

- 4. (U) <u>Mission</u>. The mission of this organization, in support of designated units, as defined by Letter of Instructions 3-66(U), Headquarters, 43d Medical Group, dated 10 June 1966, is;
- a. Provide area medical survice to units without an assigned or organic medical support organical
 - b. Supervise professional medical services of subordinate units.
- c. Provide command, control and planning for all clumenus assigned or attached.
- d. Provide battalion-level supply and organizational maintenance to assigned or attached units.
- e. Provide augmentation of 240 operational bods to the 5th Field Hospital, Nha Trang.

- 5. (U) <u>Personnel</u>. Except as indicated in Section 2., this command experienced no unusual problems in the personnel field.
 - 6. (S) Operations.
- a. Major combat forces operation supported has been Operation John Paul Jones (U). Operations Plans for support of combat units include Operations Blue Jay (U), Fulton (U), Emerson (U), Robin (U), Jeb Stuart (U).
- b. Operation John Paul Jones (U) is being conducted in the Tuy Hoa (CQ160460) area by the 1st Brigado, 101st Airborne Division (Maps, Joint Operations Graphic (Ground), 1:250,000, series 1501, edition December 1965, sheet No 49-9. This organization supports the operation with a liaison officer (medical regulating), ambulance (M-43) and fixed-wing in-flight medical attendants.
- c. Area cutpatient medical service (dispensery) is provided in Dalat, Cam Ranh Bay, and Nha Trang. Psychiatric consultation and mental hygiene consultation services are provided throughout II CTZ.
- 7. (U) Training. Except as indicated in Section 2, this command experienced no unusual problems in the training field.
- 8. (U) Intelligence. Except as indicated in Section 2, this command experienced no unusual problems in the intelligence field.
- 9. (U) Logistics. Except as indicated in Section 2, this command experienced no unusual problems in the logistics field.

Section 2, Commander's Recommendation and Lessons Learned.

i. (U) <u>/greenmel</u>.

- a. Item: Unit was not fully deployable upon Personnel Readiness
 Date, 28 April 1966.
- b. <u>Discussion</u>: HD, 61st Medical Battalion was alerted for movement from CONUS to an overseas theater of operations (classified) in January 1966; alert contained personnel deployability criteria, and a personnel readiness date of 26 April 1966. Inmediately non-deployable personnel were removed from the roles of the organization and subsequent requisitions for filler personnel were submitted through the appropriate channels. Filler personnel commonced reporting for deployment in March and continued to arrive through 26 April 1966. Officers designated by the Office of the Surgeon General for assignment to this organization and subsequent deployment, and reported for action to responsible Army Commanders with specific orders to report not latter than 12 April, were not informed by losing commands that they had in fact been designated until late in April; and did not report until mid-May.

Unnecessary hardships were encountered in the movement of dependents and household goods, granting of POM leaves and performance of necessary unit training.

- c. Recommendation: That a definite readiness date be established for all units deploying, with a commensurate notification to mobilization designees, and that the reporting date for filler personnel be adjusted to permit at least four (4) weeks unit training.
- 2. (U) Operations. Only limited operations have been undertaken by this organization since arrival in this theater.
- a. Item: Adequate facilities for establishment of fully operational dispensaries do not exist upon arrival of units in country.
- b. <u>Discussion</u>: Units deployed overseas because of the need for their services are in fact hindered in the performance of their mission due to the lack of adequately planned or constructed facilities. Too much time is lost in the locating, re-locating, designing, re-designing an adequate facility.

c. Recommendation:

- (1) Medical units do not deploy until a fixed or real anticipated need exists.
- (2) Upon deployment a fixed location and facility be prepared to receive the unit.
- (3) Medical personnel in conjunction with base development. . . personnel design and publish specific construction criteria for each type medical treatment unit to include type floor plans, wiring diagrams, requirements for special construction (ie lead shield) and air-conditioning.
- ? (U) Training theopt for too little time to accomplish writ training under the supervision of my personnel, this organization has experienced no unusual problems. This organization was fully capable of performing its assigned mission upon arrival in-country.
 - 4. (U) Intelligence. None
 - 5. (U) Logistics.

a. Item: Unnecessary confirment accompanied personnel enroute and unneeded equipment was shipped as residual equipment.

b. Discussion:

(1) TSEC-KW/7 Electronic Security Equipment was shipped on order of losing command; it was returned to appropriate signal authorities immediately upon in-country arrival.


