weapons). Some were found in groups indicating their becrers did not have sufficient time to bury them in the face of advancing friendly troops, and others were found in hastily built graves. Numerous trails were also found, many with large blood spots, leading away from the scene of the battle. SLAR and SPAR reports in the following days indic ted the energy movement to be going SW and ME. This was further corroborated by agent reports of eneny groups moving in the same directions carrying wounded on litters. The wsapont captured were in excellent c. Ition, and appeared to be brand new, as was the web equipment. During the remainde: of the operation, the VC probed nightly the LP's, LP's and NDP's of the units, but made no attempt to engage in unit size. On 19 June 1967, Company B 1-18 Infantry vicinity IT951693 entered a base camp which had been previously hit by an airstrike. This base camp contained 35 dead VC and fresh blood trails throughout the ontire camp. Also found were 53 bunkers with overhead cover new camflouage and latrines, along with many purts of bloody clothing and some modicine. It is possible that this base camp may have been used as an aid station or hospital to care for the wounded from the previous major engagement, and as a result of the airstrike; additional VC were killed and the wounded carried off prior to the arrival of friendly troops.

c. The operational area was mostly flat with heavy jungle undergrowth and in many places double canopy jungle. This area offered excellent concellment from the air and it was found to be extremely difficult in spotting base camps from the air or making accurate Bhassessment, except in cases where direct hits had been made and opened up the target. Weather during the first weak of the operation was heavy rainfall, which did not hamper ground operations, but did force aircraft in support to operate under the most extreme conditions.

d. Base camps found throughout the operational area were very well constructed and most appeared to have been used recently. Many of the bunkers had reinforced overhead cover and were well camflourged. Food caches and equiment caches were not found, however, many simplified been sighted along the Song Be River and taken under attack resulting in their destruction. Significant base camps and fortifications found are as indicated:

e. No civilian personnel were encountered by friendly elements in their maneuver area during the course of the operation.

5. HISSION: 3d Brigade secures and occupies FS/PB DUNNER 2; conducts air assault into LZ RUFE; conducts combat reconnaissance, Search and Destroy operations with two (2) infantry battalions to kill VC/NVA personnel; and to destroy VC/NVA installations in AO YANKES.

## 6. CONCEPT OF OPERATION:

a. Mansuvers The 3d Brigade secures and cocupies FS/PB GUNNER 2 (XT917734) with 2-18 Infantry commencing 11 June 1967; conducts airmobile assault on LZ RUFE with 1-16 Infantry on 13 June 1967; conducts combat reconnaissance operations in AO YANKSE with 1-16 Infantry and 2-28 Infantry to kill VC/NVA personnel and to destroy VC/NVA installations within the operational area.

b. Fire Support: Artillery fire support will be as follows:

#### 7. EXECUTION:

11 June 1967 - The 3d Brigade began Operation BILLINGS by moving the 2-18 Infantry by R/W aircraft from L.I KHE to CHI LINH commencing at 1610 hours. Upon closing the battalion secured the airstrip and Special Forces camp. At G920 hours, one CH 47, while working in the airlift received one round of small arms fire resulting in minur drmage to the aircraft. This occured just Sast of the LAI KHE perimeter. The 3d Brigade CP moved by R/W aircraft from Lij KHE to CHI LINH commencing at 1140 hours. The remainder of 11 June passed without incident.

12 June 1967 - The 3d Brigade continued Operation BILLINGS. The 2-28 Infantry moved by FW aircraft from LAI KHE to an assembly area at CHI LINH commencing at 0920 hours and closing at 1500 hours. The 2-18 Infantry continued to secure FS/PB GUNNEP 2. The remainder of the 12th of June passed without incident.

