
FOREWORD

FROM THE COMMANDING GENERAL

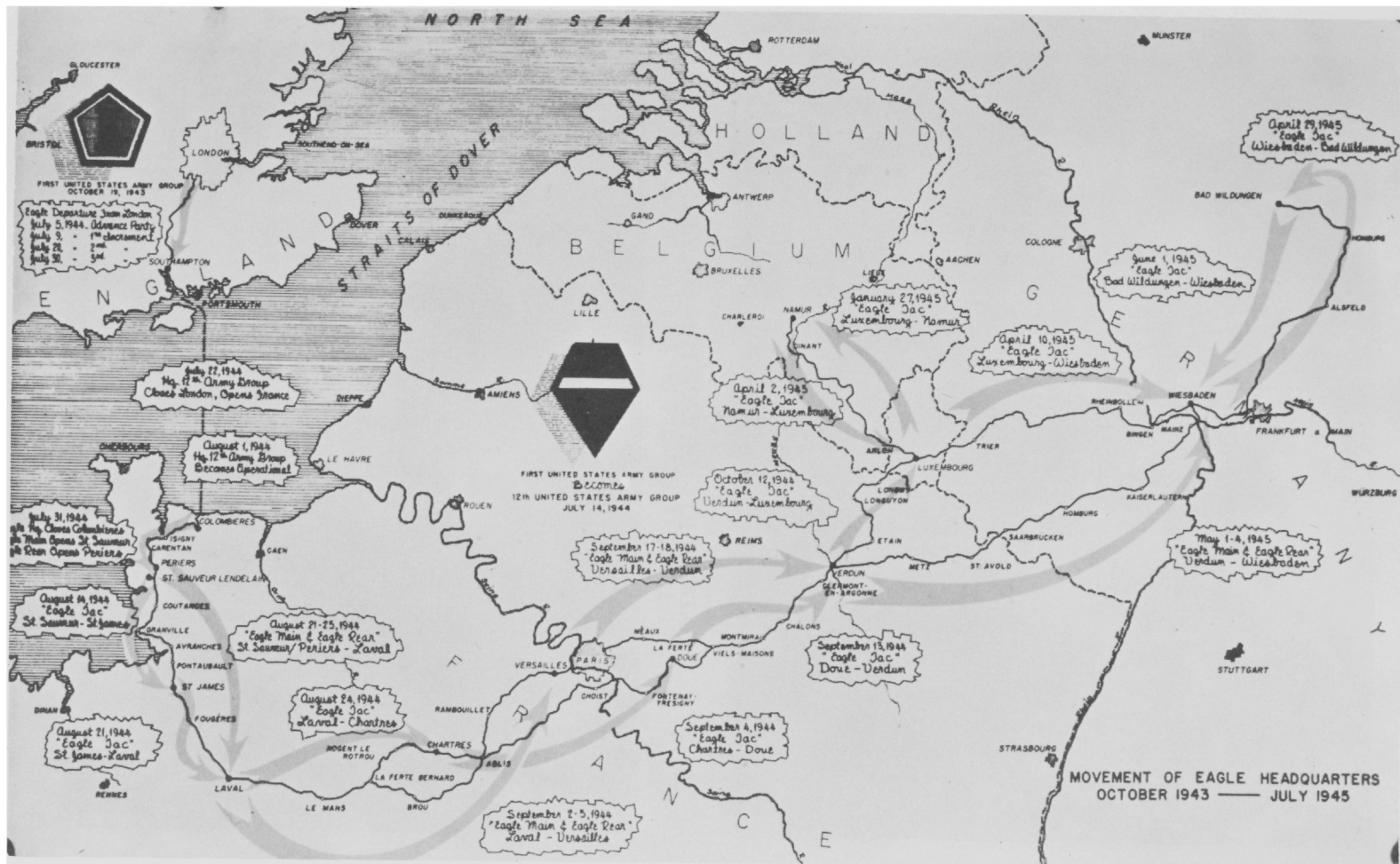
No commander has ever been served by a more efficient and devoted staff. Each of you, who served with me during those historic days, has made a real contribution to our victory and to our country.

12th ARMY GROUP ASSOCIATION

The Association was formed in 1946 by the staff officers who served under General Bradley 1943–45, first as FUSAG (First U.S. Army Group) in London, then as EAGLE (12th Army Group) from England to the Elbe. More elite than Society's legendary 400, total membership numbers 380.

