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

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PREFACE

This index is a revision of RAND Memorandum RM-2800-1, <u>Economics</u>

<u>Department Publications</u>, 1948-1962, October 1962, updating it to include publications issued by the Economics Department through the end of December 1962. Publications issued after this date appear in yearly supplements.

The present Memorandum follows the format established in RM-2800-1, being arranged by author rather than by serial number. It is believed that this arrangement will be welcomed by most users, as it is more familiar to research workers, scholars, and librarians generally. Because authors are usually specialists, an author index also serves as a specialized subject index, and the chronological arrangement of entries under each author's name makes it easy to find the author's latest or most complete study of a given subject. This chronological arrangement under the author's name also enables the user to find an entry by means of its serial number, and numerical finding lists are provided for this purpose.

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INTRODUCTION

WHAT THIS INDEX IS

This is an author index to RAND Economics Department publications available in the open literature. It extends in time from the Department's establishment in 1948 to December 31, 1962. It includes monographs (books and "Reports"), less formal monographs or working papers ("RAND Memoranda"), and journal-type professional contributions ("Papers"). Book reviews written by Economics Department authors and items now out of print are omitted.

Because this is a departmental index it excludes some related publications issued by other departments, but it includes the work of authors elsewhere in RAND if issued by the Economics Department.

A comprehensive guide to RAND open-literature publications can be found in the hardcover reference volume, <u>Index of Selected Publications</u> (August 1962), and in the index-abstracts journal <u>Selected RAND Abstracts</u>, published yearly since 1962.

The present index has as its basic reference list complete bibliographical entries with abstracts, arranged under authors' names. The authors' names are given alphabetically by surname, and the publications of each author are given under his name in a single chronological list (not in separate lists for each publications series). For publications with more than one author, full entries are given for the first-named author, and cross-references are given under the names of coauthors. As a reference aid, the names of all authors are given alphabetically in the Author List immediately preceding the Author Index.

HOW TO USE THIS INDEX

If the author's name is known, the user can turn immediately to the name in the Author Index, where he will find the various titles arranged chronologically by date of issue, each with abstract and bibliographical data. The pages of the Author Index are keyed at the top with the first two letters of the author's surname. If the RAND publication number is known (but not the author) the author's name is found by referring to the Numerical Finding Lists. Here RAND publication numbers are given in numerical order, together with the surname of the first-named author, in separate lists for each of the three series: Reports (R's), RAND Memoranda (RM's), and Papers (P's). RAND studies published as books are listed alphabetically by title on pages 11 and 12.

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Substantial collections of RAND publications are kept in many libraries in the United States and in several foreign countries. These deposit libraries are listed below on pages 5 and 6. RAND publications in deposit libraries are available to patrons on the same basis as other publications and are subject to the same rules and regulations. Other libraries can obtain RAND publications from the deposit libraries through the Interlibrary Loan Service. Deposit libraries have RAND's permission to reproduce RAND publications for their patrons.

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Reports and RAND Memoranda not published commercially as books may be obtained by writing directly to the RAND Reports Department. They are also available from the Defense Documentation Center (DDC), the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), and the Clearinghouse for Federal Scientific and Technical Information (formerly the Office of Technical Services) of the Department of Commerce.

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


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