13 June 1967 - The 3d Brigade continued Operation BILLINGS with an air assault with two infantry battalions on one L2. After an extensive air and artillery preparation, the 1-16 Infantry conducted an air assault from LAI KHE into LZ RUFS (IT954663), beginning at 1115 hours and closing at 1222 hours. At 1119 hours, a LFT covering the lift received small arms fire from the east side of the LZ resulting in 1 US WIA. The battalions secured the LZ for the insertion of the 2-28 Infantry and then occupied the Northern sector of LZ RUFE. The 2-28 Infantry commenced insertion from FS/PE GUNNER 2 into LZ RUFE at 1242 hours and closed at 1337 hours. Upon closing the battalion occupied the Southern half of LZ RUFS. At 1600 hours, vicinity XT946661, a petrol from C Company, 2.28 Infantry located and destroyed 125 fighting positions. At 2101 hours, two abdush patr 2s from C Company, 2-28 Infantry, vicinity IT949659, sprang their ambushes on an estimated 5 VC with unknown results. There were negative US casualties. The 2-13 Infaniry continued to secure FS/FB GUNNER 2 without incident. The 2-28 Infantry defended an NDP in the Southern half of LZ RUFE and the 1-16 Infantry defended an NDF in the Northern half of LZ RUFS. The remainder of 13 June 1967 passed without incident.

14 June 1967 - The 3d Brigads continued Operation BILLINGS. The 1-16 Infantry conducted a company size Search and Districy operation in AO ALPHE. The 2-28 Infantay conducted two company size Search and Destroy operations in AO "RAVO, with negative contact. The 2-18 Infantry continued to secure FS/PB GUNER 2 and conducted local patrols without incident. During the days operations, airstrikes uncovered a base

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camp containing 25 feet of trench and 5 bunkers vicinity XT935667 and de troyed 2 sampons vicinity XT919658. At 1100 hours, vicinity XT941658, A Company, 1-16 Infantry located an old base camp approximately 300 moters long, containing 55 protective shelters. The area was marked for destruction by artillery fires. At 1215 hours, vicinity XT935658, A Company 1-16 Infantry observed and fired on 5 VC. The VC fled Southeast, leavin; behind 5 ruck sacks containing small amounts of ammunition and documents. The documents were avacuated. At 1412 hours, vicinity XT937669, B Company, 1-16 Infantry received small arms fire. The unit withdrew and placed artillery into the area. The unit went back into the area at 1430 hours and made contact with an estimated VC battalion. The company received heavy fire from the frontand flanks. Artillery, airstrikes and runships were placed into the area. Contact was broken at approximately 1900 hours. At 1720 hours, two modewas ships equipped with forest perstrators were damaged by ground fire when they tried to extract the wounded. At 1730 hours, C Company, 1-16 Infantry was ordered to link up with B Company and assist in the evacuation of the wounded and dead. B Company started noving back toward LZ RUFE at 171' hours, and the two companies linked up at 1814 hours. Both companies closed back into LZ RUFE at 2337 hours. Evacuation of the wounded and dead started at 2309 hours, and was complete at 2337 hours. Friendly casualties wore 6 KHA and 15 WHA. The VC suffered 60 KTA (B3). Flare ships gave continuous illumination and fire support both during the return to LE RUP and curing the medical evacuation. At 1915 hours, vicinity XT907734, a petrol from C Company, 2-18 Infantry fired on one VC dressed in black pajamas. The VC fired 2 or 3 shots at the patrol and withdrew. There ware no friendly casualties and unknown VC casualties. All battalions defended the same NDP's, and the romainder of 14 June passed without incident.

15 June 1967 - The 3d Brigade continued Operation BILLINGS. The 2-28 Infantry c inducted two company size S & D operations to the west of LZ TUFE. The 1-16 Infantry secured LZ TUFE with ut incident. The 2-18 Infantry, continued to secure FS/FB GUNNER 2 with ut incident. At 0930 hours, vicinity XT947662, B Company 2-28 Infantry located a treil which showed recent novement from East to Mest. At 1150 hours, vicinity XT938667, B Company, 2-28 Infantry located 3 ponches and 3 US claymore blast'ng caps and at 1215 hours vicinity XT936667 located 2 VC bodies. One VC was dressed in a Khaki uniform and the other in khaki trousers and a black shirt. Both we ring sandals and web gear. At 1132 hours, vicinity XT937667, A and B Companies 2-28 Infantry entered a large base comp. The base camp appeared to have been a way station, and there was nothing found in the camp. Both companies closed into their NDP's at 1735 hours. All battalions defended the same "DP's and the rumainder of 15 June passed without incident.