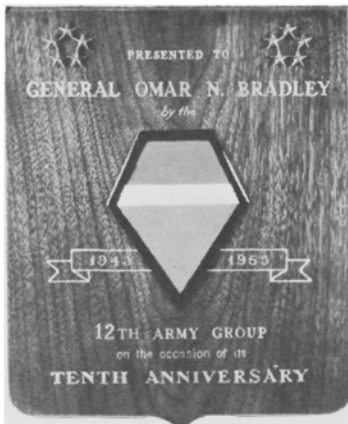
Honorary Commander is General Omar N. Bradley. The only elected officer is Secretary-Treasurer. We have five to date: Al Leggin, Charlie Landon, the late Charlie Wall, the late Harry D. Henshel and Bert Kalisch. Bob Hertzberg and Chet Hansen have served as Editors of the Eagle.

The Association is non-commercial, non-profit and exists for the sole purpose of perpetuating the friendships and bonds forged in World War. II. By common consent, we hold an annual reunion in October as near to the date of Eagle's creation as possible. It consists of a reception and dinner, with General and Mrs. Bradley as guests of honor. Since Washington, D.C. is the site of the dinner, the New York group sometimes holds a luncheon in the Spring, which General Bradley attends.

Any officer, warrant officer or enlisted man who received a commission is eligible to become a member. Annual dues are \$5 and are generally paid in replying to the Reunion Notice, whether the member attends or not.

Our 1965 Reunion marks two decades since Eagle passed into history. In 1953, the Tenth Anniversary of our founding was marked by special ceremonies. General Bradley and "Pinkie" Wright led a group to the Tomb of

the Unknown Soldier at Arlington. A wreath was laid and the 12th Army Group flag dipped in silent tribute. The photo (at left) shows the plaque presented to our chief. To us, he will always be known as our Commanding General.

Al deserves a special accolade for his decade of devoted service 1946-56.