16 June 1967 - The 3d Brigade continued Operation BILLINGS. The 1-16 Infantry conducted a two cat, any 265 operation in 10 Charlie, and cleared an LZ at position YANKES. The 2-28 Infantry secured LZ RUFE and conducted local patrols. At 0955 hours, vicinity HT951654, C Company, 1-16 Infantry located a way station used by approximately 6 individuals. At 1145 hours, the CO of B Company, 2-28 Infantry results. At 11435 hours, LZ RUFE came under mortar attack. Approximately 30 to 35 rounds of incoving 60 MM mortars were received. Artillery, airstrikes and a LFT ions defended the area as counter mortar fire. There were 20 US WIA. All battalent.

17 June 1967 - The 3d Brigade continued Operation BHLINGS. At 0730 hours, the 1-16 Infantry (-) with B Company, 2-28 Infantry attached departed the FDP at LZ REE for position X Ray. The 2-28 Infantry (-) with C Company 1-16 Infantry attached remained at LZ REE until position X Ray was secured. The 1-18 Infantry continued to secure LAI KHE and conducted local patrols without incident. The 2-18 Infantry continued to socure FS/FE GUNNER 2 and conducted local patrols. At 1035 hours, vicinity XT897730, A Company, 2-18 Tefantry locaths and destroyed 27 one man forholes. The lead element of 1-16 Infentry (-) reached position X Ray at 1030 hours. The battalion deployed with A Company, 1-16 Infentry in the Northeast side, B Company, 1-16 Infantry moved up the West side and the 29 Flatoon on the South. E Company, 2-28 Infantry moved up the West side and linked up with A Company 1-16 Infantry in the North. The battalion (-) closed at 1125 hours. A Company 2-28 Infantry moved from L2 REE to L2 X Ray commoning at 1015 hours and closing at 1235 hours. At 1245 hours E Company 2-28 Infantry started to receive sniper rounds in to their sector of the parimeter. Fire then began to be received from the North and Southeast portions of the perimetor. The fire increased and was accompanied by automatic weapons fire.

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hand grenades, rifle grenades and 60 17 mortor fire. A major attack took place against A Company, 1-16 Infantry commencing at 1306 hours. The attack was conducted by 2 groups of 30-35 VC. This actack was accompanied by heavy ground fire and a 60 MM mortar barrage. The attack was repulsed and coased at 1345 hours. At 1306 hours, another major attack took lace simultaneously against the Regen (latoon, 1-16 Infantry. At 1346 hours, a reinforcing element from Headquarters Company assisted the Recon Platoon in repulsing the VC attack. The attack against the Recon Platoon was also accompanied by heavy ground fire and a 60 MM mortar barrage. Sporadic small arms fire continued to be received until 1459 hours. Artillery, air and gunships were used throughout the contact. A total of 21 flights of DAC air were directed against the VD. Initial DS losses were 27 KLA and 80 WIA. VC losses, initially, were 2 VC KIA (GC) and 1 PCW. At 1700 hours, LZ X Ray came under morter attack. About 30 rounds of 60 MM morter were received resulting in 3 MS KIA and 20 WIA. Counter mortar fire was placed into the area and the mortar attack ceased at 1704 hours, the 1-18 Infantry was airlifted from LLI KHE to LZ X Ray commencing at 1627 hours, and closing at 1905 hours. The lift was temporarily suspended during the mortar attack at 1705 hours, but was resured at 1705 hours. A Company, and the Recon Flatoon of 1-16 Infantry were airlifted out of LZ X Roy to CHI LINH commenting at 1745 hours and closing at 1830 hours. A follow up report gave 196 VC KIA (DO). The 2-28 Infantry (-) with C Company 1-16 Infantry attached defended an NDF at LZ RUFS. The 1-10 Infantry, 1-16 Infantry (-) and D and A Companies 2-28 Infantry defended an NDF at LZ & Ray. The remainder of 17 June 1967 passed without incident.

16 June 1967 - The 3d Brigade continued Operation BILLINGS. The 1-16 Infantry (-) w.s extracted by R/W aircraft from LZ RUFS and LZ X Ray commencing at 0945 hours and closing FS/FL GIMIE: 2 at 1031 hours. The battalion then moved by R/W aircraft to LAI NHE closing at 1 50 hours. The 1-16 Infantry conducted S & D operations around LZ X Ray and during the day the battalion discovered 22 VC bodies. The 2-20 Infantry continued security of the Western portion of L2 X Ray. The 2-18 Infantry continued to secure FS/PD GUMPEL 2 and conducted local patrils. At 0900 hours, the 1-26 Infontry closed CHI LINH becoming OldCN of the 3d Drigade upon closing. At 1230 hours, the 1-26 Infantry commenced an air assault in LZ Lefiant vicinity XT955726, closing at 1251 hours. During the day the 2-28 Infantry located 4 VC bodies, vic XT960603. At 0000 hours, vicinity XT556602, D Company, 2-20 Infantry located two destr yed claymores and one destroyed boobytrapped grenade. At 1103 hours, vicinity XT956682, B Company, 2-28 Infantry made contact with an estimated VC squad. The point was hit with a claymore and machine gun fire resulting in 1 15 KHA and 3 WHA. Air, artillery and gunships were directed into the area with unknown results. Contact was broken at 1153 hours. At 1236 hours, vicinity XT960720 a HULD received 2 rounds of small arms fire. A gunship in the area took the area under fire and was shot down. The ship landed safely at vicinity XT964728. There w.s 1 US WL.. The ship was secured by the 2-18 Infantry until it was extracted at 1340 hours. At 1432 hours, vicinity XT961681, a patrol from & Company, 1-18 Infantry fired on one VC ofth unknown results. At 1435 hours, vicinity XT959737, A Company, 1-20 Infantry, sighted 4 VC. Light Fire Team and artillery placed fire into the area with unknown results. At 1745 hours, vicinity XT956664, A Company, 1-18 Infantry located 5 entrenching tools, 10 Chicum. grenados, miscellane us web equipment, 7-7.92 M-6 Drums, 4-7.92 clips for an AK 47, 1-7.92 Russian LM-6 (RP-56) and miscellaneous documents. The documents were evacuated. The 1-20 Infantry defended an NDP at LZ Defiant. The 1-16 Infantry romained at LAI KHE and propared for future operations. The remainder of 10 June 1967 passed

19 June 1967 - The 3d Brigade continued Operation "ILLINGS. The 1-18 Infantry conducted an S & D operation in : 0 Mike with one company and the Recon Platoon. The 2-28 Infantry secured LZ X Ray and conducted local patrols. The 1-28 Infantry secured LZ Defiant, and conducted a company size S & D operation to the North of the LZ with negative results. The 2-1{ Infantry continued to secure FS/PB GUMNER 2 without incident. At 1019 hours, vicinity XT951693, B Company, 1-18 Infantry located a large base camp containing 53 bunkers, and 35 VC bodies. Documents and parts of many bodies were also located in the area. The documents were evacuated. At 2210 hours, vicinity XT957/78, an LP from 13 Jompany, 2-20 Infantry heard movement. The LP detonated a claymore and received small rms fire. The LP then was repositioned to a position 35 meters outside of the porimeter. They continued to hear noise without further contact. The battalions continued to defend the same NDP's and the remainder of 19 June passed without incident.



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20 June 1967 - The 3d Drigade continued Operation BILLINGS. The 1-18 Infantry (-) conducted an S & D operation in AO Kilo. The 2-28 Infantry continued to secure 12 X May and conducted local petrols. The 1-28 Infantry continued to secure 12 Definit and conducted a company size S & D operation Southeast of LZ Definit. At 0750 hours, vicinity XT959603, C Company. 1-18 Infantry located and evacuated 1 RFG round. Throughout the day, the battalion located several trails vicinity XT 969-685, MT959693, and XT959694. At 1041 hours, vicinity XT963693, C Company, 2-28 Infantry received several rounds of small arms fire. The unit pulled back and artillery and mortars were fired into the area with unknown results. At 1735 hours, 1-28 Infantry located several trails leading to a log bridge over a river with trails on the other side believed to have been used by a platoon size unit, vicinity XT966705. At 2040 hours, vicinity XT962622 an antush patrol from A Company, 1-18 Infantry heard movement. A claymore was fired with unknown results. The movement censed at 2045 hours. Throughout the night, 1-18 Infantry's patrols heard movement but had no contact. All battalions defended the same MDP's and the remainder of the 2.th of June passed without incidents.