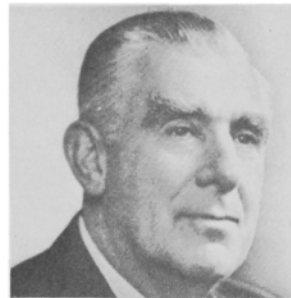

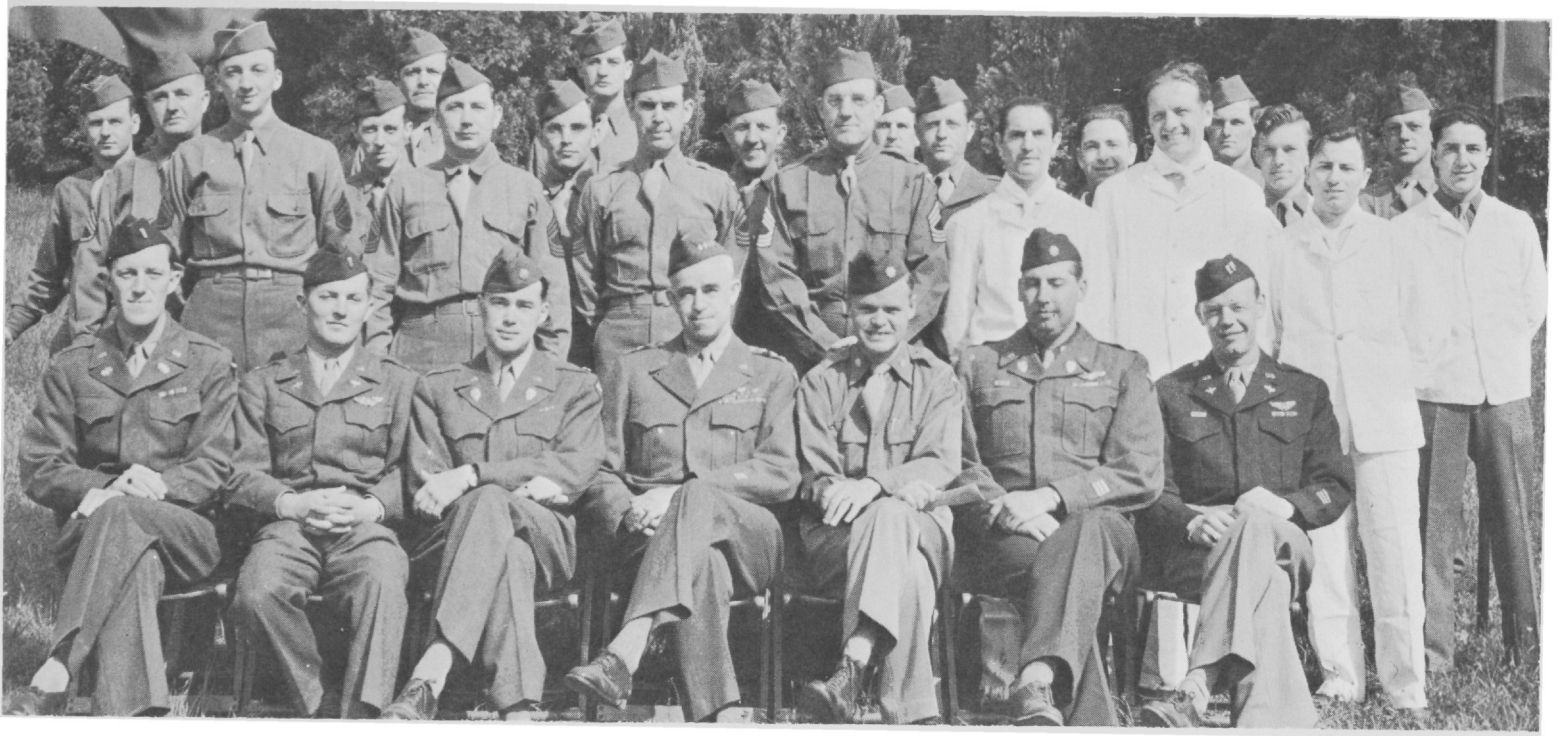


General Bradley at Desk in his Trailer

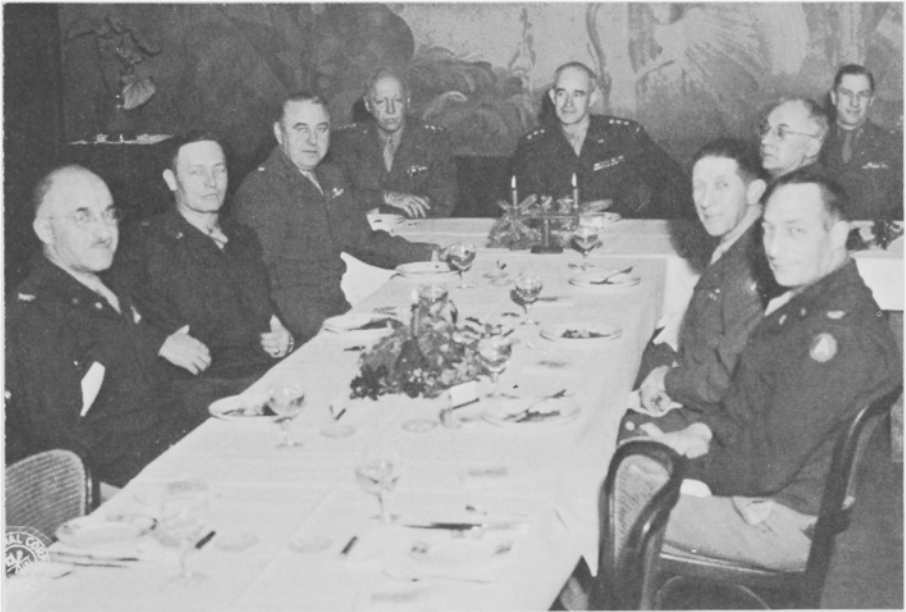

G-1. was charged with planning and co-ordinating all personnel matters included in Army Group Mission. Five branches did the job under General O'Hare:

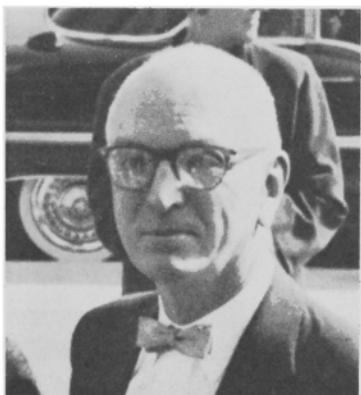
Operations: All necessary revisions of plans and preparation of the G-1 portion of administrative orders and instructions were carried out . . . all required reports were prepared, the most important being the G-1 Daily Summary and Administrative Map.

Morale: Awards and Decorations. *Personnel:* Also processed promotions of Generals and Colonels. *Reinforcements:* Requirements were submitted, priority allocations made and policies established. *Miscellaneous:* Handled arrangements on Allied POW's; disbandment of German armed forces and repatriation of Russian POW's.