21 June 1967 - The 3d Brigade continued Operation BILLINGS. The 1-18 Infantry secured LZ X Ray and conducted local patrolling with negative contact. The 2-26 Infantry (-) conducted an S & D operation in AO Mike, North and Northwest of LZ X Ray. The 1-20 Infantry conducted a company size S & D operation Southeast of LZ Defiant. The 2-18 Infantry conducted a company size S & D operation Southeast of LZ May. The 2-18 Infantry conducted a company size S & D operation Southeast of LZ Defiant. The 2-18 Infantry continued to secure FS/FB GUNNSR 2 without incident. At 0850 hours, vicinity IT962721, A Company 1-20 Infantry located a recently used trail which indicated movement to the Northwest. At 0905 hours, vicinity IT963720, A Company, 1-26 Infantry located a Northsouth trail which had been recently used by small groups heading South. At 0908 hours, vicinity IT956683, C Company, 2-28 Infantry located 1 VC body which had been dead for 2 or 3 days. Two AK-47 magazines, vicinity IT965076, the Recon Flatoon, 2-28 Infuntry located a well used trail running North-South, used recently by about 10 individuals moving South. At 0958 hours, vicinity IT966720, A Company, 1-28 Infantry located one old VC body. At 1028 hours, vicinity IT966720, A Company, 1-28 Infantry located one old VC body. At 1028 hours, and artillery. At 1107 hours, vicinity IT956683, C Company 2-28 Infantry located a graves with 3 VC bodies. At 1311 hours, vicinity IT970716, A Company, 1-28 Infantry located a 20 MM shell with blood on it. All battalions defended the same NDP's and the remainder of 21 June passed without incident.

22 June 1967 - The 3d Drigade continued Operation BILLINGS. The 1-18 Infantry (-) conducted an S & D operation in the Eastern portion of AO Mike. The 2-28 Infantry secured position X Ray and conducted local patrols. The 1-28 Infantry conducted a company size S & D operation East of LZ Definat. The 2-28 Infantry continued to secure FS/FD GUNNER 2 conducting a company sweep North and Northwest of the FS/PB. At 1505 hours, violnity XT974715, the S-3 from 1-28 Infantry observed 5 bunkers and 3 foxholes uncovered by airstrikes. The helicopter then received automatic weapons fire. Another airstrike was placed into the area. While conducting a EMA efter the second strike, the S-3 again received heavy automatic weapons fire. Artillery was placed into the area and continued during the night. All battalions defended the same NDF's and the remainder of the day passed without incident.

23 June 1967 - The 3d E igade continued Operation BILLINGS. The 1-18 Infantry was ElFIIIted by R/W to FS/FB GUNNER 2 commencing at 0953 hours and closing at 1025 hours. The battalion was then airlifted via F/W to DI AN commencing at 1530 hours and becoming OFCUN of 2d Brigade upon closing. The 1-28 Infantry was airlifted from LZ Defiant to QUAN LCI commencing at 1015 hours and closing at 1136 hours. The 2-28 Infantry was airlifted via R/W from position X Ray to FS/FD GUNNER 2 commencing at 930 hours and closing at 0950 hours. The battalion was then airlifted by R/W from FS/FB GUNNER 2 to LAI KHE commencing at 1000 hours, and closing at 1520 hours. The 2-16 Infantry continued to secure FS/FD 0 NNER 2 and conducted local patrolling without incident. The remainder of the day passed without incident.