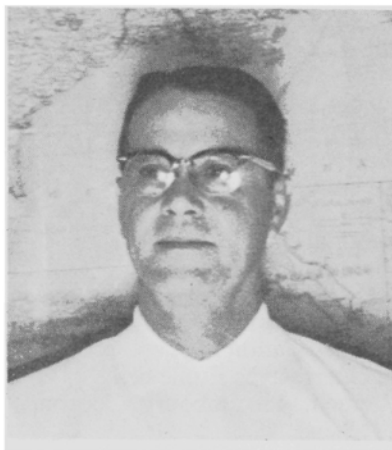

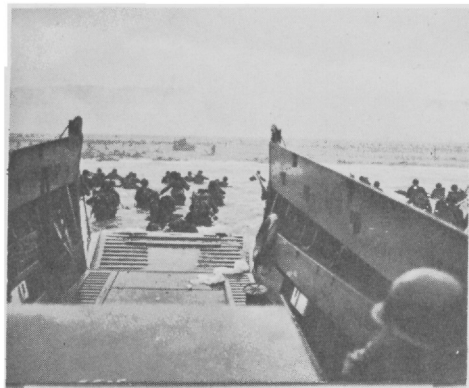

G-2

During the planning and operations phases, this Section handled all intelligent matters for the Army Group and Armies. There were five branches, whose names are self-explanatory: Administration, Intelligence, Counter-Intelligence, Foreign Liaison and G-2 (Air). A special unit, known as Target or "T" Branch was organized in 1944 to isolate and secure intelligence and CIC targets.

Writing of the functions of the staff branches in his book, General Bradley summed up G-2, G-3 and G-4 activities as follows: "G-2 existed to tell me what should be done on the basis of his information of the enemy. G-4 was to tell me what could be done in view of our limitations of supply. Then once I made my decision, G-3 was to do it."

"IKE DIDN'T SLEEP HERE!"

Shortly after D-Day a phone call came from First Army HQ in Normandy asking for a relief for Col. Monk Dixon, G-2, who had been several days and nights without rest and was running a high temperature. My boss, Brig. Gen. Bryan Conrad, was ordered to go from England to Normandy and took me with him as assistant. After three grinding days and nights of work in steady rain, sleepless, our bed-rolls soaked, Gen. Conrad and I decided to seek a night's rest. Inquiring in a nearby village for quarters, we met a lieutenant who smiled broadly and pointed at a typical two-story farmhouse. We knocked on the door and were met by a Master Sergeant, his sleeve covered with hash marks. He invited us inside. On the second floor we found a bedroom with two beds, clean linen, and an adjacent bathroom with tub. Our cordial host, the Sergeant, assured us that we could help ourselves to a drink. Beginning to feel at home, I took a much-needed bath. Then we turned in.

Coming in a few hours later to see how his "guests" were faring, our host, the Sergeant, found General Conrad dozing on one bed while I was asleep again on the other. "Gentlemen," he yelled, "If General Eisenhower comes, you will have to get out in a hurry." Early next morning, we did.

One incident recalled was the last big German air raid when they set our headquarters on fire in March of '44. I rushed around to try to save what I could of the plans, and, as I approached the entrance to my building. General Leven Allen stopped me and said, "Masson, you are just the man I want—you are in charge of the fire department and I don't want the fire to get beyond No. 16 Brynston Square." Of course, this was General Bradley's and General Allen's office so it was my job to carry on.

We had one small British pump and I called the British Fire Department twice for reinforcements and on the third call the voice on the other end said, "Look here, my good fellow, there are 350 fires in London tonight. We know where the important ones are and will get to you in due course. Good-night"; and the receiver clicked. Knowing I had had it and with the help of the one pump and stalwart work of many others with a stirrup pump, buckets, sand, etc. we were able to contain the fire and saved the General's office. Finally, this info got back to Baltimore because in 1962, Mayor McKeldin appointed me a member of the Fire Board.

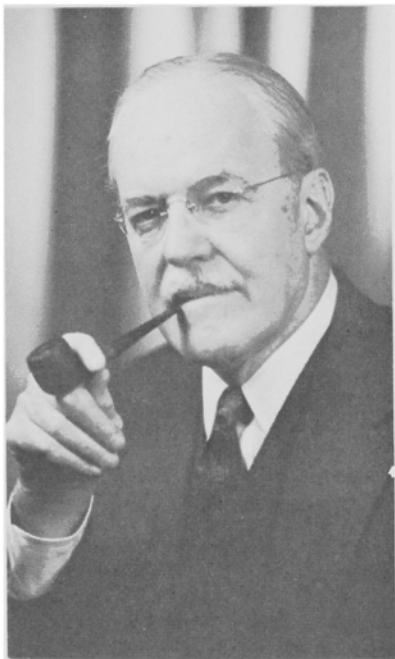
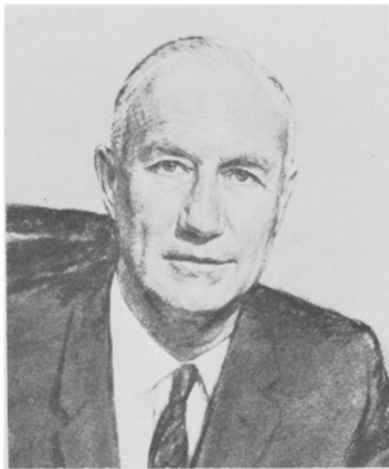