24 June 1967 - The 3d Drigade continued Operation DILLINGS. The forward Drigade CP at FS/HU GUNDER 2 commenced movement to LAI KHE at 1209 hours and closed at 1605 hours. The 2-16 Infantry continued to secure FS/FB GUNMER 2 and conducted local patrols without incident. The 2-28 Infantry prepared for future operations at LAI KHE. The 1-28 Infantry relieved the L-7 ARVN of the perimeter of QULN J at 0915 hours. The remainder of the day passed with ut incident.

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25 June 19.7 - The 3d origade continued Operation BILLINGS. The 2-18 Infantry continued to secure FS/PB GUNNER 2 without incident. At 1200 hours, the 1-16 Infantry came under OPCCN of the 3d Brigade. The battalion continued to secure FS/PB GUNNER 3 at DONG IOLI without incident. The remainder of the day passed without incident.

 $\frac{26 \text{ June 1967}}{1000}$  - The 3d Drigade terminated its participation in Operation BILLINGS at 1038 hours. The 2-18 Infantry continued to secure FS/FD GUNNER 2 conducting local patrols without incident. The battalion (-) moved by F/W from FS/PB GUNNER 2 to DI AN commencing at 1135 hours. The remaining element moved by R/W to DI AN alosing at 1905 hours and upon closing the battalion came under OPCON of 2d Brigade. The 1-16 Infantry continued to defend FS/PE GUNNER 3 and conducted local patrols without incident. The remainder of 26 June 1967 passed without incident.

27 June 1967 - The 1-16 Infantry moved by R/W from FS/FB (UNNER 3 to L/I KHE at OGIO hours and closed at 1719 hours.

#### 8. SUPPORTING FORCES:

a. Artillery: The operation was supported by 2-33 Artillery; A & B 1-5 Artillery reinforcing; 6-27 Artillery, GS, Lighthoree Alpha (4.2), reinforcing; 1 plateon 6-35 ARVN (155), reinforcing. Artillery fires were planned on all LZ's during the operations. Artillery fires were used extensively in support of ground forces. A total of 41,655 rounds of 105 MM; 3,521 rounds of 155 MM; 936 rounds of U<sup>®</sup>; 832 rounds of 175 MM and 5,170 rounds of 4.2" MM were expended.

b. Air Force: The Air Force provided aerial observation and recommissance throughout the operation. Air Force ordnance was used in preparation of LS's and in support of ground forces. A total of 276 close air support sorties wars flow in conjunction with the operation.

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a. Supply: Resupply was conducted by air. No supply problems were encountered.

b. Maintenance: No maintenance problems were encountered during the operation.

c. Treatment of Casualties, Evacuation and Hospitalizations No unusual problems were encountered with medical evacuation or treatment of the wounded.

d. Transportation: No major transportation problems were encountered during the operation.

e. Communications: Throughout the operation no problems were encountered during the operation.

11. SPICIL EQUIPMENT AND TECHNIQUES: No special equipment or techniques were employed during this operation.

12. <u>COMMANDER'S ANALYSIS</u>: Since Operation BILLINGS was the first penetration by US Forces into this section of War Zone "D", the Iron Brigade was anticipating contact with large numbers of hard core VC forces. It was known that the VC considered the area a safe haven and that they would probably resist the destruction of their bases located there.

It is felt that the unit with which Company B, 1-16 Infantry made contact on 14 June was a covering force protecting the rear of VC elements moving West out of the operational area. The use of extensive artillery fires and airstrikes assisted E Company in breaking contact with a larger force, extracting its dead and wounded and prevented the VC from parsuing the unit and inflicting more casualties.

On 17 June it was quite apparent that the VC were expecting an air assault into position I Ray and had prepared, a stack timed to hit the US Forces at that most vulnerable pariod, when the troops were initially organising the defense of the LZ. However the movement of the units overland caught the VC unprepared. They initiated thair attack after several sorties of resupply hod landed in the LZ only to find four rifle companies already on the ground. The actions of the defenders on the LZ were outstanding. The rifle companies held their ground under very heavy automatic Reconnaissance Platoon of 1-16 Infantry and one platoon of 4 Company 1-16th Infantry ery broke the back of the VC attack and inflicted very heavy casualties on the attack ers.

1-16 Infantry was replaced by 1-18 Infantry at position X Ray in order to enable the battalion to refit and get A & D Companies and Reconnaissance Platcon back into fighting condition.

Operation BHLINGS must be considered a successful operation for the Iron Brigade. The brigade entered an untouched area, made contact with the VC on his own ground and inflicted very heavy casualties. The loss of these personnel, added to the knowledge that the US Army canat will, attack his safe areas will greatly reduce the efficiency of the VC and weaken his will to resist.

**TO:** 

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Commanding General 1st Infantry Division ATTN: AVDB-T APO 96345

1. <u>GENERAL</u>: The lst Aviation Battalion provided general aviation support to the lst Infantry Division throughout Operation Billings. Aviation support consisted of: (a) planning, coordinating and executing airmobile operations with organic and non-organic aviation resources; (b) providing normal organic aviation support (i.e., Command and Control, Resupply, Reconnaissance, Courier, Bloodbound and Photographic missions) to units within the division requesting this support; and (c) providing direct fire support with the armed helicopters from the organic Armed Helicopter Flatoon.

2. <u>MISSION:</u> The 1st Aviation Battalion planned and conducted two airmobile operations and one Tactical Emergency (TAC-E) airlift in support of the 3rd Brigade during Operation Billings.

a. On D + 1 (13 June 67) the 1st Aviation Battalion planned and conducted the movement of 1/16th (Devour) and 2/28th (Dauntless) Infantry Battalions from Pick-up Zone (FZ) Lai Kne (1-16) to Landing Zone (LZ) Rufe (Coord XT952661), and PZ Chi Linh (2-28) to LZ Rufe. This operation was conducted with 30 lift heli-copters (UH-1D) making 3 lifts per battalion.

b. On 17 June 1967 the 1st Aviation Battalion again supported the 3rd Brigade by conducting a TAC-E combat assault, moving 1-18 (Dogface) Infantry Battalion from PZ Lai the to LZ X-Ray (Coord XT960680). The TAC-E aircraft began arriving at Lai Khe approximately 20 minutes after being "scrambled" by ACC. Unit integrity for flights had to be disregarded for the most part, since aircraft from various aviation units supporting the division were diverted for the TAC-E lift; the exception being the 187th Assault Helicopter Company (II FFV RRF Avn Co) which arrived as a flight of 10 aircraft. In approximately 1 hr 45 min the lift force of 20 helicopters and 4 light and 1 heavy fire teams were assembled, formed, brief-ed, troops loaded and on their way to the battle area. The original plan was to move the 1-18 from Lai Khe to Chi Linh but the LZ was changed to LZ X-Ray when the lift force was approximately mid-way to the original destination. Flights were briefed in the air by the Air Mission Commander (AMC), giving flight routes, artillery and air fire support in progress, direction of landing, etc. The diversion was mady with ease, again demonstrating the flexibility of aviation support. Flights into LZ X-Ray were interrupted several times by enemy mortar attacks, and had to be moved to an orbit area nearby until the LZ was again clear. In addition to moving 1-18 troops into LZ X-Ray, the following back-hauls were made from LZ X-Ray: 4 sorties of Engineer troops to LZ Rufe; 20 sorties of 1-16 (Devour) to Chi Linh; and 15 sorties of 1-16 to LZ Rufe. Despite the many moves that had to be made, this complicated operation was conducted in a most expeditious and professional manner and accomplished in short order without incident.

c. Statistics for airmobile operations planned and executed by the 1st Aviation Battalinn are as follows:

(1) Novement of 1-16 Inf Bn (Devour) - 30 acft = 80 sorties - 560 passengers (or passenger equivalents).

(2) Movement of 2-28 Inf Bn (Dauntless) - 30 acft - 80 sorties - 560 passengers (or passenger equivalents).

(3) TAC-E movement: (Total of 120 sorties).

(a) Movement of 1-18 Inf Bn (Dogface) - 20 acft - 81 sorties -567 passengers (or passenger equivalents).

4. Lessons Learned:

a. It has been noted that aircraft supporting Division Chemical on Bloodhound missions are required to repeatedly fly over the same areas, following the same flight route and at approximately the same time each day, thus setting a pattern which the VC can easily notice. The times and flight routes should be varied as much as possible, consistent with successful mission accomplishment, to reduce the possibility of aircraft receiving enemy fire.

b. The number of aircraft hits from enemy small arms fire is on the increase due to low ceilings which force aircraft to fly at lower than normal altitudes. All users of aircraft should consider cancelling or delaying missions not of a combat essential nature when low cloud ceilings and limited visibility are prevalent.

c. Preparation of Landing Zones by Artillery and Air limit the flight routes into and out of the LZ's for the lift helicopters during an airmobile operaed directly across the lift helicopter flight routes, thereby causing a dangerous and unsafe condition to exist. To preclude this situation from developing, the Air Mobile Task Force Commander (AMTFC) who controls all fire support for the airmobile operation, must keep the Air Mission Commander (AMC) constantly informed of Impact areas, direction and flight routes of AF aircraft, gun target lines, etc.

d. Density of helicopters (other than those directly involved in the lift) in and around the LZ during an airmobile operation often creates a safety of flight hazard, due largely to the lack of communication between sircraft. This condition can be easily corrected by all aircraft monitoring the UNF frequency of the AMC (all Avn En and Co UHF frequencies are posted in the aviator SOI extracts); ing the LZ, and how other than lift helicopters can maneuver in and around the LZ and not interfere with the airmobile operation.

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# Annex J to After Action meport BILLINGS

The following psychological operations evaluation for Operation BILLINGS is submitted in accordance with 1st Division Regulation 335-6.

a. The Division conducted psychological warfare throughout the operational area in support of offensive operations against main force VC/NVA units to reduce their combat effectiveness by undermining their morale, encouraging surrender, and causing defection through the Chieu Hoi program. To accomplish, this psychological operations were conducted with centralized control. An attached FayOps team from the 246th Psychological Operations Company supported 1st and 3d Brigade, and Division requirements under direct control of the ACofS, G5.

b. Broadcasts and selected leaflets were utilized on suspected enemy locations upon G2/S2 recommendations in coordination with G3/S3. Special leaflets and loudspeaker appeals were directed at the 271 Regiment. Throughout the operation, emphasis was placed on close support in accordance with the day to day tactical situation.

c. A total of 3,180,000 leaflets were dropped. These included 809,000 Safe Conduct Passes, 716,000 Chicu Hoi appeals, 565,000 1st Division Power appeals, 390,000 North Victnamese Army appeals, and 100,000 selected standard leaflets. 400,000 special 271 loaflets and 200,000 special rally instruction leaflets were developed at G5 for this operation, representing 19% of the total leaflets dropped.

d. Leaflet coverage ranged from a density of over 50,000 leaflets per square kilometer in area which enemy elements were reported to frequent, to approximately 5,000 leaflets per square kilometer in fringe areas.

c. 19 hours of loudspeaker broadcasts were played. All of these were especially written or adopted for Operation BILLINGS and recorded by the ACofS, G5 Section. A breakdown of the tapes by type is as follows: Allied Power, 8 hours; Chicu Hoi appeal, 3 hours 45 minutes; 1st Division power, 3 hours 30 minutes; Rally Instructions, 3 hours 45 minutes.

f. Organic Divisional helicopters provided the dissemination means for approximately 85% of the total leaflets and 75% of loudspeaker broadcasts; while U-10 aircraft from the 5th ACS accounted for the remainder.

g. PsyOps personnel ware called upon to perform loudspeaker support of 3 separate rescue missions in which US soldiers were lost. Two of these missions were successful, with the lost personnel hearing and following the instructions, resulting in the recovery of 4 EM, 2 of whom were wounded. The third mission was run primarily as a precautionary measure, following which it was determined that personnel thought missing were accounted for.

h. As no specific feedback has been obtained, effectiveness cannot be determined. It is felt that this operation provided groundwork for future PsyOps campaigns in this area and against the 271 Regiment.

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
